

The Beginning of the Good News

Mark 1:1–11

Main Idea

Mark wastes no time. Jesus doesn't slowly build credibility—**He just shows up**, backed by powerful references:

- **John the Baptist**, the prophetic forerunner
- **God the Father**, who publicly affirms Him

From the very first lines, Mark wants us to know: *This is good news—and it's worth paying attention to.*

Opening Question (Icebreaker)

- When you hear the phrase “*good news*,” what usually comes to mind?
- What makes news feel believable or trustworthy to you?

The Passage

Tell it, rebuild it, then read **Mark 1:1–11** aloud together.

Observation & Discovery

1. What stands out to you in this passage?
2. How does Mark introduce Jesus differently than you might expect?
3. What do we learn about **John the Baptist** and his role?
4. What happens at Jesus' baptism—and why do you think it matters?

Understanding Mark's Perspective

- Mark doesn't include a birth story or long background. Why do you think he starts this way?
- How do **John's words** and **God's voice** help establish who Jesus is?
- What does this tell us about what Mark wants readers to focus on?

- *Key Insight:*
Mark's gospel begins with action, authority, and affirmation. Jesus arrives already identified as the Son of God.

Making Disciples: The Good News Begins

Mark opens with a declaration: "*The beginning of the good news about Jesus the Messiah.*"

Before Jesus says or does anything, people are being prepared to encounter Him.

- John's role is not to draw attention to himself but to point people toward Jesus.
- Discipleship often begins when someone helps us notice who Jesus is.

Discussion

- Who has God used to help you first hear or notice the good news about Jesus?
- Who in your life might God be inviting you to gently point toward Him?

Growing Disciples: Identity Before Activity

At Jesus' baptism, the Father speaks and the Spirit descends. Before Jesus begins His public ministry, His identity is affirmed.

- Growth flows from knowing who we are and whose we are.
- Faith deepens as we trust what God says about Jesus—and about us.

Discussion

- Why do you think Mark shows God's affirmation before Jesus does any ministry?

- How does understanding who Jesus is help you grow in faith or obedience?
- Where do you sense God inviting you to grow right now?

Unleashing Disciples: The Mission Moves Forward

Immediately after this passage, Jesus steps into His mission. The good news is not meant to stop with one person—it moves outward.

- Those who encounter Jesus are sent to live out and share the good news.
- God often uses ordinary people to prepare the way for others.

Discussion

- What might it look like for the good news to move through you this week?
- How could your story of encountering Jesus encourage someone else?

Personal Application

Choose one or two:

- What does “*the beginning of the good news*” look like in your own life?
- How did you first experience Jesus?
- If you’re unsure about faith:
 - o What would it look like to honestly explore who Jesus is?
 - o What questions would you want answered?

Next Step

- One way I will respond to this passage this week is:

- o Learning more about Jesus
- o Growing in trust or obedience
- o Sharing or living out the good news with someone else
