A NOTE FROM PASTOR EMILY

Grace and peace to each of you.

Seeing school supplies appear on store shelves every year makes me excited. As a student, I loved getting highlighters, notebooks, and pencils. Now, I love buying them for others. In July, our church community pulled together to provide backpacks filled with school supplies for 220 kids in need at Moncure and Hampton Oaks Elementary Schools. What an impact! Each school year brings new rhythms and new opportunities for students. What will they study? Who will they meet? How will they grow? What teachers will make an impression? They build on the strength of previous years, and the possibilities ahead are exciting.

Getting ready for a new season of ministry is similar. We ask questions as fall peeks around the corner, and new rhythms begin. What will we study in Scripture together? Who will we meet? How will we build meaningful connections with others here and in the community? How will we grow as disciples? How will we make an impact by serving? We build on the strength of previous years, and the possibilities ahead are exciting.

The impact of COVID changed our baseline, and now we learn and shape what it is to be church onsite, online, and offsite in familiar and innovative ways. We are working to build intentional community and relationship across this

three-pronged spectrum. Pastor Jeff is working with our dedicated ministry directors in small groups, agelevel ministries, and missions to connect new folks to service, worship,



and growth. Pastor Donovan is setting a strong course for the community-based Love Your Neighbor Network. He is developing goals, training, and mapping out next steps to meet people where they are, taking real love to the real world around us. All three of your pastors are taking turns being present in online worship and seeking to build connections there.

These are exciting, dynamic, and occasionally bumpy times. We have over 50 new members so far this year and over 25 baptisms. God is moving, and we want to follow wherever Christ leads and be ready to learn from him. May we keep the main thing the main thing - loving God and loving others - and be faithful disciples while we live out our mission to transform lives through Jesus Christ as we connect, heal, and bring hope to the world.

Upcoming Sermon Series

Stronger (Sept 11-Oct 9)

Division and polarization define our culture. Yet in John 17:20-24, Jesus prayed for unity. What if we examine how we view, interact with, and treat each other when we disagree? What does scripture teach about building bridges and relationships? May we, by the grace and power of God, be a strength for each other instead of a threat as we pray for our community, build relationships, and put our trust in God.

A NOTE FROM PASTOR JEFF

Beautiful and Beloved People of Ebenezer Church!

For years on the apple farm, we had this worn-out Chevy truck that we used to haul bins of apples from the orchard to the market. This truck was not only for farm use; it was also my uncle's main source of transportation. The truck burned so much oil that instead of changing the oil, my uncle just added oil every day. Instead of using new oil, he used old oil saved from other people's oil changes.

In the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke, Jesus said there was no use putting fresh wine into old skins, because the old, stiff, brittle skins would burst. Putting new wine in old skins would be like putting new oil in a wornout motor. The new oil would burn off and be wasted.

Jesus was trying to do something new, but the Pharisees and others were blocking him at every turn. Jesus knew that loving neighbors and having compassion for the least, last, and lost would break the old barriers of the law like fermented wine bursting old wineskins. While Jesus had great respect for tradition as the "living faith of the dead," he was troubled that the Pharisees' rules had become "the dead faith of the living." Their legalism was more important than their love of God and neighbor, and their faith was inflexible and hard.

Friends, the Kingdom of God requires a new wineskin for the new wine of God's grace. If we want new life and lasting joy, we must let God replace our old wineskins with new ones: new discipleship classes, new missional experiences, new small groups, and new ways to share our gifts. You'll find many new "wineskin" opportunities this fall at Ebenezer, including the Go For Bo 5K, 1-Mile Fun Run and Tot Dash at Stafford Regional Airport, the

> Imagination Library Pumpkin Patch, and Fall Family Fun Days.

My prayer is that we live into our new wineskins and overflow with the new wine of God's grace, as we serve God and our neighbors. Thanks be to God for new wine and new wineskins!

2022 VIRGINIA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The 2022 Virginia Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church was held June 16-18 in Hampton, Va. Andy and Linda Garlington attended as Ebenezer's lay representatives and provided these highlights. Read their full report at ebenezerumc.org/church.

The theme of the 2022 conference was "United as One in Worship," based on John 4:24. Conference Statistician and Treasurer David Dommisse reported that even during the second full year of COVID, the number of new members and baptisms increased. Over 2,000 people were welcomed through professions of faith, and over 1.3 million people were reached through missions.

Clergy and lay members approved the District Initiative, a motion to create eight new districts from the current 16-district structure. Ebenezer is now in the Mission Rivers District under the Rev. Dr. Charles Bates, which spans from Stafford to Hampton and encompasses the previous Rappahannock River and York River districts. A map of these new districts may be

Forty-two individuals were part of the 2022 Retirement Class, including Pastor Mark Miller, who was Ebenezer's lead pastor for 22 years. The retiring personnel have a combined total of 1.154.5 years of service. Attendees also recognized 50 individuals who were licensed, commissioned, or ordained in 2020 and

The Rev. Grace Han, pastor of Trinity UMC, Alexandria District, led the Service of Remembrance in honor of 77 conference clergy and laity who have passed away since the last Annual Conference. In conclusion, she offered words of hope in the midst of a season of challenges: "...what we'll also see tonight is that it is precisely in our most difficult moments in the shadows of the darkest valleys that God is with us. And just as God's presence was a Balm for the Israelite people in our Scriptures generations ago. God's presence is a Balm for us today. And that is worth remembering."

FOCUS 2025

Focus 2025 is our long-range vision as a church, guiding us to live into our mission statement together. As we met with community leaders this year, several primary concerns rose to the top. We have grouped those in four focus teams that are drafting actionable items and budgets.

ONLINE ENGAGEMENT: This team will work to improve our engagement with our online community, through the Ebenezer website, social media accounts, and Church Online congregation.

MENTAL HEALTH ENGAGEMENT: In addition to the recent expansion of our existing counseling services, this team will identify other ways to assist members of our congregation and community in this important area.

NEIGHBORHOOD ENGAGEMENT: This team's goal is to have a microchurch or small group in every neighborhood in our community. Working with the Love Your Neighbor Network, they will identify ways to expand our discipleship model to spread the Word.

IDEA BANK: This team will develop a bank of ideas and needs that small groups and others could 'adopt' to provide service opportunities within the community.

Watch for updates as these teams develop practical ways for us to put our mission statement into action.

Counselor's Corner



This summer. I led a book study on Forgiving What You Can't Forget by Lysa Terkeurst. Here is one participant's experience:

"Participating in the Forgiving What You Can't Forget group study was useful to me in several ways. Lysa Terkeurst's writing style is so personal but is always connected to scripture. Reading the book helped bring some things to light for me. Before this, I thought that if I had truly forgiven someone, it wouldn't still hurt or affect how I interacted with other people. I also felt like I was falling short of one of the most basic things that God asks of us: forgive others. Lysa helped me understand that forgiveness doesn't mean that everything is fixed, and the impact isn't always undone.

The most important part of participating in this study was coming together as a group. I've read similar books in the past and completed the related studies on my own but completing the study in community makes it more powerful. It's helpful to hear that I'm not the only one who feels this way. Listening and supporting each other also helps make things clearer, and hearing other perspectives is important. One of the most powerful moments for me was when I recommended a different way of looking at another group member's situation, and shortly after that it struck me that the same thing applied to me. That helped me reset a negative perspective and strengthened my faith. Being in this open, supportive group was a great experience."

Forgiving ourselves and extending forgiveness to others are among the more difficult tasks that Christ calls us to accomplish. We will offer Forgiving What You Can't Forget again in January 2023, but if you're ready to begin working on forgiveness sooner, please contact me at kpriest@ebenezerumc.org.

A NOTE FROM PASTOR DONOVAN

Ebenezer & Love Your Neighbor Network,

Eleven years ago, a 5.8 magnitude earthquake caused some shaking in the greater Washington, D.C. area. Many buildings bowed and broke during this unlikely incident. Afterward, a meticulous and faithful process of restoration was applied to dozens of structures, and a majority have now been fixed and are once again usable. This reminded me that shifting can occasionally result in fractures, cracks, and fragmentation.



This prompts me to inquire about your soul. As the summer closes, we will soon return to our regular schedules. Setting consistent pick-up and drop-off times for kids' schools, scheduling a dependable ride to and from work, returning to the gym, and attending our preferred worship service are all part of this. **Shifting** is the theme of this time of year.

I encourage you to keep the care of your soul in mind as we enter a new season of the year and our lives. As we start to occupy ourselves once more, do so with community, connection, and compassion. Join a community where you can stay connected to God through spiritual means of grace. Spend some time reflecting on your life to identify your current situation, your desired outcome, and the best course of action.

Paul reminds us, "We are persecuted, but God does not leave us. We are hurt sometimes, but we are not destroyed." (I Corinthians 4:9)

The mission of the Love Your Neighbor Network is to "take real love into the real world." We do this by being present and doing life with others. Many people are faithful, fractured, or both. We are called to reach them and walk with them through a careful process of healing and strengthening. We accomplish this by building up leaders to serve fresh expression groups and microchurches. Fresh expression groups help others connect over a shared love of something (knitting, baseball, board games), while microchurches are smaller expressions of worship, discipleship, and mission. Within the next couple of months, the Love Your Neighbor Network will seek out individuals to guide these groups, then develop them as spiritual leaders and send them to form a community.

A Note from the Governing Board

An earlier version of this letter was shared with the congregation on June 22, 2022, in an email. We have since updated some information and are discerning next steps in sharing information, answering questions, and hearing feedback.

Dear Ebenezer Church Family,

Blessings to you. As your Governing Board, we recognize that the past few years have been somewhat tumultuous for the larger United Methodist Church. Decisions made at the 2019 General Conference and the postponement of the next General Conference until 2024 leave many issues unresolved.

The denomination affirms that all people are of sacred worth and are equally valuable in the sight of God, but issues revolve around whether persons who are self-avowed, practicing homosexuals may be ordained as pastors and whether ceremonies that celebrate same-sex weddings or unions may occur in United Methodist churches. Neither is currently allowed by the United Methodist *Book* of Discipline. The Book of Discipline is the guiding book for the denomination around church doctrine, structure, and social principles. We do not know if the Book of Discipline may change in 2024 or 2028 in the next General Conference sessions. General Conference is the worldwide meeting of the denomination held every four years; this is the only body with the authority to change the Book of Discipline. At Ebenezer, as in the Virginia United Methodist Conference, we will continue to follow the Book of Discipline.

Because of these matters, a small percentage of congregations nationwide have decided to leave our denomination. We understand that you have questions regarding where Ebenezer Church stands on these issues and the intentions of Ebenezer's leadership. We have been praying and discerning for many months around these questions and

want to address them as transparently as possible. Any decision we make as a congregation about our denomination must begin with remembering who we are as United Methodists. To this end, the Governing Board has spent time rereading our founding articles and statements of faith. We are scheduling informational meetings, listening sessions, and putting together a Frequently Asked Questions guide (which will be available on the church website or upon request) so that we can hear your thoughts, provide clarity, correct misinformation, and answer questions.

The United Methodist Book of Discipline affirms that we are anchored in Scripture and a theology of grace, and our mission at Ebenezer reflects this: To transform lives through Jesus Christ as we connect, heal, and bring hope to the world. We are disciples committed to making disciples, focused on what Jesus says is most important: loving God with all that we are and loving our neighbors as ourselves. As United Methodists, we agree on the core tenets of our faith while embracing the diversity of scriptural interpretation. We are a church where the Holy Spirit is active, where people 'do life' together, showing the light and love of Jesus to all in our neighborhood and community.

The process defined by the conference stipulates that the Governing Board is the body to initiate the process to disaffiliate, or leave, the United Methodist Church. At this time, after prayerful consideration, meetings, a rereading of our founding articles and statements of faith, and learning more about the disaffiliation process, we as the Governing Board do not intend to initiate the process to leave the United Methodist Church. We feel that joining a different denomination would alienate a large portion of our congregation and render us unable to fully live into our mission to love and welcome everyone even those who interpret portions of the Bible differently.

We realize that this news may be a relief for some and disappointing for others. We also recognize that some of you wish to discuss these issues further.

Please know that whether you agree or disagree with our reasoning, you are a beloved part of Ebenezer, and your point of view is valued. We welcome your thoughts. At Ebenezer, we have a wide range of beliefs and questions around these issues. We have persons at all points along the spectrum, left to right and center. We firmly believe that we all share a love for Christ and can worship together as people who think or feel differently on these questions; this is who we have been and already are as Ebenezer Church.

We will continue to follow and share denominational developments as they occur. More information about General Conference decisions is also available on the State of the Church on the church website. If you would prefer a printed copy, please contact the church office. If you have questions for the pastors or Governing Board, please feel free to speak with anyone on the Board or send an email to ebenezerinfo@ ebenezerumc.org. We will host a Town Hall and multiple listening sessions in October. Scan the QR code below for more information.

In the meantime, we are not standing idle. We continue to move forward, making a difference in people's lives by faith and carrying on the Methodist movement of grace, which is rooted in Scripture and the life and teaching of our Savior, Jesus Christ. We believe the future of Ebenezer United Methodist Church is one of hope and purpose, and we invite you to navigate it together.

I was thinking the other day that church is like an iceberg. The top 10% of the iceberg the portion visible above the surface - is worship on Sunday morning. It's the staff and pastors and band. It's the folks at the front door and the ushers who help you find a seat. But what most don't realize is that 90% of church is unseen.

Sunday worship is not the only thing God commands us to do. "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Mark 10:45) Jesus came to earth to serve others; we are like Him when we respond to the calling God puts on our hearts.

STUDENT MINISTRIES SUMMER MISSION TRIP

In June, 47 high school students and leaders experienced God's real and transformative love on our Summer Mission Trip to Harrisburg, PA. In partnership with Youthworks, we were able to come alongside and be part of the incredible things happening in the community. It was a beautiful week of getting to know the people of Harrisburg and embracing real love. As students served and formed relationships, they discovered that God is at work everywhere and that we can join Him in His work anywhere.

In the Allison Hill neighborhood, students worked with Wildheart Ministries on beautification projects

such as weeding, cleaning up empty lots, and planting flowers. They also served at a summer enrichment camp at the Allison Hill Community Center that provides a safe place for kids to play, learn, and grow. Students serving meals at the Bethesda Men's Mission heard many stories of life change. The shelter points residents toward Jesus, providing medical care, mental health



resources, and life skills along the way. Teams volunteering at the Midwest Food Bank shared the love of Christ by supporting multiple agencies on the front lines of the fight against hunger.


PUMPKIN PATCH & FALL FAMILY FUN DAYS
