ohn chapter four introduces us to the Samaritan woman (a.k.a. the woman at the well, and probably a host of other phrases that should not be put in print). She went alone to draw water just like any other day. However, something happened. That day she met Jesus. That day changed her life. Jesus revealed her past and redeemed her future.

Phillips Brooks describes the process well, "The only way to get rid of your past is to make a future out of it. God will waste nothing." Your past has helped develop who you are today. That can be negative or positive. The decision is yours.

Skeletons in the Closet covers four basic sections concerning what to do with your past:

01 DEFINE

DR. RANDY T. JOHNSON, GROWTH PASTOR love to see or experience an Aha moment! Oprah Winfrey describes it this way, "I always love those moments when I sit down to talk to somebody and they say something that makes me look at life or a situation in a completely different way, and I say, 'Aha! I get it!' Light bulb...and the little hairs on your arm stand up. That is an Aha moment."

US Weekly reported that Oprah Winfrey used the phrase so much that the *Merriam-Webster Dictionary* (2012 edition) added the expression by defining it as "a moment of sudden realization, inspiration, insight, recognition, or comprehension."

What kind of Aha moments have you had?			

John chapter 14 records the story of Jesus talking with the woman at the well. The story has several twists as Jesus goes out of His way to talk with not only a Samaritan but a woman. He regularly created Aha moments.

John 4:1-6 says, "Now when Jesus learned that the Pharisees had heard that Jesus was making and baptizing more disciples than John (although Jesus himself did not baptize, but only his disciples), he left Judea and departed again for Galilee. And he had to pass through Samaria. So he came to a town of Samaria called Sychar, near the field that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there; so Jesus, wearied as he was from his journey, was sitting beside the well. It was about the sixth hour."

Did Jesus "have" to pass through Samaria? Why <u>and</u> why not?	

It was the sixth hour (noon). It was the middle of the day. It was the chore of the women to go to the well and get water for their family. Because of the heat of the day, the women would not put this chore off until later in the day. It was a morning task. Only a woman who was an outcast would be at the well at the sixth hour.

This woman had a history. She had skeletons in the closet. She was not too different from all of us. She had chapters in her autobiography that she did not want others to read. She, like us, had a "past." Like her, one of the first things we need to do is to recognize our need.

1. Recognize the need.

Jews did not respect Samaritans; men viewed women as less valuable. However, Jesus was different. He loved and loves everyone. He went to a Samaritan woman. Actually, the story shows her resume is even less honorable than was first expected.

Before someone can be saved, they need to know they are lost. Jesus went out of His way to meet with the Samaritan woman at the well. He did not preach or speak down to her. He used an object lesson and thoughtful questions to help her realize that she had a need.

John 4:7-15 says, "A woman from Samaria came to draw water. Jesus said to her, 'Give me a drink.' (For his disciples had gone away into the city to buy food.) The Samaritan woman said to him, 'How is it that you, a Jew, ask for a drink from me, a woman

of Samaria?' (For Jews have no dealings with Samaritans.) Jesus answered her, 'If you knew the gift of God, and who it is that is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water.' The woman said to him, 'Sir, you have nothing to draw water with, and the well is deep. Where do you get that living water? Are you greater than our father Jacob? He gave us the well and drank from it himself, as did his sons and his livestock.' Jesus said to her, 'Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks of the water that I will give him will never be thirsty again. The water that I will give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life.' The woman said to him, 'Sir, give me this water, so that I will not be thirsty or have to come here to draw water.'"

Jesus gently approached the woman. It appeared He had a physical need for water, but actually she was spiritually trying to survive in a desert. Her thirst was so subtle until Jesus pointed out her need.

It is not enough to recognize the need or realize we have a problem. We need to find a solution. What is the cure for this disease? What can quench the thirst?

2. Realize the solution.

Once Jesus helped the woman admit that she had a need, He directed her to the solution. Jesus was and is the solution. In the process, He shows that He is the Messiah and God.

John 4:16-26 says, "Jesus said to her, 'Go, call your husband, and come here.' The woman answered him, 'I have no husband.' Jesus said to her, 'You are right in saying, 'I have no husband'; for you have had five husbands, and the one you now have is not your husband. What you have said is true.' The woman said to him, 'Sir, I perceive that you are a prophet. Our fathers worshiped on this mountain, but you say that in Jerusalem is the place where people ought to worship.' Jesus said to her, 'Woman, believe me, the hour is coming when neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem will you worship the Father. You worship what you do not know; we worship what we know, for salvation is from the Jews. But the hour is coming, and is now here, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for the Father is seeking such people to worship

him. God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in spirit and truth.' The woman said to him, 'I know that Messiah is coming (he who is called Christ). When he comes, he will tell us all things.' Jesus said to her, 'I who speak to you am he.'"

Because Jesus is God, He knew and knows all things (omniscient). The same situation happened with Nathanael. When Philip came to him stating that "Jesus of Nazareth" might be the Messiah, Nathanael gave the famous line, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" He then went to see Jesus. John 1:47-49 explains what happened next, "Jesus saw Nathanael coming toward him and said of him, 'Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom there is no deceit!' Nathanael said to him, 'How do you know me?' Jesus answered him, 'Before Philip called you, when you were under the fig tree, I saw you.' Nathanael answered him, 'Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!'" The only way Jesus could have known what happened to Nathanael was if He was God (knowing all things). Nathanael knew it, and it was his Aha moment.

Likewise, the woman at the well was amazed that Jesus knew her history; it was her Aha moment.

3. Act upon the decision.

The woman recognized her need, realized the solution was standing right in front of her, and then acted upon her decision. Sin brought the thirst that could only be quenched by the Good News that the Messiah had come. That belief needed her to put on some scandals and take some action.

John 4:27-30 says what she did next, "Just then his disciples came back. They marveled that he was talking with a woman, but no one said, 'What do you seek?' or, 'Why are you talking with her?' So the woman left her water jar and went away into town and said to the people, 'Come, see a man who told me all that I ever did. Can this be the Christ?' They went out of the town and were coming to him."

Dan Delzell said, "No one knows God simply by virtue of being alive. It takes an 'Aha' moment so to speak. It requires divine revelation, which brings about an understanding of grace and salvation. This is how a person is welcomed into the family of God. So have you had your Aha moment with God, or not? I didn't ask if you are religious, or if you experience spiritual longings and some measure of inner peace. Those realities are felt by multitudes of people whether they have had their Aha moment or not. It's the difference between relying upon Christ's death on the cross, versus striving to make yourself acceptable to your Creator by your own deeds. Before our Aha moment, we are clueless about what 'grace' really means. There is a

spiritual fog of sorts which clouds our thinking in the area of religion. We still think of good religion as man's attempts to earn God's approval. One way to sort through it is to imagine what you would say if God asked you why you should get into heaven. If you point to your efforts as the basis for your entrance, then it doesn't sound like you have had your Aha moment. Without spiritual conversion, all man can do is try to act religious. But that common approach won't connect you to God...Only Christ provides eternal victory for immortal souls. And only the Holy Spirit can produce your Aha moment."

s obedient children, do not be conformed to the passions of your former ignorance, but as he who called you is holy, you also be holy in all your conduct, since it is written, 'You shall be holy, for I am holy.'" 1 Peter 1:14-16

My salvation story came later in life than most. Saved at the age of forty-six, the change in my life was profound. Clearing the junk that had accumulated through the years of selfishness and vain pursuits, clearly paid dividends. To many (including myself), the transformation was credible. The change in my life opened the eyes of many around me. It did not matter if you believed or not, there was something different about me now. Many that I had known for years wondered when it would wear off. Others wanted to know more of the exciting change they saw within me. In front of them, they had the transformation they themselves sought. It was an exciting time.

A few years later, I realized there was a change in how I responded to the things of God. I was serving faithfully in the church and still attending Bible studies, but something was not quite right. I seemed to have lost the joy that was constant when I first believed. Disturbed by what was happening, I sought answers through Pastors and other leaders in the Church. Swayed by the emotion of "not feeling" as if my eternity was secured, I was becoming lukewarm. I was going through the motions with no conviction or enthusiasm. Prayer seemed difficult at best.

Then one Sunday, the Pastor was speaking on forgiveness from those you had hurt. I needed to lay it on the table, bare your soul,

and ask for forgiveness. Wrestling with God, I refused to obey. To disclose my past as an unsaved man was more than I was willing to do. I had too much to lose. The world would never understand. I wrestled for days on my decision whether I would be obedient to Him. My emotions overwhelmed me as I became a defeated man. I was broken. I finally relented to the Holy Spirit's urging. This was the beginning of my search for His holiness and my obedience.

It has been over seven years since that day, and I look back in awe of what Christ did for me. The illumination of God's will in my life to be obedient has forever changed the course of my life. The desire to seek His holiness has impacted not only myself but those around me. Dr. Richard J. Krejcir wrote in "The Holiness of God" (an article from *Church Leadership*) that,

"God calls us, not to conform to the world, but to Him. This requires conviction, and the willingness to peruse through difficult times and people who have opposing ideas. We do this because we desire to because of what He has done for us, not because we feel obligated, or forced. Holiness is also a trust that many do not see, a trust that He is there, and that we can have comfort and confidence in Him in all aspects of life. Otherwise, we remain chained to the despair of loneliness and self-destruction."

Romans 8:28 says, "And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose."

Having trust is a game changer!

ach day, our brains are flooded with mounds of new and differing information. Some of it is sensory, like all the cars, trees, and the buildings we see while driving. Others are more intellectual in nature, new ideas we come across while reading or skills we develop through training or conversation. No matter how "busy" you feel on a given day, there is no doubt that your brain is under constant bombardment. I think that is why God designed long-term memory the way He did. As part of God's great design, our brains consolidate information we receive during the day and items that are repeated multiple times make their way into our long-term memory. Our brains preserve these memories and store them throughout our brain ready to be recalled when the time comes. This is an amazing function that God has placed in us, but like most things in this fallen world, it can be a stumbling block in our walk with God.

I grew up in the church, but my relationship with Jesus did not become my own until I was 17. Since that time, I have been trying my best to lay down my life and pursue the purpose God has for me. However, there are days when all I can think about are memories of my past life that plague me. There was a time in my life when I was full of hatred, and I took it out on everyone around me. I remember fights at school or with my parents that got out of hand. It makes me wonder if I can ever be the person God wants me to be. It makes it hard to feel that I could ever change.

I think the woman at the well probably lived this experience. Jesus called out the sin she was living in so that she could understand her need for Jesus to save her. I believe the woman at the well got saved.

but I also know that her long-term memory was filled with actions she could never take back. It can be a struggle to live in the present when your memory banks are filled with the regrets of your past.

I believe Paul is a prime example of someone who worked to combat this. He was haunted by a recent past full of hatred towards Christians, but he was able to overcome his past by the power of God to be the greatest leader of the early church. Paul gives us a glimpse into how he did this in Philippians 3:13, "Brothers, I do not consider that I have made it my own. But one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead." Our brains are designed to remember the big events from our lives. There are times where this can be painful as we consider our poor choices and actions. However, Jesus did not save us to live in our past, and He saved us to strain forward to what lies ahead. Your past is exactly that, past. I pray we all would work to leave it there.

TO KNOW HIM IS TO LOVE HIM

DEFINE IT, DEVOTION 5

Take a few minutes and read John 4:1-45. In this story we find a Samaritan woman performing an ordinary task, and she ends up having an extraordinary encounter with Jesus. She goes to a well to draw the water she needs for the day and enters into a conversation in which Jesus offers her "living water" (verse 10) that will satisfy her thirst completely. Ultimately, this unlikely woman receives Christ, becomes God's vessel for the Gospel, and is used to transform many in her town (verse 41).

There are many truths taught from this one story: salvation is for all, Jesus knows our past and still loves us, Jesus meets us where we are, and too many are looking for love in all the wrong places. As I look back at my own story, I realize I have a lot in common with this lady, and I have drawn my own truth from it: to know Jesus is to love Jesus.

This lady was an unlikely recipient of an encounter with Jesus, let alone His gift. Jewish men were not to be seen or to associate with Samaritan women. Samaritans were treated with prejudice and disdain because they were the product of intermarriage between Jews and Gentiles. Jewish people avoided passing through Samaria, but Jesus did not. I was also an unlikely recipient of an encounter with Jesus having been raised in a non-Christian environment and never having heard of Jesus' life and sacrifice for me. But the most striking commonality between this woman and myself is a lack of understanding, stemming from a wrong perspective.

After Jesus offers the woman "living water," she responds with these words, "Sir, give me this water, so that I will not be thirsty or have to come here to draw water" (John 4:15). She did not get it! Jesus was offering the "living water" that would completely quench her spiritual thirst and meet every need she would ever have. She was focused on her worldly, physical needs and Jesus was focused on eternity and the condition of her soul.

In 1995, I met Jesus and received His gift of eternal life. The cares and struggles of this life had broken me, and I needed to be saved. My parents had just divorced, and my own marriage was not the heavenly union I expected. This anxious, controlling woman was becoming more anxious and realizing how little control she really had. Meeting Christ was followed by three years that were riddled with heartbreak and struggle: job loss, home loss, health problems, and a child diagnosed with Autism. In 1999, I called my sister and told her that if this was life with Christ, I am out. Where was Jesus who loves me and would never leave me? How could Jesus offer me rest and peace, take control of my life, and then allow such pain? Two minutes later my brother-in-law called and said: "I do not understand." You gave your life to Christ, and now you are ready to walk away and do not even know Him." He was right. I received Christ and then continued attending my church, which was steeped in legalistic ritual and absent of any instruction on the Word of God.

I immediately enrolled in a Bible study and began to learn the truth about my Savior. I expected Jesus to end my struggles but Scripture says, "Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds" (James 1:2). He goes on to say, "For you know the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing" (James 1:2-4). I was stunned to learn that my pain was actually part of His plan and allowed for the

purpose of transforming me. These truths were only palatable when I learned His promises:

"I will never leave you nor forsake you." Hebrews 13:5

"And my God will supply every need of yours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus." Philippians 4:19

When I was led by misconceptions and half-truths about my Savior, I felt angry and abandoned. With the understanding I have received from studying His Word and walking with Him, my relationship has grown, and my love for Jesus has deepened. I love Him because He first loved me!

Trust in the Lord with all your heart, And lean not on your own understanding; In all your ways acknowledge Him, And He shall direct your paths." Proverbs 3:5-6 (NKJV)

I have had many "Aha" moments in my life when it comes to my walk with Christ. I think one of the most monumental was watching God direct my path in the ways He wanted me to go, once I finally gave in and let Him. In 2006, I was a 22-year-old newly married immature kid who did not know what I was doing with my life. I had just taken a sales job across the country and decided to move with my wife to a place where we knew no one and had no connections to any sort of church. Growing up, we were both church kids to the core. Being extremely involved in the church was a part of our everyday lives. It was who we were. Yet, even though we went to a Bible college (where we should have been spiritually thriving), we both fell out of the church kid lifestyle. Throughout college and the first year of my marriage, I began to backslide in my walk with Christ. I knew that by following my own path, I had lost my way. I knew this move to Florida was bringing me to a crossroads, and I could go one of two ways. Would I make the Christian faith my own, not just something my parents made me do as a kid? Would I make Christ the center of my life and my marriage? I knew I believed in Christ, but would I make Him Lord of my life? The simple answer was yes, of course, that is what I wanted. Yet my actions up to this point did not portray it. I knew that it was time to make a choice. As a control freak, letting God direct my steps was very difficult. I enjoyed the benefits of having Him in my life, but I still wanted that control. So here I was at the crossroads. Would I give my life to God? Would I let Him be real and active in my life?

Sierra and I looked at many houses throughout the central eastern coast of Florida and ended up settling on a little beach town called Edgewater. I would be traveling for work, so I wanted to be close to the interstate, and my southern California raised wife wanted to be close to the ocean and not too far from Disney. Edgewater seemed to be the perfect fit. When we found a house just a couple miles from the beach, Chick-Fil-A, and a really good Chinese takeout place, we were instantly sold! My wife and I committed to making church apart of our lives again, which we had let slip over our years in college and beyond. We had attended periodically, but truly getting involved in a church was not something we had done. So when we arrived in Florida, it was a commitment we decided to make. We began to acknowledge our need for God in our marriage and understood we could not do it on our own. We tried a little church down the street on our first Sunday and knew right away it was not for us. I began to get discouraged and prayed, "God I am trying to follow you, but you need to help me here. Please show us where to go and lead us to the place where you want us!" All that was left to do was trust. Wow, did He come through in answering that prayer quickly and specifically!

The following Saturday, I felt an intense and unusual urge to exercise (yes, I realize I need to get this urge more often). I started softball, and as it turned out, most of the families we had met on Sunday were on the softball team and invited us to Orlando to go to Universal Studios the following Saturday. By the end of the Universal trip, we had made ten new best friends. God instantly grew us close with our new church family, and through growing close to them, we grew in His Word and as a couple. We began serving in the student ministry, ushering, and hosting a small group. God truly directed our paths to this church. Most of the people we met there have become family and lifelong friends. I can truly say I would not be in ministry today if God had not directed my paths to that gym and then to that church.

It is amazing to see God direct our paths when we give up the control. We went into this journey not knowing what the future held, but He knew exactly what He was doing. I encourage you today to let go of your past, your failures, and your mistakes, and trust God for your future. Though you may not know what tomorrow will bring, when you place your trust in Him He will prove faithful and direct your path according to His perfect plan.

I believe these actions were not accidental. When we choose to follow Christ, it may mean we need to leave some things (or people) behind intentionally. They chose to follow Christ; they were focused.

In dealing with the "Skeletons in the Closet," there will be things we need to leave behind or strive to forget. To "forget" may be impossible. The concept is to not go back to that place in life or not to use it against someone. It is the picture of putting an IOU through a paper shredder. The debt will go unpaid, and we will press forward.

There are at least three areas where the principle to "Forget It" applies. There are feelings, emotions, thoughts, and actions we may need to put behind us.

1. Repentance

A step necessary in following Christ is to repent. It is a 180-degree turn from serving ourselves to serving Him. Part of handling our past is to "Forget It" by leaving the old lifestyle behind us.

Similar to the woman at the well is the woman described in John chapter 8. The scribes and Pharisees teamed up in framing a woman caught in adultery. They bring her to Jesus trying to catch force His hand. However, He leans down and uses His hand to write on the ground. The men leave from oldest to youngest. John 8:10-11 records what happened next, "Jesus stood up and said to her, 'Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?' She said, 'No one, Lord.' And Jesus said, 'Neither do I condemn you; go, and from now on sin no more.""

George Mueller said, "There was a day when I died; died to self, m opinions, preferences, tastes and will; died to the world, its approva or censure; died to the approval or blame even of my brethren of friends; and since then I have studied only to show myself approve unto God."

C.S. Lewis said, "We all want progress, but if you're on the wron road, progress means doing an about-turn and walking back to th right road; in that case, the man who turns back soonest is the most

progressive."

2. Forgive yourself

A second part of handling our past is to "Forget It" by forgiving our self. Grief, remorse, and regret have defeated too many people. Our past does not have to hold us back.

For many or even most people, forgiving yourself is harder than forgiving others. It may be due to our pride.

Paul (a.k.a. Saul, the murderer) must have struggled with his past. Before he could fully follow Christ and impact others for the Lord, he needed to forgive himself. In Philippians 3:13 Paul said, "Brothers, I do not consider that I have made it my own. But one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead."

Leo Buscaglia said, "Love yourself - accept yourself - forgive yourself - and be good to yourself, because without you the rest of us are without a source of many wonderful things."

3. Forgive others

A third part of handling our past is to "Forget It" by forgiving others. Bitterness can consume us. We should not give others the power to hold us back. We need to forgive them, trust God, and renew our minds.

Colossians 3:12-14 says, "Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony."

ew people know who Ron Popeil is. Few people would know he founded the company RonCo. However, if I told you that Ron Popeil coined one of the most famous phrases in infomercial history you might realize about whom I am talking. The Showtime Rotisserie is one of the most popular infomercial items, not because of the product, but because of Ron's catchphrase, "Set it and forget it." I have always loved watching all types of infomercials of items. I know that I will never buy any of these items, but I have been watching infomercials for years. I cannot say for sure why but there has always been something about that phrase that has always stuck with me.

We all have a past. You do not have to have a failed marriage, drug or alcohol abuse, or estranged children to have a past. From the person who has been clean for three months, to the person who was in church the first Sunday they were out of the hospital, we all have skeletons in our closets. I grew up in a mess of a family where my wife grew up in a pretty godly and functional house, and we both have skeletons in our closets. Today, I want to encourage you to come to peace with the brokenness of life. The reality is sin is still triumphing over people's lives, the prince of the power of the air (Ephesians 2:2) is still wreaking havoc in our world. Life is hard, and there is some serious hurt out in the stories of all who are reading this. We live in a world that tells us to cover up the hurt, hide the imperfections, and only project that Instagram worthy selfie to the world. If you are someone who has some serious hurts in your life, know that every staff member is here to help pray with you, and we would all love helping you find Jesus in your pain. Today, I want to encourage you to set it and forget it.

Clearly, an infomercial has no real power in our world to change someone's life, but the Word of God does. Colossians 3:1-2 says, "If then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth." While the target market for most people who read devotionals is most likely those who have been redeemed and saved by putting their faith in Jesus Christ and the work He did for us by dying on a cross for our sins, sometimes we may overlook this. The first part of the verse in Colossians is "if then you have been raised with Christ." If you have not been born again, please take some time to do that. If you have any question about that, feel free to call The River Church's offices. But for those of us who believe in Jesus, we are told to "set your mind on things that are above." It took me a long time to realize that God has always had a purpose for every pain I ever experienced. hat do you think of when you hear the term, "Skeletons in the Closet?" For me, that term speaks of things in my past that are hidden away, things I am not proud of, and things that remind me of scary and ugly times in the past. It is those things that still trouble me, and I do not want others to know about them.

In John chapter 4, we read of a divine encounter a woman of Samaria had with Jesus. While Jews routinely went around Samaria to get to and from Jerusalem because Samaritans were half-breeds and considered unclean, John tells us Jesus had to go through Samaria. He waited by the city well for her to come and draw water. She did not come first thing in the morning with the rest of the women because she had a bad reputation, and she was ashamed of her past. However, Jesus knew all about her life and still wanted to meet with her and reveal to her who He was, and what He could do for her to overcome her past life. After meeting with Jesus her life was changed, and she could not wait to share with others that He was the promised Messiah and tell what He had done for her.

God used a woman who was married and divorced five times, and she was now living with a man. This showed me that in spite of my past and some of the ugly, sinful things I have done, God still loves me and can use me if I surrender my life to Him. Even though I have been a Christian for over six decades, I still struggle at times to do what I know is right. I am encouraged by what Paul wrote in Philippians 3:12-14, "Not that I have already obtained this or am already perfect, but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me His own. Brothers, I do not consider

that I have made it my own. But one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus."

Paul forgot his ugly, sinful past, and surrendered his life to Christ and committed himself to do what God wanted him to do. He forgot his past and strained to do what God had for him in the future so that he could realize the "prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus." If he had not done this, he would not have been able to do the work Christ had for him.

Paul is not the only one. Consider the failure of Peter and the other disciples who abandoned Jesus in the garden when the crowd came to arrest Him and demand His death. They had to forget this failure in order to do what Jesus commanded them to do after His resurrection – to take the Gospel everywhere (Matthew 28:16-20).

In the Old Testament we read over and over again how those who loved God, fell into temptation and sinned, and when they repented were used greatly by God to fulfill His purposes – Abraham, Moses, Samson, David, and Jonah.

I am reminded of the chorus I learned as a child:

You ask me why I'm happy, well I'll just tell you why, It's because my sins are gone.

And when I meet the scoffers who ask me where they are, I say my sins are gone.

They're underneath the blood on the cross of Calvary, As far removed as darkness is from dawn.

In the sea of God's forgetfulness that's good enough for me, Praise God-my sins are gone! Like the Apostle Paul, forget the skeletons in your closet and strain forward for what God has for you to do. When Satan reminds you of your past, remind him of his future. We have victory in Jesus, our Savior forever.

John chapter 4 tells of the encounter Jesus had with a Samaritan woman at a well. Each day she would come to the well after everyone else had left. She walked around in great shame and condemnation, considered an outcast not only by the Jews but by her own people. She was known around town as the woman who had many husbands and was currently living with a man unmarried. On this particular day, Jesus was sitting at the well when she arrived. He purposely struck up a conversation with this Samaritan woman, which is something a Jew would never do. He began to speak life to her as He revealed everything she had ever done.

Every day she went to the "well" of the world trying to find something or someone to quench her emotional and physical thirst. As she lowered her bucket down into the well, He explained to her that the water she was drawing would not satisfy and how she needs to taste the Living Water only He can give. Meaning, Jesus is the Living Water, and only He can completely meet her needs so that she will never have to go back to her old "well." She instantly recognized that He must be the Christ, the One for whom they were waiting. She excitedly, ran off to tell the others of her encounter with Jesus. An interesting observation, as she ran off in her new found freedom and forgiveness, she left her bucket of cares and sins at the well with Jesus. That is exactly what He wants us to do with our past.

Paul tells us in Philippians 3:13 (NKJV), "Brethren, I do not count myself to have apprehended; but one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forward to those things which are ahead." The Apostle Paul is another excellent example of

the importance of forgetting a terrible past. We cannot arrive where God wants to take us when we continue to look behind us with an often distorted and condemning view of the past. Even the side view mirror on our vehicles remind us that things behind us are deceiving and distorted. What we choose to focus on determines the trajectory of our lives. Jesus does not want us to look behind us because we are not going that way! It will only slow us down and keep us from being an effective member of the body of Christ. That is why we are instructed to take every thought captive to the obedience of Christ (2 Corinthians 10:5).

Like the Samaritan woman and the Apostle Paul, once we are forgiven of our sins, we are no longer identified by our past. The next time the enemy tries to remind you of your past, remind him of who you are in Christ. You are chosen, loved, adopted, forgiven, and joint heirs with Jesus. The former things have passed away, and all things are becoming new!

Isaiah 43:18-19 says, "Remember not the former things, nor consider the things of old. Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert."

The woman at the well had an entangled history. It held her back or kept her on the outside. However, her strides of spiritual growth were quick and could go unnoticed.

John 4:39-42 says, "Many Samaritans from that town believed in him because of the woman's testimony, 'He told me all that I ever did.' So when the Samaritans came to him, they asked him to stay with them, and he stayed there two days. And many more believed because of his word. They said to the woman, 'It is no longer because of what you said that we believe, for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is indeed the Savior of the world.'"

Jesus took her back and reinforced some of her Bible knowledge. She knew of Jacob, Joseph, and the coming Messiah. He took her back to what she had learned and built on it. He took her from prophecy to fulfillment in just minutes. The Messiah was standing in front of her.

I imagine that they talked again during those two days. I believe she had many regrets and sorrows, but I believe Jesus forgave her past, helped her plan for the future, and took time to celebrate the changes that were already taking place.

Alcoholic's Anonymous has milestone medallions they use to remind themselves and each other how far they have come. It is a form of celebration. It is good to celebrate one day, week, month, year, and decade. The same should be done spiritually. Instead of focusing on five failed marriages and a life of sin, the woman at the well needed to evaluate and dedicate each day to the Lord intentionally. She was not falling back or standing still. She was moving forward. Her only "competition" was herself. She needed and wanted to grow.

I do not mean to focus on what we have done in our own strength. I want us to remember how far God has brought us. I want us to realize how our work and walk in faith has grown. I am not a self-made man; I am a God-made-man who is growing in the Lord because of the Lord.

I am reminded of other times in Scripture when viewing the past; it was good to "Remember It."

1. Paul and Timothy

Paul challenged Timothy to remember his spiritual heritage. Timothy was blessed to have a godly mother and grandmother. Nothing is said about dad or his grandfather, but Paul was not encouraging a pity party. He reminded him of God's work in the past to prepare him for this moment.

In 2 Timothy 1:3-7, Paul says, "I thank God whom I serve, as did my ancestors, with a clear conscience, as I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. As I remember your tears, I long to see you, that I may be filled with joy. I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that dwelt first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, dwells in you as well. For this reason I remind you to fan into flame the gift of God, which is in you through the laying on of my hands, for God gave us a spirit not of fear but of power and love and self-control."

Before Paul reminds Timothy of his godly heritage, he takes a moment and looks at his own family line. He thanks God for the faith of his ancestors. This might catch us off guard at first as we know Paul (a murderer formerly known as Saul) had to have a radical conversion in his faith. That was not the fault of his parents.

He was raised knowing of God and the coming Messiah. He chose not to accept Jesus as the Messiah until later in life. He may have encountered Jesus during His earthly ministry, but he hardened his heart and became angry, bitter, and hateful.

Paul had spiritual ancestors. Timothy had a godly heritage. It was good for them to look back and remember it.

2. David

David reminded himself of God's faithfulness. David was the youngest of eight boys. He would surely have had enough hand-medowns. He was the forgotten one. When Samuel came to the house of Jesse to anoint the next King of Israel, they had to be reminded of the youngest son, the boy in the fields, David.

I think there are times when we subconsciously transfer the Jacob and Joseph relationship to Jesse and David. There is no record in Scripture of David being Jesse's pride and joy. David was not given a "sling of many colors." If a prophet had come to Jacob's house to pay homage to one of his sons, he would have paraded out Joseph in front of his older brothers. This was not the case with David. He was not a despised "red-headed stepchild," nor was he the prince (or even king) of his father's heart.

In 1 Samuel chapter 17, Jesse sends David to his older brothers with supplies, encouraging words, and as a messenger to see how things are progressing. His brothers are not happy to see him. At this point, Goliath roared. David was appalled. He went to Saul as he recounted of his past. In 1 Samuel 17:33-37, we read, "And Saul said to David, 'You are not able to go against this Philistine to fight with him, for you are but a youth, and he has been a man of war from his youth.' But David said to Saul, 'Your servant used to keep sheep for his father. And when there came a lion, or a bear, and took a lamb from the flock, I went after him and struck him and delivered it out of his mouth. And if he arose against me, I caught him by his beard and struck him and killed him. Your servant has struck down both lions and bears, and this uncircumcised Philistine shall be like one of them, for he has defied the armies of the living God.' And David said, 'The Lord who delivered me from the paw of the lion and from the paw of the bear will deliver me from the hand of this Philistine.' And Saul said to David, 'Go, and the Lord be with you!'" David downed both lions and bears. Yes, he used the plural form of the words. He remembered how God used him in the past and it gave him the courage and faith to face his giants.

The Samaritan woman's testimony is summarized with these simple words. Her life had been one of sexual sin and immorality, causing her to stay away from people and most likely having been ostracized from the women of the town (indicated by her choice to come to the well at the warmer, less busy part of the day). Once she had met Jesus, she was set free from her sin. Her shame was transformed into a claim to the grace of God. Her sin, which was well known, became the very proof that God can save and transform the most disgraced sinner.

I ponder the idea of meeting someone who could tell me everything I have ever done, and frankly, I want to stay away from that person. That is the power of guilt and shame. Jesus, of course, knows everything we have done and proved that in succinct detail to the woman at the well. It was essential for this women to confront the reality and depth of her sin before she could receive the mercy and grace of God.

Our past sins or former life away from Christ are not meant to be a source of jokes, worldly badges of honor, or bizarre spiritual "one-upman-ship" conversations. Yet, throughout Scripture, we are told to "Remember." It is not for the purpose of leading us into temptation or plunging into despair brought on by guilt, but for the express purpose of finding ourselves in awe of God's grace. When we remember the grossness of our sin, we see the love of God in a more, clear light (John 3:16), we feel greater gratitude for the suffering of Christ on the

cross of Calvary (Romans 5:8), and we realize how far God's mercy has carried us (Titus 3:3-7).

But if I am by myself in the car, you can just go ahead and call me Mariah Carey). I have been singing this song since I was a child, and the words are so good and so true, but if I am honest, I tend to pay more attention to my fun, soulful singing than to what is actually being sung. Amazing is the grace that saved a wretch like me. Am I a wretch? A quick trip to the dictionary tells me that a wretch is a miserable, despicable, or contemptible person. am an extreme guy. It is not in the sense that I am into skydiving while riding a bull, while drinking a Red Bull and shooting off shotguns, while listening to rock metal. That would be an awesome experience, but I am the type of person when I do something, I do it to the umpteenth level. I do not like going half in on something. I do not ride the fence. If I am going to do something, I am all in 100%. If it is getting in shape, cutting sin out of my life, or simple lifestyle changes, there is seldom a middle ground.

If you would like to get the full depth of God's Word, take a moment and read Joshua chapters seven and eight. The quick version of the story has the nation of Israel being lead by Joshua into the Promised Land. God is with them, and the nation of Israel is taking down city after city. God's people just took down Jericho, a major enemy city, and were gaining momentum, moving closer to their God-given direction. The nation of Israel then hit a snag in a battle that should have been a walk in the park. They had 36 men die in the battle at Ai that should have been one-sided. The worst part of this defeat was the reason why Israel lost. The loss was attributed to one man's sin. The Bible says, "The hearts of the people melted and became as water" (Joshua 7:5.) Joshua and the whole nation of Israel had not experienced defeat since entering Canaan. Joshua has friends, family, and loved ones in pain because of this defeat.

The loss at Ai is one of Joshua's defining moments in his life. Joshua exhibited amazing leadership and confronted the sin that was in the camp. He got rid of that sin. After he went back, he went forward and defeated Ai. These are the parts of the Bible I love the most. They are parts that make you stop and think, "Well then."

Joshua 8:28-30 tells us what Joshua did when he went back, and God gave him the victory. "So Joshua burned Ai and made it forever a heap of ruins, as it is to this day. And he hanged the king of Ai on a tree until evening. And at sunset Joshua commanded, and they took his body down from the tree and threw it at the entrance of the gate of the city and raised over it a great heap of stones, which stands there to this day. At that time Joshua built an altar to the Lord, the God of Israel, on Mount Ebal,"

While Joshua led his troops into defeat. He had blood on his hands because he was the leader. Leadership evokes a heavy price to pay, but Joshua dealt with the sin. He absolutely destroyed the obstacle in his way from what God had for him. Joshua was not leaving the dead body to be morbid or vicious; He was doing it to show his people that setbacks cannot deter you from moving forward with God.

I think, Joshua built an altar of remembrance after the victory in Ai for two reasons. The first was to make sure that his people always remembered the heavy cost sin has in our lives. There were 36 people who died for a few pounds of silver. Going against God's Word should never be tolerated. We must remember and store what God has said to us. The second reason for an altar was so Joshua could use the defeat at Ai to bring people back to God's faithfulness. Joshua 8:34 says, "And afterward he read all the words of the law, the blessing and the curse, according to all that is written in the Book of the Law." Joshua's defeat only pushed him closer to remembering how God was faithful to them through Egypt, the wilderness, and now Canaan. Joshua wanted to make sure he took an extreme measure to ensure that no one would ever forget the cost for which they were fighting. Joshua took an extreme stance to make sure every person he knew was able to use this defeat to magnify Joshua's amazing God.

Remember the "defeats" of your past, so you do not repeat them and to remind you of God's faithfulness.

am a fan of statues. I have visited the Statue of Liberty and the Statue of David in Florence, Italy. Seeing the Christ the Redeemer statue of Jesus Christ in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil is on my bucket list. I enjoy the Rocky statue in Philadelphia and feel a connection with the Fist of Joe Louis in Detroit. I would be remiss not to mention the Spirit of Detroit.

I like learning about the history or intricate details of a statue. There are a number of statues in Gettysburg that have war heroes riding horses. It is taught that the number of hooves the horse has off the ground has meaning. If all four hooves were on the ground, the soldier died in peace. If one hoof was raised, he was wounded in battle but lived, and if two hooves were raised, he died in battle or as a result of his wounds. Statues can reveal more than we first notice.

f a statue was made of you, how would you want to be portrayed?

The foundation of a statue can also be of interest. Not only does it need to be strong enough, but it can also bring significance and meaning. The World War II memorial of Raising the Flag on Iwo Jima invokes pride in a foundation of freedom.

Skeletons in the Closet has focused on what to do about your past. We all have a past, and it still affects (for good and bad) us today. We have already seen how we need to define it, forget it, and remember it. Now it is time to stand on it. We need to step up and stand on the foundation (our story) that has brought us to this point in our life.

So much has been learned from the woman at the well. The story concludes in John 4:39-42, "Many Samaritans from that town

believed in him because of the woman's testimony, 'He told me all that I ever did.' So when the Samaritans came to him, they asked him to stay with them, and he stayed there two days. And many more believed because of his word. They said to the woman, 'It is no longer because of what you said that we believe, for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is indeed the Savior of the world.'"

The woman at the well used her story, and many came to know the Lord personally. Paul tells Titus that we actually all have a similar story. Titus 3:3-8 says, "For we ourselves were once foolish, disobedient, led astray, slaves to various passions and pleasures, passing our days in malice and envy, hated by others and hating one another. But when the goodness and loving kindness of God our Savior appeared, he saved us, not because of works done by us in righteousness, but according to his own mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewal of the Holy Spirit, whom he poured out on us richly through Jesus Christ our Savior, so that being justified by his grace we might become heirs according to the hope of eternal life. The saying is trustworthy, and I want you to insist on these things, so that those who have believed in God may be careful to devote themselves to good works. These things are excellent and profitable for people."


John chapter 9 gives another story. The man born blind said it so well, "He answered, 'Whether he is a sinner I do not know. One thing I do know, that though I was blind, now I see'" (John 9:25). That was his story. The Pharisees wanted to argue with him, but it was his story. Ironically, the only one who spiritually could see was the man born blind. Everyone else focused on him and did not see the Messiah walking right by them. I wonder, if the man was not born blind would he have ever "seen" Jesus?

In Galatians 1:13-17, Paul tells his story, "For you have heard of my former life in Judaism, how I persecuted the church of God violently and tried to destroy it. And I was advancing in Judaism beyond many of my own age among my people, so extremely zealous was I for the traditions of my fathers. But when he who had set me apart before I was born, and who called me by his grace, was pleased to reveal his Son to me, in order that I might preach him among the Gentiles, I did not immediately consult with anyone; nor did I go up to Jerusalem to those who were apostles before me, but I went away into Arabia, and returned again to Damascus."

hen I was a Student Pastor, I said, "It was my fault, I have failed to set that expectation as your leader. I apologize." Go find any students I had in Student Leadership and ask them about that statement. They will cringe. Over the last three years, I started doing a Student Leadership class meant to help push high school and middle school students to be leaders for Christ in their homes, schools, and church. Every once in a while, expectations are not met with doing homework, inviting students to events, attendance, and other factors. In one of my favorite leadership books, a retired Navy Seal says, "Leaders must own everything in their world. There is no one else to blame." I realized that blaming students for things was not teaching them or myself any type of lesson. I realized that any shortcoming that came from this group was on the leader, myself. Now, when I would say this it was not in a passive-aggressive, "whoa is me" move, I genuinely realized that the only person I had the right to put the blame on was myself. What came to pass was something that I did not expect. The students who bought into what we were trying to accomplish in Leadership drew closer to me and wanted to work harder to set the bar that we were trying to establish with Leadership.

In life, I feel I have been able to connect with more people in my shortcomings and my weaknesses than my strengths. I have taught many Growth Communities with adults, and I realize when I say, "Man I suck at being a husband" or "I struggle keeping my patience with my two boys," is the moment more people are drawn closer together. People connect with people because of weaknesses more often than strengths. I love the story in John chapter four, and I have tried to

figure out how this uneducated, unsophisticated, unrefined woman was used in such an extraordinary way. We can conclude that it was because Jesus wanted to be her (and our) answer. However, I feel there is more. In John 4:29 the lady at the well says one of the most vulnerable and yet powerful statements out of anyone who has come into contact with Jesus. "Come, see a man who told me all that I ever did. Can this be the Christ?" Jesus called this woman out for the darkest part of herself, and after accepting that Jesus was the Christ, she began proclaiming to the town that Jesus knew all her issues. Why do I think that she was able to connect with her town so well in the name of Jesus? I think the woman finally was owning her brokenness and letting God do something with it.

Too often I see believers walking around with brokenness without ever truly giving it to Jesus. We get called out and convicted by the issues of our past, and we never truly give it to Jesus. We just walk around broken. We as believers need to take ownership of our lives and give our brokenness to God and let Him use it to help others. Often we like to own our mistakes and never give them to the real leader who can do something about our issues. Imagine a world where the church stopped walking around acting like we have everything all together and looked at a broken co-worker and talked about our struggles with our marriages, children, or other things. The Church is meant to be there loving those far from God, and yet we struggle with being honest with our fellow brothers and sisters in Christ that we have pain and problems. We have to get to a place where we are owning our testimonies and admitting the good, the bad, and the ugly. Being open with your testimony is hard, but imagine what God can do with your story if you are willing to stand on what God has done with your life.

There once was a foolish man who built his house on the sand. The rain fell, the floods came, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell, and great was the fall of it. Why? It is because it did not hear or do the words of the Lord (Matthew 7:24-27). As Jesus spoke these words to his hearers along the shores of the Galilean Sea, it was an obvious picture to His listeners. Of course, why would anyone build a house on the sand? The sand will only erode when the winds and the rains come. But Jesus wanted the people to look much deeper into their souls. He wanted them, as well as you and I, to see where or upon what we are building our houses (our lives).

Yes, this world will be stormy and will make us feel like we have just been physically beaten up at times. However, where you and I have built our foundation is vital for our house to keep standing during these storms of life. Jesus told the listeners that it was a wise person who built upon they rock. That rock is Jesus. Everything that appears like a rock is false. This world we live in has many temporal and shaky foundations. They may appear to be stable, when in fact, they are just a pile of sand. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. Do not be led away by diverse and strange teachings (Hebrews 13:8-9). It is completely foolish (I am not calling you this, God's Word is using this description) to trust in or build upon anything but the rock, Christ Jesus.

The woman at the well had tried so many avenues in her life to try and find stability. She even tried people hoping they were the answer to her incompleteness and instability. I had a woman tell me that her husband was her rock. Her statement scared me for her. People are mortal and sinful. If you or anyone are trusting in a person to be their stability or rock, they will be disappointed and will keep looking because they will fail you. Hebrews 13:5-6 says, "'I will never leave you nor forsake you.' So you can confidently say, The Lord is my helper; I will not fear; what can man do to me?" The woman at the well had an encounter that day with the true rock. She realized that everything in her life that she built upon continually crashed around her. It was not the people in her life; it was not the things she wore or the home decor. This is a big one for many; it was not even her children or grandchildren. She realized that everything in her life was temporary and she was standing before the eternal rock, Christ Jesus!

On what are you personally building your foundation? Are you like the woman at the well that has tried basically everything in this world to be satisfied and complete? Have you ever had a personal encounter with Jesus? It does not have to be at a well. It can be right where you are right now. Religion has told people that they have to "clean up" before they can come to God, which is not true. He waited for the woman to come to the well. He knew she was coming. He is waiting for you. She left the well with a firm foundation. She no longer was on a path of sinking sand because she was standing on the rock, Jesus. Many Samaritans from that town believed in Him (Jesus) because of the woman's testimony (John 4: 36).

She may have had many skeletons in her closet. What did she do with those? What are you supposed to do with them? I am pretty sure skeletons are dead! The moment you trusted Christ as your Savior, your past and present sins are forgiven. Psalm 103:12 says,

So, the next time you hear those skeleton bones rattling in your heart and mind, stand on the promises of God and throw a dog a bone!

n January 1, 1997, I asked Laura Dubey to be my girlfriend. I was a 17-year-old junior in high school. She was a 14-year-old freshman. On June 4, 2004, we married. If you are quick with your math, you added it up to a seven and one half year dating relationship. You may first say that is cute that I married my high school sweetheart. You may view that as something special. I will also say those things, but as a fifteen plus year vet in youth ministry, and a guy who regularly says that a long-term specific dating relationship in high school is stupid, this serves as a problem.

As a Youth Pastor for that many years, I have found disaster in long-term dating. Whether Christian or non-Christian, it usually (almost always) brings a sinful carnage of hurt and scars. Every year I would take a month and teach on student dating. I would teach what the Bible says and does not say (1 Thessalonians chapter 4, 1 Corinthians 6:18, and Ephesians 5:3 are a good place to start). The questions then would always be asked, well what did you do?

If so, how do we deal with this? First, I think it is okay to share our weakness. I do not have to pretend I am perfect. I do not have to pretend that I always did things God's way. Too many times the Church looks like a place where we cannot show any weakness. I am thankful that God, even through things that are dangerous, protects and guides. I do believe the Word (Romans 8:28) that God uses all things together for good to those who love the Lord.

As I give people my story, I always point them to the Word. In Titus 2:11-12 we read, "For the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation for all people, training us to renounce ungodliness and worldly passions, and to live self-controlled, upright, and godly lives in the present age."




I believe I can use my story to point people to Jesus. But I also believe if they do not find the truth in His Word and how He tells us to live, they will not find Jesus.


I have heard people say I would not change my story one bit. I would agree with that, but I would also say, "It is my story, not yours. Live your life to follow Jesus."


