TO BO AND BACK. 4,562 MILES.

I'm not an artist, but I want to paint a picture of Bo, Sierra Leone. The base color is definitely orange! That deep orange soil, like the red clay of Georgia. Next, layer a multitude of greens; everything is alive and lush during the rainy season. Add the grays and tans of the homemade concrete houses and thatched roofs. To these, add the most vibrant colors you can imagine...brightly painted commercial buildings, clothing and fabric exploding with patterns and color. Africa even has a distinct smell - earthy, organic, and authentic.

Africa is a complex recipe of community, exploitation, scarcity, potential, natural resources, good humor, pride, ingenuity, and most of all, hope. On one of the

first days I was in Sierra Leone, I sent a text to my dad (my lifelong travel partner) and simply said "I thought I had seen poverty, and then I came to Africa." That feeling was quickly

replaced by a sense of awe at the resourcefulness and resilience of the people of Sierra Leone. Bo is 4,562 miles from Stafford, at first sight the differences seem great, but in truth, we are far more similar. We each desire purpose, opportunity, and the best for our children.

Many of you know the story of the Cloe sisters, Mary Stuart and Frances, lifelong members of Ebenezer who chose to gift their estate to our church. Ebenezer tithed 10% of that gift, and in doing so, blessed many of our mission partners; from a new van for S.E.R.V.E. to two clean water wells in Ethiopia. And

then, there was the gift to Mercy Hospital, 4,562 miles away.

In July, I stood in the new surgical wing the Cloe sisters made

possible. I was overcome with the knowledge that two faithful servants of God, on the other side of the globe, made this building possible, but it is not just the building. It is the promise of lives saved through Mercy's ability to do surgeries for all patients – regardless of their ability to pay. The Cloe sisters couldn't have known the impact they would have on generations in Bo, but we do, and we will celebrate it endlessly!

A NOTE FROM PASTOR ROB

Why do the Bibles we use at Ebenezer have 66 books when the Bibles used by our Roman Catholic brothers and sisters have 73 books? Where did the books in the Bible come from and how did they get to us? Why were some books included and others left out? Why are the books of the Bible arranged the way they are? What is the best translation, and if I'm just beginning to read my Bible, where should I start?

The Bible is the most important book in the world. In fact, the word Bible means book. In scripture, we find the stories of Jesus upon which Christians base our lives and we find the foundations for our beliefs, our actions, and our hope. One cannot overstate the importance of this text in history.

It is curious, then, that many Christians don't know where the Bible came from, how it was translated, or why it is structured the way it is. There are many Christians who don't know how to use their Bibles in meaningful, applicable ways and culturally Biblical illiteracy is on the rise. In this digital age, Bibles are more accessible and less understood than ever.

Our September sermon series is designed to help. Throughout September we'll join in a series called Bible 101 that walks through the origins of Scripture, the reasoning behind the inclusion of certain texts and the rationale behind the Bible's structure. The goal of this series isn't, however, to help us better answer questions on Jeopardy.

A better understanding of the Bible leads to a greater proclivity to read and apply Biblical truths to our lives, for when we apply the truth of God's word, our lives are enriched and our impact on the community becomes greater, all to God's glory.

We've all heard the wisdom which states, if you want to feed someone for a day, give them a fish. If you want to feed someone for a lifetime, teach them to fish. This is a series designed to help all of us become more proficient at feeding our spiritual selves. I hope you will join us throughout September for Bible 101 as we learn more about God's word and how to apply it to our lives.

TO BO AND BACK CONTINUED

WE ARE 4,562 MILES AWAY, BUT I WANT YOU TO SEE, FEEL, AND HEAR BO.

While there, our mission team felt the nervousness of expectant mothers as they waited for hours in line to test for HIV and malaria at one of Mercy's village medical outreach clinics. We saw relief on a grown man's face when he brought his ailing mother to Mercy, knowing she will be taken care of, even though he didn't have any money. We heard the gratitude in the joyous sobs of a mother who owes her toddler son's life to God for placing our mission team member, Karen Hall, with the perfect blood type match, in Bo on the very day her son could only be saved through a transfusion.

The good news, you don't need to *go to* Bo to be part of the mission. Not everyone can, should, or wants to go to Bo. But you don't have to, God is on the ground working in Bo on our behalf. He sees our brothers and sisters and knows their struggles and their desire to improve their community and country. What does he ask of us? It almost seems silly considering real-world Bo. You only need to "Go FOR Bo."

Yes, the good work happening in Bo is partially funded through a fun family event 4,562 miles away in Stafford. Your participation in the Go For Bo race plays a large part in helping the Child Rescue Center and Mercy Hospital transform lives in Bo, Sierra Leone.

This year's \$50K in Go For Bo race sponsorships goes directly to missions in Bo, just as it has since the inception of the Go For Bo race eight years ago. Your race registration fees cover the cost of race day and an additional donation to missions in Bo.

COUNSELOR'S INSIGHT



WHAT'S NEXT? WHEN SESSIONS CONCLUDE, I AM OFTEN ASKED, "WHAT IS THE LONG-TERM PLAN?"

Interestingly, the long-term plan is pretty simple: get invested in a community of believers by joining a small group. This achieves multiple purposes. First, the Apostle Paul tells us to be in community which will encourage us in love and works (Hebrews 10:24-25). Second, Paul tells us God is the God of comfort who will comfort us in all our afflictions. This allows us to comfort others in their time of need (2 Corinthians 3-4). Being in a small group supports Christians in so many ways. As Paul stated, we can be encouraged from a place of love. This means even when you falter. you will still be surrounded by people who genuinely love you and will help you get back on your feet and move forward.

During small group discussions, people quickly realize everyone struggles. This is where the 2 Corinthians passage comes into play. When we are intentional about sharing our sufferings with others and how God supported us through those times, we can begin to come alongside other people in similar circumstances and bring them hope and healing. When we are not invested in a small group, we are not exposed to people who can help us in this manner. God calls us into community, and these are two examples of how and why that community can be the difference between feeling empowered in our struggles, or succumbing to hopeless or helpless feelings.

MISSION POSSIBLE - BRAIN BUILDERS

In his book *The Mission – Minded Guide to Church and School Partnerships*, Jake McGlothin talks about the importance of the Church-School Connection. He states that "Partnerships between churches and schools are a natural progression toward meaningful community engagement and ultimately, a glimpse into the kingdom of God." At Ebenezer we're working on building this type of relationship with Hampton Oaks Elementary School in Stafford.

One of the main activities we support at the school is the Brain Builder Afterschool Program. Brain Builders was established by our mission partner, Stafford Junction to help students who are struggling academically, but it's not just about the academics. Spending one-on-one time with the kids reminds them there are adults who care about them, not because they have to, but because they want to. The students are also given a hearty snack that helps fill the gaps if their family is struggling with food insecurity. Most importantly, Brain Builders allows us to create a community of people helping people because at the end of the day, the mission is the people.

IT IS EASY TO GET INVOLVED.

You don't need experience as a teacher, but it helps! We need caring adults who love working with children. There are two teams of tutors — one for Mondays and one for Wednesdays. You serve on one or both teams. People of all ages can volunteer, and teenagers can receive community service hours for their time.

The program is very structured – you will always be paired with a student and you will always have the guidance and materials you need to best work with your student. If you can't make a regular commitment, you can still support our Brain Builders teams by supplying snacks. This is also a great service opportunity for small groups!

Brain Builders starts for the 2018-2019 school year the first week in October on Mondays and Wednesdays from 3:30-5:00 PM. We need at least 18 volunteers each Monday and Wednesday. Interested? 

We are delighted to have local author and historian, Jane Conner as our guest speaker for Lunch and Learn: Stafford History on Tuesday, September 18 at noon. Please register at ebenezerumc. org/events/. Lunch is available for \$5. Jane Conner is a graduate of the

University of California at Santa Barbara with a degree in Early Childhood Education. Since 1979, Jane's goal was to save Government Island from development, as she recognized its historic importance to the nation. She was successful.

In 1998, the Stafford Board of Supervisors purchased the island. Later, she appeared before Congress requesting they approve the island as a National Historic Site. They did. She was delighted when the island opened up as a Stafford public park in November 2010.

Jane has received a number of awards and sits on many boards in the local community. Jane authored three books, Birthstone of the White House and Capitol, Lincoln in Stafford, and Sinners, Saints, and Soldiers in Civil War Stafford.

She refuses all proceeds from her books and contributes her book revenues to the Stafford County Museum Fund. After a year's approval process, her Birthstone book was chosen to be sold at the U.S. Capitol's bookstores.

BUILDING COMMUNITIES IS AGELESS

Unconditional belonging is the dominant need for today's teenagers. But isn't that true for everyone?

By definition, a community is a group of people living in the same place or having a particular characteristic in common. Through God a community is described as one body, sharing our lives in Christ. We were not meant to do life alone.

The teenage season is a beautiful limited moment. It's crucial that during this season they belong to a community that is going to help them grow their roots deep and know they are children of God.

Through TNT (middle school) and Axis (high school) youth groups we design everything (youth group, events, retreats) for students to be connected into small groups with incredible adult leaders to experience that community. This past summer, the high school students went on a mission trip to Beckley, WV.

During the week, the students served the community of Beckley in a variety of ways: leading a Kids Club for 60-70 kids; helping with a local VBS; cleaning out the Salvation Army Thrift Store; and painting and doing maintenance on several local homes. Prior to going on the trip, the students commit to being in small groups with other students and an adult going on the trip. Those small groups meet and grow together.

The students also commit to serving in our local community and church. By the time we go on the mission trip students are ready to invest in the towns we go to serve.


