

# God Is Near: Our Present Help in Times of Trouble "Pray Humbly Without Looking Down on Others"

Today, we continue last Sunday's theme on prayer by looking at another of Jesus' parables — the one following the persistent widow, in Luke 18:9–14, about the Pharisee and the tax collector. Before that, let us turn to the Old Testament reading in 2 Chronicles 7:14 (NIV): "If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land." Through this parable, Jesus contrasts two very different attitudes in prayer — one made by the pharisee which is filled with pride and self-righteousness. The pharisee in the parable of Jesus stands confidently in the temple, thanking God that he is "not like other people." His prayer is full of pride — he lists his good deeds and compares himself to others. The other one is made by a tax collector marked by humility and repentance. In those days, tax collectors were looked down upon by society. They worked for the Roman government, collecting taxes from their own people, and were often accused of corruption — taking more money than required for personal gain. Because of this, they were considered **sinners and traitors**. And indeed, some were — for example, Levi (also called Matthew), one of Jesus' disciples, who was a tax collector before following Christ (*Luke 5:27–32*). Yet, in this parable, the tax collector shows a **humble heart**. He stands at a distance, beats his chest, and prays, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner." His humility reveals the kind of prayer that truly reaches God. And that is what makes the difference between the tax collectors and the pharisee. Not their actions, but their humble hearts — to remember that we are fallen, and no one is good, nor is anyone rich without God, for everything is the Lord's. The Pharisees were a religious group in Jesus' time, known for strictly following the Law of **Moses.** Jesus challenged them because they focused more on outward appearance and rules than on true humility and inner righteousness before God. Jesus accused them of showing off wanting to appear clean on the outside while their hearts were unclean inside. As He said, "You clean the outside of the cup and

dish, but inside they are full of greed and self-indulgence" (Matthew 23:25).

#### What We Learn from This Parable

First, the Parable challenges us to examine our own hearts as we come before God in prayer and as we live with one another. Besides being reminded not to show pride, self-righteousness, and self-justification of being better than others, this is a challenge for our generation not to focus on material success. We are living in a time when it can feel difficult to fit into certain social classes or communities, especially when you did not privilege like others, and when you have past failures or mistakes or even false and unjustified accusations. Subjection could happen right from home even from your family members, it could happen at school, or even in the workplace. Many times, people may feel that they are helping you rather than you both helping one another. This language, or these acts of discrimination or subjection, may happen directly or indirectly. Secondly, Jesus is calling us today to recognize that we all belong to God, and that we will never be physically, materially, or intellectually, spiritual or in many other ways the same. When Jesus said, "The poor you will always be with you," Mathew 26:11. He reminded us that differences will always exist. Instead of seeing them as divisions, we can embrace them as diversities and know that they should not be a reason for pride, looking down upon others or divisions. Just like the Pharisee, it's easy to fall into the trap of judgment or pride, thinking we are better than our neighbors. As we embrace the heart of humility and kindness, we need to remember not to compare ourselves with others or measure someone against another. At the same time, we must not forget that we can share our successes, joys, and achievements in ways that are welcoming, respectful, and affirming. In doing so, we embrace one another, honor each other's dignity, and celebrate the gift of life together. We are reminded that prayer begins with humility, not recognition — with repentance, not self-justification or selfrighteousness. Prayer is not about self; it is about relationship. Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on us as sinners.

Hope UMC will be collecting both donated items and monetary donations for the Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes.


