

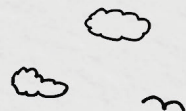


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PREFACE

LESSON ONE

Government

As we begin our new series on God's authority, we are going to begin with our government. However, before we begin, let us remember first and foremost who we are - followers of Jesus Christ. Therefore, as we get into some potentially political discussions, let us remember that we are all in this together and as Paul reminds us in Galatians 3:28, ***"There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is no male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus."*** We are one in Jesus Christ, yes we have differing opinions and that is okay and I am thankful we do! Yet, the most important thing to remember at the end of the day is the truth that we are all in this together and we are on the same team, Jesus' team!

January 20, 2009, is a day I will never forget. I was a junior in high school and had the privilege to go on a junior-senior trip to Washington D.C. That morning, all of us students and teachers left the hotel at 4:00 am! Looking back now, waking up at 4 is not as difficult as it was then. Yet, as we all woke up and gathered our necessities for the day, we left the hotel and headed for the subway. When we were about a mile out from the Washington Monument and the Capitol, all the subway trains were shut down and we had to walk to get to the National Mall. As we were walking down the street, I was amazed to see military personal, hummers, and even a tank on the streets to patrol and contain traffic. Once we finally arrived at the National Mall, as a group we were about halfway between the Washington Monument and the Capital building. For the next several hours we waited and tried to keep warm, as history was about to be made before our eyes. Before long, the soon-to-be 44th President of the United States was sworn in on the stage.

For me, there is a bit of irony as I write this study guide. At the moment, I am sitting in the gym of our Holly location, as we are handing out food and resources for those in need, while we are in week two of the Covid-19 lockdown! Yet, seeing Barack Obama inaugurated as the 44th President of the United States was truly a privilege for me. Sure, I may not have agreed with all that he said or the decisions he made; regardless he was our President and that deserves respect.

As we open to the book of Romans, Paul does a fantastic job of communicating the mind-set and giving understanding as to our response and attitude towards those in governing authority. Beginning in Romans 13:1-2 Paul writes, ***“Let every person be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God. Therefore whoever resists the authorities resists what God has appointed, and those who resist will incur judgment.”***

I love Paul's boldness as he writes what God has put on his heart. We read that there is no room for the discrepancy on who is subject to governing authority - everyone! But Paul takes it a step further. He knows, and really God knows since He is the one who commissioned Paul to write about this, that we are going to question man's authority or who we have voted into power. Yet, the second half of verse one tells us who put our governing authority in place, God.

3. What is the “therefore” in verse two, there for?

4. Can you share a story from God's Word about someone who was disobedient to God's authority?

Ever since Genesis, the beginning of the world, there has been a battle between obedience and disobedience to God's authority. We know that in Genesis chapter 3 we have what is referred to as "The Fall." It is a moment in our history, as a world and a people, that forever changed the world. It was more severe and had more ramifications than any other event in history. We were separated from God and forced to live a life apart from His presence. Yet, because of what happened thousands of years ago in the garden, the world was given a chance at reconciliation and redemption through Jesus Christ. Therefore, upon confessing and believing Jesus as our Savior and Redeemer, we are called to a life of obedience to the Father. It is through this lens of obedience that we must view those in governing authority, as it is honoring to God.

Now, I want to look at another passage with that view and understanding of obedience in mind. In 1 Peter 2:13-17, we read, ***"Be subject for the Lord's sake to every human institution, whether it be to the emperor as supreme, or to governors as sent by him to punish those who do evil and to praise those who do good. For this is the will of God, that by doing good you should put to silence the ignorance of foolish people. Live as people who are free, not using your freedom as a cover-up for evil, but living as servants of God. Honor everyone. Love the brotherhood. Fear God. Honor the emperor."*** Here, Peter reiterates the same teaching and understand as Paul in Romans chapter 13, yet he is more blunt and to the point.

6. Who is the one authority we are called to fear?

At the end of verse sixteen, Peter makes the statement, ***“but living as servants of God.”*** If you do not get anything else from this lesson, please hear this. The reason that we honor and respect every human institution and governing authority that is in place is ultimately to show the world that we are different. Further in this passage, Peter writes in 1 Peter 2:21, ***“For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you might follow in his steps.”*** You see, by showing respect and honor, we are showing love and being an example of Jesus Christ. Yes, it will be difficult at times to show honor and respect. Yes, we will disagree and if we ask our brothers and sisters in Christ, around us it is safe to say that we have all disagreed with some governing authority at some point! However, we are ultimately called to obedience to our Heavenly Father and to live as an example of Jesus.

Paul wraps up this topic in Romans 13:5-7 writing, ***“Therefore one must be in subjection, not only to avoid God’s wrath but also for the sake of conscience. For because of this you also pay taxes, for the authorities are ministers of God, attending to this very thing. Pay to all what is owed to them: taxes to whom taxes are owed, revenue to whom revenue is owed, respect to whom respect is owed, honor to whom honor is owed.”***

8. Is there someone in authority who you have not shown respect and honor to, whom you need to change your attitude toward or with them?

Talking about the government is not an easy subject. I have had many debates and discussions with family, let alone friends and co-workers. Regardless of whether you are red, blue, green, or whatever color you may lean to on the political field, I hope you remember to have the proper lens.

He has given us His Spirit to mold and shape us into becoming more like Him. It is not always an easy process. We have to die to ourselves daily and deny the flesh. That means that we need to actively fight against our own selfish desires





and walk in the way Jesus calls us to walk. With this being said, 1 Peter 2:17 tells us, ***“Honor everyone. Love the brotherhood. Fear God. Honor the emperor.”*** I want to take a special focus on the last sentence. Not only are we to honor and love everyone, but we are also commanded to honor our political leaders. It does not say to honor only the leaders who we agree with, or even only the leaders who we deem to be “good people.” You can think what you want about our current president or the presidents in the past, but none of them hold a candle to the leader Peter was referring to here in his letter. The emperor at this time was one of the most wicked and evil tyrants in history - Emperor Nero. The man persecuted and murdered thousands, including his own mother! He threw people to lions for entertainment. He dipped Christians in wax, impaled them on poles, and lit them on fire to form human torches. This man was pure evil and yet Peter told Christians to honor him.

How can we as believers honor the leader of our country, even the ones we do not like or disagree with? Paul reminds us in Romans chapter 13 that God is the one with full and complete authority and is the One who puts kings and political leaders in their places. Even though we might not understand why, we can trust that God knows what He is doing and is in control. Since God has put our president in office, we should not only speak of him respectfully but we should focus our energy on praying for him. In 1 Timothy 2:1-3 we read, ***“That supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way. This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior.”*** We please the Lord when we honor and pray for our leaders.

Giving honor to the President does not mean that we have to like him, agree with everything he says and does, or that we should not

Speak out for what is right. It does not even mean we cannot express and expose what is wrong. However, we should do so with honor and respect, trusting God and praying for the authority He has set up. We should honor the President because we fear and love the Lord. We should let Him work out the rest!





POLICE

GOVERNMENT, DEVOTION 2

“And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise.” Deuteronomy 6:6-7

Growing up in the 1960's, there were many shows on TV demonstrating how cool it was to be a policeman. Held in high regard and given respect by most people, the police were to be looked up to. Having an uncle on the sheriff's department made it even more impressive to a young boy. When visiting, he would show us some of the tools a police officer would use in the line of duty. During the social unrest of 1967, my uncle would stop by the house just to let us know everything would be all right.

Years later, my cousin would also join the sheriff's department and continue the family line in law enforcement. With family and friends in the department, I was taught to have high respect for those who put on the uniform. As a society, we knew that they were there to protect and defend us. However, as the 1960's gave way to the 1970's, we saw a gradual shift in how society would view the police. As a boy, I was told to address police officers as sir, not as another three-letter reference. I was taught to obey and respect those who wore the uniform. We now see a general disregard for those we now call “cops.” I am writing this only to make a point of how far we have moved away from honoring and respecting the law. In many ways, we have made the police “RoboCops” instead of “peacemakers,” taking away their ability to make a sound judgment. Yet, in Matthew





5:9, it becomes very apparent how God feels about those who keep the peace.

Today, we no longer see the police as peacemakers, but rather as adversaries. In our society, we battle them every chance we can. We neither believe their testimony nor do we trust them. We use video as a negative narrative while giving limited background to the whole story. We have been taught to disdain all that they stand for, and all that they do. In less than my lifetime, I have seen one of the most respected professions become one of the least. We have decided we will disregard all authority without the judgment that comes with it. This is in direct conflict of God's Word.

Romans 13:2 says, ***“Therefore whoever resists the authorities resists what God has appointed, and those who resist will incur judgment.”***

So why have we come to a place of dislike and hatred for those who would lay down their life for us? Knowing every morning that this might be their last, they willfully put on the uniform. Leaving behind their family and those who love them, they protect someone they have never met. With no expectation of gratitude or promotion, they do their duty. If we search our hearts, it does not take long to realize where this societal disobedience gets its origin. Our hearts, sinful and broken, provide the perfect road to prideful disrespect. Delivering on the first chance to defend ourselves, we can default to our most debased form. The very pride that brings us to disdain the authorities also brings us to willful neglect of God's Law. We want what we want, and are not satisfied until we get it. Even as Christians, we will dismiss the authority with which we do not agree. When legislation does not go our way, we are quick to say we are being persecuted for our faith and become indignant. Sometimes, it is to the point of lawlessness. This is pride, pure and simple. So,

before being quick to judge those who have authority, remember the Lord appointed that person or persons in a place of leadership over you. He and He alone has the wisdom and omnipotence to put in place those He needs to reveal His glory. I realize this can be hard, but we must have faith that God knows what He is doing. He has put them in place so we can have law and order. Remember, God is not a God of confusion, but of peace (1 Corinthians 14:33).

One day, society will realize that God's omniscience superseded our desires, and He blessed us with certain individuals to protect and serve our community. Let us not forget, sometimes with their very own life.

John 15:13 adds, ***“Greater love has no one than this, that someone lay down his life for his friends.”***





THE WILL OF GOD

For this is the will of God, that by doing good you should put to silence the ignorance of foolish people. Live as people who are free, not using your freedom as a cover-up for evil, but living as servants of God. Honor everyone. Love the brotherhood. Fear God. Honor the emperor.” 1 Peter 2:13-17

They are to bring you up in a way that is pleasing to the Lord. You are to obey them, for it is a commandment from God. Our first responsibility is to God. We are to obey and respect Him. Our second responsibility is to obey our parents - but it does not stop there.

It is the will of God to obey our government. We are asked to submit to those who hold a higher place of authority. Important examples of this would include the president of your country and the governor





of the state in which you live. If God places an individual into an authoritative role, we are to listen to their instruction. Now, if an individual that we are under the authority of implements laws that contradict what we have been instructed by God to do, that is a different story.

In 1 Peter 2:17, we are told to honor everyone, but we are also told to fear God. God comes first in our lives. He should be loved and feared, out of respect and submission. He is all-knowing and all-powerful. We should fear to dishonor Him. If we are honoring those who are in a place of authority, and they do not contradict what God commands, then we are honoring God.

Strive to honor God. Be obedient to Him, as well as those He has sent.

TAXES AND US

GOVERNMENT, DEVOTION 4

“Let every soul be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and the authorities that exist are appointed by God. Therefore, whoever resists the authority resists the ordinance of God, and those who resist will bring judgment on themselves.” Romans 13:1–2 (NKJV)

In these verses, the Apostle Paul describes to the Christians in Rome just how people and governing bodies are to coexist. People are to respect governing bodies by submitting to their authority, mainly because God has placed them there, and secondly by resisting governing authority, a person would bring judgment on themselves.

While there will always be a large variety of topics that the government and people do not agree upon, one of the greatest tensions between people and government, is taxes. For centuries, the government has collected taxes to pay for a variety of services. However, corrupt officials, misappropriated funds, and ineffective programs have created mistrust among people and a reluctance to honestly file their taxes or to even pay them at all.

Even in Jesus' day, there was anxiety between the Roman government and the people regarding tax monies to be collected. The following Scripture records the Pharisees and Herodians approaching Jesus in an attempt to trick Him up by asking a tax question.

Matthew 22:17–21 says, ***“Tell us, then, what you think. Is it lawful to pay taxes to Caesar, or not?” But Jesus, aware of their malice, said, ‘Why put me to the test, you hypocrites? Show***





me the coin for the tax.’ And they brought him a denarius. And Jesus said to them, ‘Whose likeness and inscription is this?’ They said, ‘Caesar’s.’ Then he said to them, ‘Therefore render to Caesar the things that are Caesar’s, and to God the things that are God’s.’”

We often quote Jesus when talking about taxes by repeating His answer, ***“Render to Caesar the things that are Caesar’s.”*** However, it is rare that we quote the full answer, ***“And to God the things that are God’s.”***

According to the CSB Study Bible, “The denarius was a Roman silver coin that bore a portrait of Emperor Tiberius, a Latin superscription that said ‘Tiberius Caesar, son of the Divine Augustus,’ an image of a goddess, and superscripted titles of the Roman high priest.”

Jesus approved the payment of taxes to Rome. However, He said that coins ultimately belong to the one whose image it bears. So, if coins bearing Cesar’s image belong to him, give them to him.

Then what are we to give to God?

Genesis 1:26 says, ***“Then God said, ‘Let us make man in our image, after our likeness.’”*** As mankind bears the image of God, we belong to God. It is just like how the coin bearing Cesar’s image belonged to him. Jesus wanted His listeners to understand that it is not only important to give the government their due taxes but to also give God what is due to Him as well.

So, for me, two questions arise from this:

Am I giving all my taxes to the government?

Am I giving all of myself to God?

HONOR

GOVERNMENT, DEVOTION 5

Being honorable and respectable is very important to me. I like it when my reputation goes before me and carries weight. I like to be known as reliable. My yes means yes and my no means no.

The Bible has much to say about honor. We are instructed to honor those in authority over us because they are placed there by God (Romans 13:1), but we can frequently find them not deserving of it. Parents make mistakes but must still be honored. Bosses can seem like they do not care about your life but you must still honor them. We may have a major disagreement with state and federal authorities, but still, we are instructed to behave honorably towards them.

Romans 13:7 can be hard to live out sometimes, ***“Pay to all what is owed to them: taxes to whom taxes are owed, revenue to whom revenue is owed, respect to whom respect is owed, honor to whom honor is owed.”***

Pastor Craig Groeschel has encouraging advice for those who struggle to give honor, “If you’re a married woman, but you don’t particularly like your husband - maybe he’s not the leader that you want him to be - honor him. If you treat him as ordinary and common, he won’t feel empowered to lead your family. But if you honor him, give him the opportunity to rise to the occasion, to become honorable. Treat him like he’s the man you want him to be; with grace and honor, help him envision himself as a better man.”

Pastor Groeschel also applies this approach to church leaders and I believe it can be applied in most cases. If you are unhappy with





those in authority over you, rather than tear them down and out of that position, build them up and encourage them to be the kind of leader you want them to be. Honoring those in authority is good practice in humility.

Romans 12:10 adds, ***“Love one another with brotherly affection. Outdo one another in showing honor.”***

I do not know about you, but I do not always agree with the decisions made by the people that are put in charge. For there is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God. Therefore whoever resists the authorities resists what God has appointed, and those who resist will incur judgment.”*** Before I even break this down, I want to clarify something. Many people will argue and say that the ***“authorities”*** that are discussed here are angels. This can be disproven by looking at Romans 13:6. Here, we are called to pay taxes to these authorities. We do not pay taxes to angels, but we do to the earthly authorities. This tells us that the Bible is, in fact, talking about those authorities.

There is something important in Romans 13:1-2 that we need to hear and understand clearly. God has appointed these authorities. We may not agree with everything they say or do, but God appointed





them. We are not above God; therefore, we are not above those whom God has placed above us. We might even argue that the things the authorities are doing are ungodly deeds. Since these people are above us, they are not for us to judge and deal with, that is God's position. As believers, we only have two things we must do in the matters of the authorities. First of all, we must follow them because God has appointed them. Second, the only time that we can resist these powers is when they demand the position that is only allowed to God. We can see this played out in the story of Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego. King Nebuchadnezzar demanded to be treated like a god, and these men would not obey. We can read this story and watch God protect these men because they were following Him.

What this means for us is that we should follow those whom God has placed in the position of authority and understand that He is in control. We should find comfort in that when things do not go the way we want.

Hopefully, when you filled in that blank you did not have to repent to Jesus for sinning! Everyone has a different experience when it comes to their “boss.” Some people have amazing people who are in the position of authority where they work. Sadly, some people are not able to share that same sentiment.

I have only had four jobs in my life. I worked at a grocery store from the time I was a teen until I was in my mid-twenties. I had a part-time job as a substitute teacher, which lead to me being a classroom assistant, and then eventually I got hired at The River Church. I have been very lucky that all of my bosses have been amazing people.

Back in my twenties, early in my career as a stock boy, I had a major issue; I had a horrible attitude. My way of doing something was the best, and I had no problem telling my bosses what I thought. Clearly, this did not help me get promoted to a different position. Luckily for me, I had a department head take me aside and tell me he wanted to bring me on to his team, but I would have to watch my attitude. I remember him looking at me saying, “This promotion starts with you. You are a great worker, but your attitude stinks. If you have a bad attitude, I do not want you on my team. If you can show you have a better attitude, I would like you on this team.” That idea of “it starts with you” has stuck with me for years.

“Servants, be subject to your masters with all respect, not only to the good and gentle but also to the unjust.” 1 Peter 2:18

1. Why does God’s Word tell us we must be ***“subject to your masters with all respect”*** regardless of how our boss treats us?





2. Is it right to “work better” for a boss who treats you better compared to a boss that treats you worse? Why is this truth so hard to put into action?

If you ever want to get me a soapbox, and let me rant about the importance of strong leadership, I am game to do so. Leadership is so essential to an organization’s growth, but that organization’s growth only happens at an individual’s level. When people get better leadership, they should get better themselves. However, there is also a bit of a gap that exists inside any organization when subordinates begin to think they are above their boss in understanding, competency, organization, and skill.

3. Why is a humble heart so important to being a good employee?

“For this is a gracious thing, when, mindful of God, one endures sorrows while suffering unjustly. For what credit is it if, when you sin and are beaten for it, you endure? But if when you do good and suffer for it you endure, this is a gracious thing in the sight of God.” 1 Peter 2:19-20

4. How often do you take responsibility for your work ethic, attitude, and quality of work? Why is it that we tend to blame others for our own work?

5. What does Peter say we should do when we suffer for doing good?

6. What does Christian endurance look like in the workplace? (Bonus points if you have a Bible verse to prove your point.)

7. What can grumbling, complaining, gossiping, slacking off, insubordination, and passive aggressive behavior do to a believer who is trying to endure?

There is a huge reality that not everything is rosy at about most everyone's job. There will be a point where you do not overly like your boss. For many people, simply quitting is not an option. I have heard many people "vent" about the difficulties of their job. I love the last portion of 1 Peter chapter 2. I love that Peter pulls us to focus on Jesus even when working for difficult bosses. ***"For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you might follow in his steps. He committed no sin, neither was deceit found in his mouth. When he was reviled, he did not revile in return; when he suffered, he did not threaten, but continued entrusting himself to him who judges justly. He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. By his wounds you have been healed. For you were straying like sheep, but have now returned to the Shepherd and Overseer of your souls"*** (1 Peter 2:21-25).





If we break down 1 Peter 2:18-25, we can see five ways we ***“might follow in his steps.”*** It starts with your heart wanting to show Jesus in your actions so we are all being a witness for Jesus in our workplace.

“He committed no sin.”

BOSS OR LEADER?

I am almost positive everyone can relate to a job in their past that was awful. It seems that when you land a new job with a new employer, you are taking your career to the next level and all is right in the world. For the first several weeks at this new job, you are on cloud nine while you get along with all of your colleagues, you enjoy the work, and you genuinely are being successful in your endeavor. Then there is the inevitable “first correction” that is made by your direct boss. Now depending on your personality, some may take this correction or instruction to be condescending and get very upset about it. Some may take it personally and think that the boss hates their work. Others might take the correction constructively and carry on with their normal duties. Depending on the type of superior that is in charge makes an incredible difference in the success of its business and employees. What makes a good boss in the eyes of God?

First and foremost, most superiors either refer to themselves as either a boss or a leader. I am sure you can pick out which superior has a better motive in helping their employees succeed. I have had enough jobs and have seen many different leading techniques to know what makes a good leader. Ephesians 6:4 says, ***“Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord.”*** So when that inevitable conflict arrives, the leader can get the message across to his/her employee in a tasteful manner with the intent to help the employee succeed instead of making the employee feel inadequate. A few verses later also clear up who is the leader. Ephesians 6:9 says, ***“Masters, do the same to them, and stop your threatening,***





knowing that he who is both their Master and yours is in heaven, and that there is no partiality with him.

What do you do if you are working for a boss that is unjust in his ways and is not a very good leader? I have drawn the short straw many times in my life with working for unjust bosses. I was miserable, I developed a hate for my superiors, I became very passive-aggressive, and it made me into a person that I did not want to be. In 1 Peter 2:18, it says, ***“Servants, be subject to your masters with all respect, not only to the good and gentle but also to the unjust.”*** This is the opposite of how I treated those bosses and simply put, I was sinning. Once it got to the point where it affected my home life and my relationship with my wife, I had to sever ties with that company and find different work.

With all of the jobs that I have had over the years, I have always learned something new with each one. You always learn what kind of work you like, what you do not like, and also you learn the type of people you like to be around. You also learn what a bad boss and a good leader look like. You learn how they act, how they treat their employees, and also you can see if the boss/leader has either themselves or their employee's best interest in mind. We are all called to work, for God has chosen us to be in that position to give us the opportunity to share His Gospel and show how to love one another. Colossians 3:12-13 says, ***“Put on then, as God’s chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive.”*** Now that you understand a little bit better what a good leader is in the eyes of God, I encourage you to discover what a good servant looks like. BAD BOSS

As someone who has been in the workforce for over 45 years now, I have come to this realization - I have been a good and bad worker and as well I have been a good and bad boss. I know that at times I have failed to meet the expectations of my boss and at other times I have also failed those who have worked for me.

For everyone that has ever had a boss, you know how pleasurable it can be when that person meets your expectation of a boss. Maybe your boss's expectation goes something like this: a good boss never overworks you, gives you plenty of time off, dispenses raises frequently, and certainly does not scold you for playing solitaire on your work computer. When working for a person like that, fulfilling your role as a good worker is a breeze!

However, we would agree that the person in authority over you falls short at times of your expectations for a boss. What if this person is ungrateful for the work you do? Are they excessively critical or negative towards you and constantly making unrealistic demands of you? Does this change your role as a worker? Do you become a bad worker because you have a bad boss?

As with all things in life, we should look for wisdom in the Word of God. In 1 Peter 2:18 (NKJV), we read, ***“Servants, be submissive to your masters with all fear, not only to the good and gentle, but also to the harsh.”***

I do not know about you, but this Scripture made me pause. That is why I continued to read it over and over and over again. Eventually,





my understanding became this - workers (servants) are to be obedient (submissive) to their bosses (masters) no matter what kind of boss they are! Regardless of whether they are gentle or harsh to me, my reaction towards them is to be the same. I am to be obedient (submissive) out of reverence (fear). It is a fact of life that in any society or organization, there must be an authority on the one hand, and obedience to that authority on the other. Without it we have chaos.

If the lack of chaos in the workplace is not enough for you, then hopefully the next verse helps, ***“For this is commendable, if because of conscience toward God one endures grief, suffering wrongfully.”***

God is pleased when He finds us so conscious of our relation to Him that we endure wrongful doing without upholding self or fighting back. When we humbly take unjust treatment, we display Christ, and this gains us favor with God and is a witness to the world that so desperately needs Him! This does not imply that working for the “bad boss” is our only option, it just means that while we are employed, we are to work remembering Christ’s example.

God’s plan to rescue the world from sin was contingent on the obedience of Jesus as He suffered unjustly, submitting to the authority and will of God.

Whether you work for a “good boss” or “bad boss,” God has a plan for your obedience.

ENDURE

The word “endure” is used 112 times in Scripture. It must be a pretty important concept. We know we are called to “keep on keeping on.” The Christian life is not designed to be a plush, easy life. It comes with challenges. Some words from William Barclay are rattling in my mind, “Endurance is not just the ability to bear a hard thing, but to turn it into glory.” The reason we are called to endure is so that God will receive glory. Therefore, it is worth the pain.

Paul uses the word “endure” four times in his first letter to the Corinthians. While describing ministry, he says, ***“To the present hour we hunger and thirst, we are poorly dressed and buffeted and homeless, and we labor, working with our own hands. When reviled, we bless; when persecuted, we endure; when slandered, we entreat. We have become, and are still, like the scum of the world, the refuse of all things”*** (1 Corinthians 4:11-13). The contrast is striking. They are being reviled and they repay it with blessings. They are being persecuted and they do not quit. They are willing to press forward for the cause of Christ.

Paul continues the concept of endurance in 1 Corinthians 9:12, ***“If others share this rightful claim on you, do not we even more? Nevertheless, we have not made use of this right, but we endure anything rather than put an obstacle in the way of the gospel of Christ.”*** Paul reminds us that our goal and purpose in life should be to glorify Christ. We do not want our bad attitude or harsh words to become ***“an obstacle in the way of the gospel of Christ.”*** Our desire should be to bring people to Christ, not block the opportunity. There are times by our enduring a bad situation that others will notice and ask where we find this hope and strength. It is in Jesus.





In 1 Corinthians 10:13, Paul points out that God will help, ***“No temptation has overtaken you that is not common to man. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tempted beyond your ability, but with the temptation he will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it.”*** No matter how bad the situation gets, we do not have to make the wrong choice or even say the hurtful words. We can stand strong because He is faithful.

Finally, in 1 Corinthians 13:7, Paul describes love, ***“Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.”*** This might seem like an odd verse to end a devotion on endurance in the workplace, but it should relate. When Jesus was asked which is the greatest commandment, He said to love God. He then quickly added that we need to love others. Endurance is easier when you love. Love those whom God has placed around you and over you at work. Pray for them. Encourage them. When you take these steps, enduring proves to be valuable and fruitful for the Kingdom.

HOW TO BE A GREAT EMPLOYEE GOD'S WAY

The most difficult part of a job transition is adjusting to a new boss. When we become a follower of Christ, we shift from being our own boss into becoming an employee of the true Boss. This new position places God as the focus and authority in our lives. As a result, we get a new training manual and access to perfect love. As He refines us, He hires us with the intent to reflect Him in our earthly lives and our earthly jobs. Here are five ways that reflection can begin.

First, be humble. Throughout the Bible (Luke 14:11; Ephesians 4:2; Colossians 3:12; 1 Peter 1:5), humility is a prominent virtue outlined. We are called, as Christ-followers, to be humble in respect to others and God. The Bible tells us that God resists the proud. Knowing that is the case, we should continuously pray for humility so that God remains working in our lives. How can an employee be great with God resisting them?

Second, be helpful. The Bible warns against being lazy (1 Corinthians 10:31; 15:58; Philippians 2:14; Colossians 3:23-24); instead we are called to be doers of the Word. As an employee, this means doing what you are asked. As a Christian employee, this means going above and beyond because you are reflecting Christ. Honor and glorify God by meeting the needs you see or offering solutions to problems. In the book of Philippians, we are commanded to not grumble or complain. Instead of grumbling, remember who sees you work and ultimately who you are honoring in the process.





Third, be wise. Wisdom begins with fearing the Lord (Proverbs 4:6-7; 19:20; 24:3-7; James 1:5). A great employee applies wisdom in all areas of their life to do their spiritual and physical jobs to the best of their ability. God builds through wisdom. If anyone lacks wisdom, they are told to ask God and it will be given to them. In other words, God does not deny a request to be wise so this is something a great employee cannot work without.

Fourth, be submissive. Good employees understand that God is completely in control and just (Romans 12:18; 13:1-7; Hebrews 13:17). He has placed every leader in their role (and removes leaders). It is not our place to rebel against authority, it is our job to be diligent with what we have been entrusted. God is all-knowing and all-powerful, He accomplishes His purposes in ways we may not understand (Remember when He used Nebuchadnezzar? Or the Assyrians? Or the Babylonians?). Strengthen your relationship with God, concern yourself with what you are responsible for, and strive for peace to the best of your ability. New Life Camp director Tim Woelkers Jr. says, "Love Jesus, serve people."

Fifth, be flexible. Ultimately you are not in charge and you do not know everything; God does and that is why He makes the plans (Isaiah 55:8-9; Romans 8:28; Colossians 1:16-17). Being a great employee involves adjusting to changes that occur and giving God permission to interrupt. Be open to doing what God asks of you; in addition to what your boss asks of you. After all, it is an anomaly for things to go as you planned. My advice is to accept that (have a good cry if you are a planner like me) and move on with the day. After you accept this, rejoice in the truth that God is sovereign and works all things out.

FOR GOD

WORK, DEVOTION 5

“From the time that he made him overseer in his house and over all that he had, the Lord blessed the Egyptian’s house for Joseph’s sake; the blessing of the Lord was on all that he had, in house and field. So he left all that he had in Joseph’s charge, and because of him he had no concern about anything but the food he ate.” Genesis 39:5-6

The main point of this passage seems quite clear. God blessed Joseph. He not only blessed Joseph, but He blessed everyone and anything around Joseph. Potiphar and his estate were flourishing because God blessed him through Joseph.

However, I think there is another aspect that is too often missed: Joseph was faithful to God. Joseph had been belittled by his brothers, thrown in a pit, threatened death, sold into slavery, taken far from home, and humanly speaking had no hope of ever seeing his dad again. All sense of normality was gone. As he served in the house of Potiphar, he was faithful. He was faithful to God; therefore, he was diligent with his work. He was a hard worker. He was a hard worker when Potiphar was watching, but he was a hard worker when Potiphar was not home, too. With Joseph in charge, Potiphar ***“had no concern about anything.”***

The key to Joseph’s success was that he had an audience of One. There was only One that he wanted to impress. In everything he did, he was working for God. God was the focus of his diligence.





It can be difficult to work for an unbeliever or a godless person. It can be tempting to slack off when no one is watching. It can be hard to press forward when we are not appreciated. It can be challenging to give our best when it is not acknowledged. It is easy to follow the crowd. However, Joseph knew One was always watching. He was the One Joseph strived to please.

Galatians 1:10 challenges us, ***“For am I now seeking the approval of man, or of God? Or am I trying to please man? If I were still trying to please man, I would not be a servant of Christ.”***

As servants of Christ, we need to live it. When “no one” is watching, remember One is watching. When many are watching, focus on the One, the true and living God.

“Not by the way of eye-service, as people-pleasers, but as bondservants of Christ, doing the will of God from the heart.”
Ephesians 6:6

“Bondservants, obey in everything those who are your earthly masters, not by way of eye-service, as people-pleasers, but with sincerity of heart, fearing the Lord.” Colossians 3:22

They say imitation is the highest form of flattery. Now that may be true if we are talking about someone copying the style of a professional athlete. I remember growing up wanting my baseball swing to look just like Ken Griffy Jr's beautiful swing. That may be true if we are talking about a musician wanting to sound like somebody famous. I can think of multiple bands and worship leaders that have heavily influenced my style of worship leading. However, sometimes imitation can be eye-opening and insulting, like when a friend imitates you and your first reaction is, "Do I really act like that?" My children are at a perfect age for this, my daughter and son constantly do things that make my wife and I go, "Oh no, they learned that from us didn't they?" These things are sometimes cute, but other times show us that they have been learning from our bad example in their lives.

1. Is there someone in your life that you always wanted to be like or have closely imitated?

2. Can you think of a time where a child or family member imitated something about you that opened your eyes to a negative behavior?

When I was thinking about God's order of authority in the home, this idea of imitation kept finding its way into my head. The scriptures that we are going to be looking at consistently talk about leading with an example and actions because we all know that actions speak louder than words. Husbands cannot lead their families in a godly way if they are not first living in a godly manner. Parents cannot expect their children to obey what the Lord says if they themselves are not





being an example of Christ to their children. So, with this in mind, we should take a look at what Scripture specifically says about authority in the home to husbands, wives, and children.

Husbands

Ephesians 5:25-33 says, ***“Husbands, love your wives, as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her, that he might sanctify her, having cleansed her by the washing of water with the word, so that he might present the church to himself in splendor, without spot or wrinkle or any such thing, that she might be holy and without blemish. In the same way husbands should love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself. For no one ever hated his own flesh, but nourishes and cherishes it, just as Christ does the church, because we are members of his body. ‘Therefore a man shall leave his father and mother and hold fast to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh.’ This mystery is profound, and I am saying that it refers to Christ and the church. However, let each one of you love his wife as himself, and let the wife see that she respects her husband.”***

In 1 Peter 3:7, we read, ***“Likewise, husbands, live with your wives in an understanding way, showing honor to the woman as the weaker vessel, since they are heirs with you of the grace of life, so that your prayers may not be hindered.”***

3. Men, time to be honest, do you see yourself loving and leading your wife and family in this manner? What areas do you need to improve on?

4. What does it mean to live with your wife in an understanding way?

God's order of authority in the home begins with the husband. When we talk about Biblical authority and submission, too many men jump at the opportunity to talk about how Scripture tells their wives to be submissive, while completely missing out on how Scripture tells them to lead their families. Verse 25 in Ephesians chapter 3 tells men to love their wives as Christ loved the church. In case you may have forgotten, Christ loved the church by sacrificing Himself and dying on a cross. This is a serious and sobering call to us men on how we are supposed to be loving and leading our wives. When we are talking about authority in the home, it is true that the Lord has put husbands in the place of authority, but this authority calls on us to lead as servants in our household not to rule with an iron fist. Too many men take the approach, "Do what I say, not what I do." That is completely missing the point of leadership.

The authority given to us by Christ to lead our families needs to be taken seriously, and the best way to do that is to take our relationship with Christ seriously. If we are not plugged into Christ, we will never be able to lead with authority well in our family. I cannot even imagine the spiritual growth that would explode in so many households if more husbands would strive to lead and serve in a Christ-like manner.

I would be remiss if I did not address what 1 Peter 3:7 says as well. Men are commanded to live with their wives in an understanding way and to show them honor. This is our responsibility as godly husbands, this is not something that is optional. To be good leaders, we are not to be bad-mouthing our wife behind her back, we are to build her up and give her understanding and grace when it is needed. All of this is the exact imitation of how Christ interacts with His church.





5. What are some godly ways husbands can lead by example in their households?

Wives

Ephesians 5:22-24 says, ***“Wives, submit to your own husbands, as to the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife even as Christ is the head of the church, his body, and is himself its Savior. Now as the church submits to Christ, so also wives should submit in everything to their husbands.”***

In 1 Peter 3:1-6, we read, ***“Likewise, wives, be subject to your own husbands, so that even if some do not obey the word, they may be won without a word by the conduct of their wives, when they see your respectful and pure conduct. Do not let your adorning be external - the braiding of hair and the putting on of gold jewelry, or the clothing you wear - but let your adorning be the hidden person of the heart with the imperishable beauty of a gentle and quiet spirit, which in God’s sight is very precious. For this is how the holy women who hoped in God used to adorn themselves, by submitting to their own husbands, as Sarah obeyed Abraham, calling him lord. And you are her children, if you do good and do not fear anything that is frightening.”***

6. How does our culture encourage or discourage women to behave in the way this Scripture describes?

For some, these Scriptures can be a bit touchy, but historically one of the reasons that this subject needed to be addressed to women is so beautiful. In the early church, many of the new believers were women who were the first people in their household to believe in Jesus as their Savior, and this created so many questions of how they should behave towards their unbelieving husband. Back in biblical times, having different religions within a home was essentially unheard of, so these believing women are encouraged to continue to love and respect their husbands, hoping that this example would bring him to the Lord. So many women today have bravely stepped up and become a spiritual authority in their home because unfortunately, the husband is not a believer. By continuing to love and respect their husband, even in disagreement, they are setting an example that one day could help bring him to saving faith in Christ.

7. What are some practical ways that a wife that is a believer can be a godly example to her unbelieving husband?

Also, when Scripture tells wives to submit to their husbands, this does not mean sit quietly in a corner. One of the things I love about my wife is that she is passionate and willing to share her thoughts with me. I would never want her to only silently follow me. This is so important within the authority of the home, that everyone feels like their thoughts and opinions can be said and heard by others. It is okay to disagree, what is essential is how we respond after a disagreement. To submit to your husband means that ultimately you will follow his lead, even when you may have a differing opinion. Also, an important distinction here is that your foremost authority is God and the Scripture. Especially when dealing with an unbelieving spouse there will be times where respectfully you will have to





disagree and refuse to do something because it goes against the command of God. Same as with husbands, a wife's relationship with the Lord needs to be priority number one. A godly woman can love her husband and lead her children only through the strength that her relationship with the Lord gives her.

8. What does a godly authority structure between a husband and wife look like?

Children

Ephesians 6:1-4 says, ***“Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. ‘Honor your father and mother’ (this is the first commandment with a promise), ‘that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land.’ Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord.”***

9. How can children honor Christ in their relationship with their parents?

In the order of authority within the home, children find themselves at the bottom of that list. If you are a child reading this, sorry, but enjoy the lack of responsibility while you have it. One day you will have people looking to you as an authority figure, and at times you will wish you could go back to just doing what your parents told you to do. In all seriousness though, Scripture tells children to obey their

parents, because it is the right thing to do. It is not because parents are always right, but because God has placed them in the position of authority. Being a parent of two kids now, I look back at all the times I disagreed with my parents and have slowly realized that they were pretty much always spot on. If you are a Christian kid with unbelieving parents, most of the last section about wives applies to you as well. Through your honor and obedience towards them, you can show them Christ. One day they could come to faith in Christ through your testimony of how you honored and respected them.

10. How can a child who is a believer impact his unbelieving parents for the Gospel?

Ultimately in God's order of authority in the home, every family member needs to make sure they are ultimately falling under God's authority. Parents, the best thing you can do for your kids is to have a strong and public relationship with the Lord. The closer you are to God, the easier it will be to serve your family. The more you help your child's relationship with Christ grow, the more they will find themselves obeying and respecting your authority in their life. When we feel like our home life is teetering, that is the time to refocus ourselves on the Lord and make sure that it is Him and the things of Scripture that are at the top of our priority list.

11. What are some ways we can tell the structure of authority is off in our home and what can we do to bring the proper order back to it?





HUSBANDS

“For this reason a man will leave his father and mother and be united to his wife, and the two will become one flesh.”

Ephesians 5:31 (NIV)

As a young husband, I thought I knew what it meant to be a husband, leader, and the “man in charge.” I quickly realized I did not have a clue! It took years until I learned that the only way I could lead was to be in line with what God had designed me to be, that is, to be a man of God.

John 13:14-15 says, ***“If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another’s feet. For I have given you an example, that you also should do just as I have done to you.”***

My model is Jesus! Jesus came and served us while He was here on Earth. He laid down His life to provide us with the free gift of salvation. I serve Jesus with my wife and love, respect, honor, and protect her. In order to be the spiritual leader to my wife, God needs to be the center of my life and our relationship. Spiritual leadership is knowing where God wants me to be and living a lifestyle that honors God in all my ways.

Even though my wife loves the Lord with all her heart and is well versed in the Word, I need to be the spiritual leader of our family. This was not how I grew up. Ephesians 5:25-28 (NIV) adds, ***“Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her to make her holy, cleansing her by the washing with water through the word, and to present her to himself as a radiant church, without stain or wrinkle or any other blemish, but holy and blameless. In this same way, husbands ought to love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself.”***

Now as the church submits to Christ, so also wives should submit to their husbands in everything. Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her.”

“Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. Honor your father and mother (this is the first commandment with a promise), that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land.” Ephesians 6:1-3

As we are studying God's order of authority, parents are a massive lane that we must learn to navigate as kids and as adults. JUST DO IT!

The most vivid memory I have of my grandmother is when we were talking in her living room about 24 years ago. I was a mother of two and had been a Christian for about a year. My husband and I were having difficulty agreeing on whether or not to have more children. I decided for the first time ever to pray for guidance. A short three months later, I found myself telling my grandmother of our dilemma and my decision to pray. I confidently and proudly asserted that God decided and I was expecting a baby in eight months. Without missing a beat, my grandmother responded with, "Oh, is that who you're going to blame?" I was shattered.

We all have different family backgrounds. Some were raised in Christian homes (God bless you!) and some of us attended church but biblical truths and principles were never discussed and applied to daily living. Still, others were raised in homes where God and Jesus were not even on the radar. I have noticed something about God's Word - when He gives a command, there are no conditions attached. He does not say forgive others if they apologize; love others, if they are loving; or submit, if your husband loves the Lord. He simply says to forgive, love, and submit. Respecting your elders is no different.

In 1 Peter 5:5, we read, ***"Likewise, you who are younger, be subject to the elders. Clothe yourselves, all of you, with humility toward one another; For God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble."***

That is interesting. I do not see, "Respect or submit to your grandmother if she responds in a godly or even a caring way." However, I do see a





promise of God's grace. God's fourth commandment reads: ***"Honor your father and mother, as the Lord your God commanded you"*** (Deuteronomy 5:16). No conditions are noted but we find a promise of long life attached to it. Many commentators agree that this is a "multigenerational attitude of respect" and applies to grandparents. As I combed through articles, I found commentators suggesting this is an "outdated sentiment." Historically, this saying meant that elders should be respected because of their knowledge and experience. However, since the young of our culture know more than the older it is an irrelevant saying. Believer, we are called to respect our elders because of who they are (His creation); not because of what they know or have accomplished. He also sites situations where the older have mistreated the younger. Believer, the sin of others does not negate God's commands. His command is not based on what our elders deserve. We are called to: Just Do It!

As a new grandmother, I feel compelled to address my fellow grandparents. I have a 9-month granddaughter, Leah Kate. As much as I love my children, there is nothing like the love I have for my granddaughter. She has done nothing to earn my love but as Proverbs 17:6 says, she is her Grammy's "crown." I know many grandparents who have become very critical of their children's parenting skills and stunned by the behavior of their grandchildren. Psalm 145:4 says that we are to share God's works with the younger generation. Grandparent, have you introduced your grandchild to the One who saves and transforms lives? Too much time, too little time - the real question is, "How are you spending your time with them?" Are you sharing stories of the amazing works God has done in your life? Psalm 24:1 (NLT) tells us, “*The earth is the Lord’s, and everything in it.*” In this series, we have been studying God’s order of authority. LESSON FOUR

Church

PASTOR PAT ROWLAND



There are many ideas of what the church or a church is or should be.

1. In your opinion, how would you describe the church?

To understand the role and authority of the church in our lives we need first to go back to the beginning of the church. In Matthew 16:13-18, Jesus is speaking to His disciples when the word “church” is introduced for the first time, ***“Now when Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, ‘Who do people say that the Son of Man is?’ And they said, ‘Some say John the Baptist, others say Elijah, and others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.’ He said to them, ‘But who do you say that I am?’ Simon Peter replied, ‘You are the Christ, the Son of the living God.’ And Jesus answered him, ‘Blessed are you, Simon Bar-Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father who is in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it.’”***

The disciples had no context for the word “church,” but Jesus was clear that at that moment with Peter’s words Jesus would build this new thing called a church.

2. What was Jesus referring to as the “rock” of the church?

St. Peter’s Basilica in Vatican City has placed the bones of Peter in a tomb beneath the church, believing it is Peter by which the church is





built. Though he played a significant role, the church has been built upon a principle, not a person. It is the Gospel, that was proclaimed by Peter through the work of the Holy Spirit in Acts chapter two that established the church. The Bible says that when the people heard the message, ***“they were cut to the heart”*** (verse 37). Those who accepted the message were about 3,000. In one day, God established the church.

Acts 2:42-47 says, ***“And they devoted themselves to the apostles’ teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. And awe came upon every soul, and many wonders and signs were being done through the apostles. And all who believed were together and had all things in common. And they were selling their possessions and belongings and distributing the proceeds to all, as any had need. And day by day, attending the temple together and breaking bread in their homes, they received their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having favor with all the people. And the Lord added to their number day by day those who were being saved.”***

3. What was the focus of the early church?

4. What role did the apostles play in leading the early church?

The apostles were chosen, prepared, and called by Jesus to be Gospel carriers taking the message to Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and to the ends of the earth (Acts 1:8). They became the first

church planters, traveling throughout the world sharing the Gospel and starting churches in city after city. The pattern was for them to preach the Gospel and to disciple these early converts before moving on to a new city. These churches were in need of leadership in their absence, so they appointed elders. Acts 14:23, ***“And when they had appointed elders for them in every church, with prayer and fasting they committed them to the Lord in whom they had believed.”***

5. What qualities do you believe are required of an elder in the church?

6. Read 1 Timothy 3:1-7. How does this list compare to yours?

The role of an elder is a tremendous responsibility, which is why choosing one requires prayer, fasting, and guidance from the Holy Spirit. An elder is not just a person that has been around for a long time, but one who is of high character, high regard, and spiritual maturity. He is involved in leading the church and serving on behalf of Christ who is the head of the church (Colossians 1:18).

Peter describes elders as shepherds of the flock in 1 Peter 5:1-4, ***“So I exhort the elders among you, as a fellow elder and a witness of the sufferings of Christ, as well as a partaker in the glory that is going to be revealed: shepherd the flock of God that is among you, exercising oversight, not under compulsion, but willingly, as God would have you; not for shameful gain, but***





eagerly; not domineering over those in your charge, but being examples to the flock. And when the chief Shepherd appears, you will receive the unfading crown of glory.”

7. There are multiple passages in Scripture that point to the church being a flock and Jesus being the shepherd of the flock. What are some of those passages?

The primary responsibility of a shepherd is feeding, or in this case, teaching. Every elder must be able to teach the Word of God, and when they do so it is with the very authority of Christ.

8. How do you view a message in a worship gathering, as the words of a man or the words of God?

As a preacher of the Gospel, elders have an anointing by God sharing a message with God's people as the words of God. An elder is to humbly seek to speak the words of God, not words of their own, much less the words that people may want to hear. An elder is accountable to God and will give an account.

Hebrews 13:17 says, ***“Obey your leaders and submit to them, for they are keeping watch over your souls, as those who will have to give an account.”***

James 3:1 adds, ***“Not many of you should become teachers, my brothers, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness.”***

A measure of a preacher-elder is that of humility in their life and speech, yet a willingness to proclaim with boldness the convicting words of the Gospel. In a culture where people like to hold to their own version of the truth and desire a feel-good message, an elder must remain faithful to the message.

The second responsibility of a shepherd is protecting the flock from “wolves.” Acts 20:28–30 says, ***“Pay careful attention to yourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to care for the church of God, which he obtained with his own blood. I know that after my departure fierce wolves will come in among you, not sparing the flock; and from among your own selves will arise men speaking twisted things, to draw away the disciples after them.”***

9. What are the “wolves” in today’s church? How do you see elders protecting the “flock?”

In both duties, it must be remembered that the flock belongs to God, not to the pastor. God entrusts some of His flock to the pastor and elders of a church to lead, care for, and feed.

10. As members of the flock, how are we to respond to elders?

In 1 Peter 5:5-6, we read, ***“Likewise, you who are younger, be subject to the elders. Clothe yourselves, all of you, with humility toward one another, for ‘God opposes the proud but gives grace***





to the humble.’ Humble yourselves, therefore, under the mighty hand of God so that at the proper time he may exalt you.”

As a follower of Christ, we have all submitted ourselves to the ultimate authority of Christ. A regular attendee of any church has submitted to the leadership of that church. Submission is an attitude of spiritual maturity and the process we all go through in seeking to be more like Christ.

The elders are the pastors, the spiritual leaders of the church, and they are concerned for the deep needs of their people, not simply for what lies on the surface. The greatest way to support the elders is to pray for them and to trust them. Please close out this time praying for the elders of The River Church.

MOTIVES MAKE THE MAN (OR WOMAN)

Ever hear the saying, “Motives make the man?” That is the impulse behind your actions that ultimately determine if it was honorable or not. Even in our legal system, the intent of a person to harm someone brings about more severe punishment. However, even when something good happens, the motive behind it should be honorable.

When I was working with students in a school setting, I had someone take another student’s backpack with all their books and devices. When I had eventually tracked it down, I had camera footage of the student taking her bag. He left the building and put the bag in the trunk of his car. Romans 12:17 reads, ***“Repay no one evil for evil, but give thought to do what is honorable in the sight of all.”*** Further, 2 Corinthians 8:21 states, ***“For we aim at what is honorable not only in the Lord’s sight but also in the sight of man.”*** These verses are a perfect challenge in today’s world, and apparently, they were pretty important words when the Bible was written. Remember, the “motives make the man or woman.” We have been instructed by God to do





what is honorable from every perspective. This can be hard. I have worked with a lot of families that really only want obedience from their children, but I would challenge parents that you want obedience with the right motives. We as parents want children to do the right things for the right reasons.

God wants the same from His children. He does not just want us to follow the rules, but He wants us to love Him in a way that we want to follow the rules. Our motives are important to accomplishing this goal. In 1 Peter 2:12, we read, ***“Keep your conduct among the Gentiles honorable, so that when they speak against you as evildoers, they may see your good deeds and glorify God on the day of visitation.”*** Doing the right things with the right motives will allow the world to see God through our actions. We need to remember, the world is looking for us to do the right thing for the right reasons!

MARTIN LUTHER

I hope everyone who reads this and everyone everywhere can say confidently that their church organization does not have dictatorial or dominating leadership. The Bible provides rules and guidelines for pastors and informs us that they will face stricter judgment from God. Sadly, church organizations have not always held an honorable position in this regard.

In the early 1500's, Martin Luther rocked the religious world by challenging the Roman Catholic Church on doctrine and theology. Luther argued that eternal life is the free gift of God and cannot be earned with good behavior. He challenged the authority of the Pope by teaching the Bible is the only source of divinely revealed knowledge. Luther translated the Bible from Latin to the German vernacular making it more accessible to the common man. His work influenced Tyndale's translation to English, the Gutenberg Bible, which is amongst the first mass-produced books.

The Bible paints a picture of the role of church leaders and it has been missed by many. The shepherd and sheep is the analogy the Bible uses many times. Shepherds (pastors) are supposed to let sheep do their own thing - eat, play, sleep. Pastors do not insert themselves into the lives of others unless their sheep are threatened to require them to become aggressive and defend their sheep. When a sheep wanders off they pursue it and lovingly bring it back.

Church leaders have the important job of teaching the Word of God. A good leader should welcome feedback, constructive criticism, and varying opinions. If you feel a church leader is prideful, hypocritical,





or manipulative you should, for the sake of the entire church, lovingly confront them. Our youngest, Carter, has autism. Every year as a student, we attended an IEP to discuss his progress and establish goals for the school year. When he was 13 years old, the conversation started with the typical questions: age, date, address, teachers' names, and the name of our president. Carter responded with a resounding, "Barack Obama." As we celebrated his correct response, he continued, "But my dad says." Having no idea what he was going to say next, we quickly interrupted him and segued into a different topic. Later, Greg and I would discuss the importance of voicing our opinions out of his earshot.

From the time we are born, we experience different types of leadership - a parent, a teacher, and a supervisor. Also, if you have a saving relationship with Christ, you are under the leadership of Jesus. At some time or another, most if not all of us, have asked the question, "Who put him (her) in charge?" We have all questioned the decisions mandates of our leaders at some point. I will never forget when God had me read Ephesians 5:22, ***"Wives, submit to your own husbands, as to the Lord."*** No conditions were given. It is just a straight-up command. What? I hope I am not alone when I admit that sometimes I question even His leadership.

Whenever you are struggling with understanding and following God, there are stories in the Bible that will remind you that you are in good company. Read the book of Habakkuk. It is a quick three chapters. Habakkuk was God's chosen prophet to Judah. During that time, Habakkuk was grieved by the spiritual decay surrounding him in spite of his prayers and his commissioned message to the people.





When he sees the invasion of Judah by Babylon, the most wicked nation of the day, and God's people being carried into captivity, he is confused and begins a question. Habakkuk 1:3 says, ***"Why do you make me see iniquity, and why do you idly look at wrong?"***

Have you wondered the same thing, "Has God taken His eye off the ball?" Have you ever believed the lie that evil is winning? Have you ever questioned who He "allows" to win elections, who He elevates at your workplace, who He gives a teaching certificate, or who He gives children? Then the big question, "Is God really in control or has He turned a blind eye?" God answers Habakkuk and He answers you. Habakkuk 1:5 says, ***"Look among the nations, and see; wonder and be astounded. For I am doing a work in your days that you would not believe if told."***

Habakkuk needed to be reminded that God is fully in control, God's thoughts and His ways do not often make sense, and He can use anyone or anything to bring about His purposes. Believer, we are in need of the same reminders.

Psalms 11:4 says, ***"The Lord is in his holy temple; the Lord's throne is in heaven; his eyes see, his eyelids test the children of man."*** No matter who is in charge on Earth, they answer to the God of Heaven.

Isaiah 55:8 adds, ***"For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, declares the Lord."*** God's eternal decisions often are a mystery.

Paul adds in 1 Corinthians 1:27, ***"But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong."***

God can use anyone. Do you remember Judas?

So once we wrap our mind around the truth that God does not just allow people to take positions but actually places them in authority (Romans 13:1), how are we expected to respond? I would consider myself to be a rule follower. I am obedient in my actions (mostly). My husband and I obey the laws of the land, comply with the expectations of our supervisors, and treat our parents with respect (mostly). However, Carter's response that day revealed our rebellious hearts. We were teaching him disrespect with our careless words. Believer, we must remember that all authority, good and bad, comes from God (Romans 13:1) and they are sent for our good (Romans 13:4). To rebel publicly or privately is the equivalent to rebelling against God. We are called to live a godly life and according to 1 Timothy 2:1, this includes praying for our leaders. Believer, our leaders do not need our critical, condemning words but our humble request that God would provide them with wisdom, leading, and protection.

Suggested Scripture to pray are Ephesians 1:17-18 and Colossians 1:9.
