

Rector's Report for the St. Mark's annual meeting on Sunday, January 24, 2021

Where to start? Maybe from where we left off, a year ago. The concluding sentence of my rector's report at last year's annual meeting was this: "I love the old adage that if you want to make God laugh, show her your plans. With that in mind, we will walk forward with plans and faith!" Last January, we had plans and we had faith, and then we met the invisible, menacing viral particle that invades human cells, reproduces itself and catches a ride into its next victim on exhaled and inhaled breath. It was a year ago this week that the first case of Covid19 was diagnosed in the U.S. On Sunday, March 15, with the tidal wave of Covid19 virus crashing over us, the building at 393 N. Main Street was closed. But the church, the body of Christ, remained wide open as we worshiped and celebrated the Eucharist through a live Facebook feed. The following Sunday, we worshiped together on Zoom and have been Zooming worship, Bible studies, vestry meetings, men's and women's groups, Preschool classes and AA meetings ever since. And we have learned new Beatitude: "Blessed are the muted, for they shall be unmuted."

The kingdom of God is here. That is what Jesus preaches at the start of his ministry, throughout his ministry, and through his disciples, is what he is preaching right now. Jesus proclaims that the Kingdom of God is good news, and not just information to believe in with our honed intellects, but something to see, touch and be part of it. When Jesus calls Simon and Andrew and the Zebedee brothers, James and John, these four grown men drop everything, their nets, the fish, the oars and go. Following Jesus wasn't as much of a carefully deliberated decision as it was an immediate response to an indescribable joy and hope in their hearts that they had never felt before. They weren't hypnotized or drugged. They just went. They didn't know where they would go or what would happen to them, but they wanted to follow Jesus and to know more about and be part of the good news that he said is here. Where does Jesus take them? Not into the wilderness or to Jerusalem but from the seaside into their own community, Capernaum, and right into Simon and Andrew's house. This is what the Gospel of Mark is telling us, that the kingdom of God is here, not out there, but here in my house and in your house and in every house, everywhere.

Many of us watched the inauguration ceremonies last Wednesday. For me, the shining moment was when a young woman wearing a bright yellow coat ascended the podium and began to recite a poem:

The new dawn blooms as we free it For there is always light, if only we're brave enough to see it If only we're brave enough to be it

This to me is pure Gospel, good news as revealed in our Gospels and through the body of Christ, the church, to see and be.

A new dawn was before us last year and is again before us now. The good news that the Kingdom of God is here is not just for the third Sunday in January or just for Sundays but is before us every day, whether we see it or not. For the past 123 years, St. Mark's has been following Jesus, sometimes timidly, sometimes boldly, and sometimes from a distance. But we are on the path, with our eyes to the future, and with the eyes of those who came before us, on us. In 2020, we followed Jesus into the fear and reality of the pandemic, stumbling at times, but as a community, we held together with faith and determination. With the safety and well-being of everyone in mind, we completed a seamless switch from in-person to Zoom worship in one week. Melissa Gonzalez, our communications administrator, Dellana Mote, our office manager, Daniel Segner, our director of music, and Laura Waterman, our office assistant, and others all worked together to create a worship experience that is real-time, interactive and accessible to almost everyone who has an iPad, cell phone, computer or telephone. Zoom worship is not a polished production but an actual human gathering, and a way for us to see and hear each other and make live-giving connections. These connections have been and are a light in the darkness over the past ten months. An unexpected joy has been the participation of people from other states and countries. Last Sunday, Zoom attendees were from Glen Ellyn and surrounding suburbs, Ohio, Minnesota, Arizona, Tennessee, Florida and Missouri. On Easter Sunday, we were able to say Alleluias with those in Uganda, Bahrain and Mexico. Getting the hang of Zoom

early on in the pandemic meant that we were able to continue almost all church activities and gatherings online in real-time. Thanks to the leadership Kristine Osmond, the director of the St. Mark's Preschool and the preschool teachers, the preschoolers met with their teachers on Zoom and were able to continue programming to finish out the school year. We also learned more about how to use YouTube for uploading worship services and to record special messages, Bible stories for children, concerts, newcomer classes and Bible studies. Our YouTube channel is an accessible treasure trove of the life of St. Mark's. Likewise, Facebook has been an important medium for communication. We live stream the 1 pm Sunday service in Spanish on Facebook where we are joined by viewers from around the Chicago area, Mexico, Columbia and other countries and from our companion parish, San Marcos, in El Nigromante, Mexcio. Through Zoom, we celebrated Dolores Dunnett and sang Happy Birthday on her 100th in March. Even during a pandemic, St. Mark's continued its mission of service and outreach to the community. Again through Zoom, St. Mark's hosted fundraising events for the Glen Ellyn Food Pantry and DuPagePads. Last Sunday evening, through Zoom, we hosted an interfaith gathering for the Glen Ellyn area community called "We Still Have a Dream" attended by more than 125 participants on Zoom plus others on YouTube and Facebook. Through Zoom, St. Mark's coordinated gatherings of Episcopal churches in our diocese to celebrate the festival of the Virgin of Guadalupe and the Advent tradition of Posadas. Some of our programs continued in-person, like the Parents' Day Out Program, under the leadership of Kathy O'Rourke, by following all required state guidelines and instituting strict protocols, and the St. Mark's Preschool which creatively has used spaces around St. Mark's to create outdoor classroom, where children and teachers are engaged in the Reggio Emilia philosophy of education in all weather conditions.

The pandemic has shown how important and life-giving our connections to each other are. In March and April, the vestry and other volunteers made two sets of phone calls to every St. Mark's household. Senior warden, Bill Kalbflesich made 50 calls in two days. Jose Arroyo, Miguel Briones and Irma Solorzano contacted every household where Spanish is spoken. The St. Mark's web site, our weekly Constant Contact emails along and snail mailings round out the ways that we have stayed connected.

When Andrew and Simon followed Jesus into their own home they witnessed a healing miracle. Simon's mother-in-law, was in bed with a fever. Jesus took her by the hand and the fever left her. The good news that the Kingdom of God is here brings healing. During the pandemic, St. Mark's has doubled its efforts to pray for and support those who are sick or in any trouble. Behind the prayer list that appears every Sunday in the bulletin and Prayers of the People is a living and dynamic ministry. Rebecca Sandrock for the last four years has kept our prayer list up to date, and now Becky DeBlois is continuing this important ministry. Our team of Prayer Providers is assigned specific names on the list who are prayed for daily. And our pastoral care team supervised by Jo Ann Lagman is responding to special pastoral care needs through visits, phone calls and follow-ups.

The good news of God's Kingdom meets and accompanies the grief and loss of our world. During 2020, we experienced the grief of the unknown, loneliness, sickness and loss of life. This past week marked the horrific milestone of 400,000 deaths from Covid19 in the United States. The pandemic has constrained our ability to gather in person to do the work of grieving, but we have grieved, grieved the deaths of members of St. Mark's including Bob Judd, Andy Carter, Peggy Heilig and Nancy Schmitt.

Following Jesus means encountering the unexpected and then seeing the world in a new way. This has been the experience of the St. Mark's Reopening Committee, faithfully chaired by Joanie Somerville. This committee has done the research and hard work of putting guidelines in place for how we can and will gather in person safely as the Covid conditions change. Thanks to the work of this committee, we were able to hold in-person Sunday services in September and October, a wedding in July and communion-to-go in the fall. New dispensers for hand sanitizer and soap have been installed and the entire building has been disinfected. When we are able gather in person again, we have smart and flexible protocols to keep everyone safe.

In the midst of the worst of the uncertainty and restrictions of the pandemic during April and May, our pledge and other revenues dropped sharply. With pressure on our cash reserves, St. Mark's applied for and received a government PPP loan. These funds went to paying salaries for our church staff and PDO and Preschool teachers.

Our treasurer, Steve Sedall and our accountant, Chris Ponstein, handled the complicated filing and timing requirements which resulted in a successful application and disbursement of funds to St. Mark's. As a result of receiving the PPP loan, which is expected to become a grant that does not need to be repaid, the church's finances are in a strong position as can be seen in the Treasurer's report for 2020.

Our Giving Campaign committee chaired by Andrew Wassef and Jeane Tschampa-Lopotko successfully conducted a first phase of the campaign for 2021 through email notifications, saving paper and manpower resources that are needed for printed materials. So far, St. Mark's has received over 215 pledges representing \$600,000 in expected giving for 2021. The work of seeking additional pledges for 2021 from our church family will continue in order to secure a strong base for funding our staff, facilities and outreach.

As followers of Jesus, our ongoing work is to share the good news of the Kingdom in word and deed. Our outreach commitments and projects are good news, and in 2020, with careful and creative planning and with the guidance of the Reopening Committee, we were able to safely and successfully hold the ASP (Appalachia Service Project) flower sale, the mum sale for the Walk-in Ministry and the Pumpkin Patch for DuPagePads. Cindy and John Glavin headed the ASP flower sale, Wes Clay-Anderson and John Zelman the mum sale, and Phil Adler the Pumpkin Patch. The mums sold out in one day, the Pumpkin Patch recording its second highest gross sales, and our yards were more beautiful than ever. All of this resulted in thousands of dollars for our partners, ASP, the Walk-in Ministry and DuPagePads.

The good news of the Kingdom encounters and uncovers both physical and societal illnesses. In Mark's Gospel, Jesus traverses a society where outcasts suffer judgement and scorn. In 2020, with the killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor and other people of color, we saw the scourge of racism uncovered in new and horrific ways in our nation. In October, St. Mark's responded to the pandemic of racism by installing a very visible sign that says Black Lives Matter, hand-painted by Steve Gross. The sign continues to stand where it was placed in front of the church's library facing Main Street. As pastor and friend Dr. James Shannon told me, "George, we could put that sign in front of our church, but the people in my congregation know that Black lives matter. But if a church like St. Mark's puts up the sign, that makes a powerful statement." The sign went up and yes, there were reactions, both positive and negative. The sign has not been damaged, but before the election, someone draped it with a Trump flag. Then someone placed a poster in front of it that said "All lives matter....not just black lives." Putting up a sign is both a very small step but an important one. In our tense national climate, the message "Black Lives Matter" has been construed to mean many untrue things, including support for Marxism and violence and for being against our veterans, churches and families. In our nation's history, when racism is confronted, leaders and messages are undermined and smeared. Martin Luther King was called a communist by those who opposed the Civil Rights Movement and wanted to discredit him. In 2020, having a Black Lives Matter sign has meant paying a price. Several members of St. Mark's have left the church, some who had been members for decades. This tears the fabric of our community, and I grieve it. With the support of the vestry and our church community, the Black Lives Matter will remain where it is for now. We are taking another small step into the difficult reality and sin of racism by forming what are called Sacred Ground dialogue circles. Members of St. Mark's are invited to be part of small groups that will meet 10 times over four months using a program developed by the Episcopal Church to discuss and explore the intersection of race and faith. Leaders for these groups will include Deacon Tom Craighead and Lindsey Paris-Lopez.

In the first chapter of Mark's Gospel, we find out the Jesus went out to a deserted place to pray and be refreshed. In 2020, my deserted place was northern Minnesota, where I spent a majority of my three-month sabbatical. Taking a sabbatical during a pandemic was not a decision without deep deliberation and consultation with the wardens and other St. Mark's leaders. With Stacy Alan as our sabbatical rector, and the capable leadership of Bill Kalbfleisch and Lynn Dornblaser, St. Mark's was in good hands and not only survived but experienced growth in leadership and creativity. What I discovered is how much I needed a sabbatical and how some extended time off prepared me for the challenges of the second half of 2020. Taking a sabbatical may have seemed irresponsible to some (an anonymous letter I received said so), but I am convinced it was the right decision, and I am truly grateful to have had time to rest, make paths in the woods, and spend quiet time with my family.

Jesus calls us to follow him as disciples into the living body we call the church. In 2020, the body of St. Mark's was blessed with the addition of Jo Ann Lagman as our ministry associate and Lydia Pendleton as our director of youth ministries. Jo Ann is a candidate for ordination to holy orders, and will be ordained to the diaconate and priesthood in 2021 by our new bishop-elect, Paula E. Clark. Jo Ann is a valued colleague and vital addition to our ministry team. Most of us have gotten to know her during the pandemic through her calm, clear and yet provocative preaching. She also offers leadership to our pastoral care team and outreach programs. Lydia took the helm of our youth ministry when Justin Backstrom returned to being a full-time student in Chiropractic medicine. On-boarding during the pandemic, Lydia has kept our youth connected through Zoom meetings and in-person activities. Last May, our yet-to-be confirmed but ready-for-confirmation confirmands gave truly profound reflections during our Sunday Zoom services. This was one of many shining moments during the darkness of the pandemic. Another standout moment was the Christmas Pageant involving lambs, angels and the characters of the Christmas story, organized, rehearsed and conducted by Gina Wood, who along with Diane Hessinger, lead our children's ministry. After a moment of technical delay, the Angel Gabriel (Soren Alcorn), appeared with golden wings in front of a dreamy aurora borealis background. At that moment, with smiles across Zoom, I knew we were experiencing the true meaning of Christmas.

As we follow Jesus in the coming year, we will continue to face both challenges and opportunities. If we've learned anything about Covid19, it is to not be too sure about anything. There are several variants that are more contagious and already here in the Chicago area. When we have the green light to return to in-person worship, we will make sure that we are careful and follow protocols that keep us safe. If needed, we can at a moment's notice return to 100% Zoom meetings. And while there will be challenges and the unknown, we must be ambassadors of the Gospel by engaging our hearts and minds in the act of dreaming about how we, St. Mark's, will be the good news of the Kingdom. Already, leaders from St. Mark's and Calvary Episcopal Church in Lombard have had several meetings to consider ways that our two churches can work together to create a wider and stronger Episcopal witness. Kim Reed has plans for a second trip St. Mark's sponsored trip to El Nigromante to bring professional dental care to children and adults, many of whom have never been able to see a dentist. Another dream to explore is how St. Mark's will invite and welcome new people into our church community in new ways. We are fortunate to have leadership in people like Carrie Gowans who serves on the vestry and oversees our newcomer ministry. There is surely pent-up interest and a desire for people who don't know St. Mark's to find out about what a welcoming, inclusive and Christ-centered community looks like and how it can change their lives, just as the lives of Simon and Andrew, James and John were changed. And for St. Mark's, this means sharing the good news in English and Spanish. While worshipping on Zoom has kept us connected, the 1 pm service in Spanish has experienced a drop in participation. I have no doubt that the remnant that faithfully continues to worship and gather for classes and Bible studies will be the seed for new growth and for regathering for people who are seeking community and love liturgy in Spanish and special traditions like quinceañeras and Posadas.

The good news is here and now. Turning again to Amanda Gorman, who put hope to pen, to our ears and to our hearts proclaimed:

Let the globe, if nothing else, say this is true:
That even as we grieved, we grew
That even as we hurt, we hoped
That even as we tired, we tried
That we'll forever be tied together, victorious
And so we lift our gazes not to what stands between us but what stands before us.

Warden's Report for Annual Meeting 2021

What a year. It was a year that started out like any other—we welcomed new leadership and new members, the vestry had a retreat to talk about initiatives, and we made plans for the year.

Then it was March 11. We all heard that businesses were likely to shut down; it was unclear about churches until a decision from Bishop Lee the next day. So, we pivoted. The wardens, Fr. George, Melissa Gonzalez, Dellana Mote, and many others on the vestry and in church leadership had flurries of emails back and forth to figure out HOW we were going to do this. What the congregation saw was a pretty smooth transition (mission accomplished!), with our first Zoom church service on March 15. Since that time, we have had every kind of meeting and gathering on Zoom, including Easter and Christmas services, musical fund-raising events, and most St. Mark's groups making the shift to meeting virtually.

As the year progressed, the vestry dealt with many issues: having the roof-top AC units replaced, repairing the Columbarium stairs, dealing with the PPP loan, and wrestling with the ever-shifting budget. We handled many new and challenging issues, including forming a re-opening committee, headed by Joanie Somerville, to navigate the shifting rules and guidelines of what we could and could not do. We welcomed Rev. Stacy Alan as our interim while Fr. George took a much-needed sabbatical.

It was a challenging year for the vestry, but there were some very bright lights. We worked hard to connect with congregants who could not get out, making sure they had what they needed, including interaction with others. We figured out how to do a wedding during the summer (tricky, but it worked), approved the erection of a Black Lives Matter sign outside the building, and in the fall opened in a very small and controlled way for limited in-person worship.



St. Mark's Episcopal Church Summary Financial Report December 2020 Year to Date



As of December 31, 2020 St. Mark's YTD operating net was essentially flat from November 2020 to a loss of \$62,628 and ramained significantly below budget by \$62,627. Actual pledges received of \$598,557 were below budget by \$41,443. The operating shortfall continues largely due to several one time expenses as well as the economic shutdown and the subsequent closing of St, Mark's facilities. St. Mark's cash position continues to be adequate, improving to \$203,669 available for current operations, a \$25,253 increase from November. St. Mark's still has significant long term liabilities - Mortgages and the Diocesan Loan. If there are any comments or questions, contact Jim Treleaven at jbtreleaven@yahoo.com. Psycheck Protection Program (PPP) Loan established in 2020 by the US Federal Government's Coronavirus AM, Italief, and Economic Security Act
[CARES Act) and administered by the Small Business Administration (SBA). The PPP Loan program was designed to help small businesses, including
nomprofits, to lase their workforce employed during the Covid-19 crisis. The PPP Loan proceeds could be used for psycol costs, mortgage interest,
rest, and utilities (i.e., eligible superses). The PPP Loan is eligible for forgiveness (and essentially becomes a grant) if it is used to pay eligible
empenses. St. Mark's used R PPP Loan proceeds to pay its psycol costs during April through June 2020. St. Mark's fus applied for loan forgiveness
and fully expects that its PPP Loan will be forgiven in early 2021.

St. Mark's Endowment Fund

In November 2017, the Vestry of St. Mark's voted to establish the Endowment Fund of St. Mark's Episcopal Church ("Trust") to "benefit St. Mark's for so long as it operates as an Episcopal church for the benefit of Glen Ellyn and its surrounding communities." The Trust is intended to exist in perpetuity and there is an expectation that the Trust will grow over time through parishioners' donations. Under the Trust Instrument, three Trustees are appointed by the Vestry to fill staggered three-year terms. The Trustees appointed by the Vestry for 2020 were Leo Lanzillo, Dick Anstee and Elizabeth Lewis. Chip Johnson was appointed to replace Dick Anstee starting in 2021. The Trust documents establish a perpetual trust fund and allows the addition of "designated purpose funds" (including those heretofore made to St. Mark's). The assets of all designated purpose funds and other Trust assets shall be commingled and invested by the Trustees. Combining our various investment accounts in this way allows the Trustees to achieve better investment results and simplifies management and record keeping. The Trustees have selected the Common Fund of the Episcopal Diocese of Chicago, commonly known as the "Diocesan Foundation" to hold the Trust funds. Founded in 1952, the Diocesan Foundation is a collective investment vehicle currently serving more than 35 parish and group investors. At the end of 2019, its net asset value topped \$29 million. The Diocesan Foundation's average annual total return has been 8.3% for the past ten years, 7.2% for the past five years, and 9.2% for the past three years.

St. Mark's established four fund accounts with the Diocesan Foundation. The General Endowment Fund is a perpetual trust account. The Lewis Trust Fund, the Carey Music Fund, and the Augusta Pahnke and Mary Peck Fund are designated purpose funds. On November 16, 2020, the Trustees approved the recommendation of the Finance Committee to move \$10,000 from the columbarium fund to the General Endowment Fund, such transfer to be completed by December 31, 2020.

The annual distributable amount for the General Endowment Fund is 4% to 5% of the fund balance at the end of the prior year. Those funds are paid annually to the St. Mark's Treasurer on February 1st and can be used for: (1) "the purchase, construction, installation, and repair of its capital improvements, (2) outreach and missionary projects and (3) special one-time projects (and not for usual and ordinary expenses and maintenance of St. Mark's)." The Carey Music Fund is subject to the same distribution as the General Fund (4% to 5% per year) with the designated purpose of providing regular tuning, servicing, and maintenance of St. Mark's Episcopal Church's pianos (including replacement as necessary) and the Walker Organ.

The distributable amount of the Pahnke/Peck Fund will be 90% of income received during the year. The amount will be paid annually to the St. Mark's Treasurer and can be used for musical education, training and professional education of the Director of Music and other musicians at St. Mark's.

The quarterly distributable amount of the Lewis Trust Fund is the income received during the year, but not capital gains. The applicable income is paid quarterly to the St. Mark's Treasurer directly by the Diocesan Foundation and can be used only for "the purchase, construction and installation of its capital improvements (and not for usual and ordinary expenses and maintenance of the Church)."

The chart below shows the summary of the church's investment accounts. Any questions about the endowment fund should be addressed to the Trustees.

All of this has allowed us to move forward.

The team for the Spanish Ministry, coordinated is by Fr. George Smith and includes Irma Solórzano, Deacon Miguel Briones and Fr. José Arroyo.

We are serving under the motto "The building is closed, the church is still open."

We share with you our experiences in the following areas:

Pastoral:

- -We have maintained direct contact with the families through hundreds of telephone conversations, text messages and on different social networks such as: WhatsApp, Facebook, YouTube and the St. Mark's website.
- -We have provided spiritual support to families that have been affected by the pandemic, have lost a loved one or have needed some kind of help from St. Mark's.
- -We have created an environment so that each of our families feels that they have our support and that they are not alone.

Training:

-We have maintained all our formation programs: classes for Communion, Confirmation, and formation classes for adults. It has been a challenge for everyone, but thanks to the generous work of the coordinators and catechists, we are moving our programs forward.

Liturgy:

- -We maintain a dynamic participation in Sunday services.
- -We are very grateful to our music director Daniel Segner, for his support in our celebrations and to Laura Waterman, for her valuable help in hosting the Zoom services.
- -We accompany every Sunday families who have lost a loved one as a result of the pandemic or another cause of death (offering prayers for the deceased and for those who are sick).
- -Our celebrations are having a national and international reach thanks to the communication and technology resources available to us.
- -For the first time we had the celebration of Our Lady of Guadalupe, together with the congregations of Sagradas Familia and Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe de Waukegan along with a considerable participation of people who joined through Zoom and Facebook.
- -We joined four Hispanic congregations for the celebration of Las Posadas, with an invitation to our entire Diocese. These two celebrations were shared with the Hispanic Ministry of the National Church and with all the congregations of our Diocese thanks to Deacon Miguel.

Outreach:

We have provided information on resources available to the community such as places to pick up food, information workshops on the COVID 19 pandemic, immigration issues and other resources which are shared on the St. Mark's website and through announcements in our Sunday celebrations.

Together and from the hand of God, everything we propose we will achieve, to the honor and glory of our common Father and Jesus our brother.

Children's Ministries

Youth Ministry Report 2020

A reflection on the impacts of Covid-19

This year was met with unprecedented challenges. By mid-March, the reality of this global pandemic started to sink in. With the onset of stay-at-home mandates and travel bans, we quickly became isolated with the uncertainty of how this would impact us. Our youth began online learning, parents worked from home, and our church adapted to online worship. As a community we prayed for those fighting off the virus and mourned those who we lost as a result.

One could say that 2020 felt like a year of life in the Wilderness. We felt betrayal, loss and grief, anger and sadness. We encountered light and darkness, violence and peace, doubt and faith, despair and hope. Yet, Jesus's life in the wilderness taught us that evil and death would not triumph, and that rather justice and hope would stand a chance. So, what does the ever-present and ever-speaking God call us to do? Perhaps God was showing us the importance of connection over division, reminding us of the inclusive spirit of brotherhood and sisterhood. This year we felt that importance heavily. When times like these can have you quickly feeling isolated, we need ways to stay connected with our faith and community who help guide us through that wilderness. Our youth gatherings offer a safe space where youth can stay connected with one another, continuing to learn and grow in faith, meeting online and in person when safely able to do so.

Rooted in Baptism

As a community rooted in Baptism, this year our youth connected their baptism to the world around them. We reflected on these questions that we respond to at our baptism by saying "I will, with God's help": Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself? Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?

Youth Programming

St. Mark's youth are a vital part of our community, active in worship, fellowship, education, and service. There are many ways to participate:

- Youth Group meetings and events for middle school and high school
- Sunday School
- Confirmation

- Parish events and activities
- Diocesan events
- Youth Readers
- Youth Acolytes

Youth Group: Fellowship provides time for middle schoolers and high schoolers to learn about themselves and God – and have fun while doing it! Our youth group continues to meet regularly online and in person and all 6th - 12th graders are welcome!

Youth Group In-Person and Virtual Events: Jesus on the Go, Virtual Scavenger Hunt, Confirmation Reunion at Lake Ellyn Park for ice cream and field games, Epiphany White Elephant Party on zoom, Scarecrow Rows community event, and Miniature Golf.

Sunday School: There are many educational opportunities for youth at St. Mark's. We meet on Sunday mornings for virtual Sunday School and collaborate with Adult Ministries for special multigenerational gatherings. Our mission is to make scripture relevant to what youth experience in today's world, providing a safe space for youth to grow their faith, welcoming questions and inviting dialogue. Confirmation 2019-2020: A large group of 20 students including both morning and afternoon services participated in the confirmation program last year. Starting in March we moved the meetings to Zoom and began preparing confirmation reflections that were presented during our online worship service in May. Students presented reflections in 2-3 minute sharing sessions during the sermon time. This group has yet to have an in-person

confirmation ceremony with blessing from the Bishop. This event is planned to be held in the future once safely able to do so in person. Confirmation Facilitator: Justin Backstrom

Confirmation 2020-2021: Confirmation has been taking place fully on Zoom. The group has been meeting twice a month on Sundays from 12:00 to 12:45 pm since September. Although we have a small group of five students the time spent together has been meaningful and purposeful and everyone has continued to actively participate. Reflections are scheduled to be held in similar fashion to last year during the zoom service on Sunday May 23, 2021. Confirmation Facilitator: Justin Backstrom

Adult Formation 2020

In the fall of 2020 (September through November), Adult Formation followed the theme of "Kingdom Politics" to coincide with the national election and the participation of our diocese and parish in the Vote Faithfully initiative. Often, we studied the Gospel passage within the lectionary, asking ourselves how our behavior, policies, and relationships may be shaped by living out God's call to love one another as God loves us. County Clerk Jean Kaczmarek helped explain mail-in voting, and St. Mark's parishioner Dr. Jeff Hill helped to explain the Progressive Income Tax Amendment. Those sessions attracted the most attendants, but most weeks we had a smaller but faithful and thoughtful gathering. During the Advent season, we prepared the way of the Lord with art and poetry of people of color (Howard Thurman and Henry Ossawa Tanner among others). We also learned about our first African-American woman bishop-elect, the Rev. Paula Clark.

In January, we are dedicating the month to the Gospel imperative of racial justice and healing. Parishioners who wish to continue this vital mission with a commitment to learning and working hard will be able to continue learning about racial healing with the 10-week intensive anti-racism curriculum *Sacred Ground*, a dialogue series put together by The Episcopal Church. The *Sacred Ground* curriculum is independent of Adult Formation, but Adult Formation will spend the last few weeks of January introducing it and laying some groundwork for those who wish to participate.

Heading into Lent, Adult Formation will study the desert fathers and mothers, gleaning wisdom for our journey through the wilderness to the cross and the new life beyond!

Music

At the beginning of the pandemic, the music ministry transitioned to a virtual format – per recommendations from the CDC and guidance from the Episcopal Diocese of Chicago, all in-person singing was immediately suspended.

During this time, the choir began to develop their technological skills so that music would remain an uninterrupted fabric of this church. Starting with hymns and easier anthems, the choir continued to this virtual choir projects until everything culminated for Advent/Christmas.

The Youth Choir went entirely virtual, starting in the fall. We worked on our music theory, aural skills, and score reading; the choristers put together three virtual choir pieces for the annual Christmas Pageant.

Lessons and Carols took a particularly interesting tone to it this year by utilizing a liturgy developed by St. James Cathedral called "Darkness to Light" which juxtaposed Old and New Testament readings together for each "Lesson" with the 'O Antiphons' paired to "Carols." This allowed the service to greatly increase the number of participants and allowed live singing for the Gregorian chant whereas all the carols had to be pre-recorded.

Instruments

The JW Walker & Sons Organ has been in very good shape over the past year—despite not having in-person services, the St. Mark's organ is in excellent condition. Audio equipment was purchased to mic the organ so the services, hymns, and choir music could be recorded and presented each week.

Over the summer, the Fox Valley Chapter of the American Guild of Organists held their annual concert at St. Mark's and David Jonies from Holy Name Cathedral played a great concert featuring Vierne, Bach, Telemann, and many others.

2021 is a big year for the Walker Organ because it turns 30 years old! Looking forward to celebrating this anniversary with a series of concerts!

The concert grand Baldwin in Mahon Hall has been tuned four times this year, two of which were regulatory and action-related calls prior to the Beethoven concerts.

Ludwig van Beethoven 250th Birthday Celebration Series

St. Mark's was DELIGHTED to present three concerts that were livestreamed by cellist **Tanya Carey** and pianist **Cindy Trowbridge**. These three concerts September 18, October 30, and November 27 featured the Sonatas and Variations for piano and cello. You can access them anytime on the St. Mark's YouTube page!

A very special thank you to Tanya for these concerts; they were impressive performances, and we are so grateful to her and Cindy for putting on such masterful concerts.

Hope springs eternal for the music program in 2021. Between the development of the vaccines, our improving technological abilities, and the innovation and sharing of ideas from other music programs, the music program will truly be "branching out" in wonderful, yet unexpected ways.

These clear, unifying voices have brought a lively dynamic to our online worship. Readers are being scheduled on a month-by-month basis, aided by a computer program. A rehearsal happens before each service, which helps makes the experience stress-free and fun. Daughters of the King

The Order of the Daughters of the King is an order for women who are communicants of the Episcopal Church, churches in communion with it, or churches in the historic episcopate. The Order was founded over 135 years ago. Because Daughters of the King accept a Rule of Life, we define ourselves as an order, not an organization. Our community is found primarily in our local chapters, but it extends around the world. Membership in the Order is open to women at every stage of life who desire a closer walk with the Lord. After a three-month period of study and discernment, each new member takes vows to uphold the two Rules of the Order: the Rule of Prayer and the Rule of Service.



As Daughters of the King, our mission is the extension of Christ's Kingdom through prayer, service, and evangelism. No matter where we are on our sacred journeys, we are strengthened by community with our sisters. St. Anne Chapter of Daughters of the King, at St. Mark's for almost 90 years, supports the clergy and parish through our prayer and service.

We are engaged in active prayer as part of our ministry keeping the church prayer list in mind along with our own prayer requests. A devotional is part of every monthly meeting of DOK. Due to the pandemic, our in-person meetings stopped beginning in March of 2020. Our prayer life continued and each monthly meeting held via Zoom focused on our spirituality. In March, we began our unknown experience with the Stations of the Cross with Mary which was bilingual and open to all of St. Mark's congregation. Other meetings included: a DOK Call to Pray in a Pandemic; a program and discussion led by Deacon Tom Craighead on St. Anne, the mother of Mary and grandmother of Jesus; the Episcopal litany for Social Justice; praying the Anglican Rosary; and creation and use of the finger labyrinth. Thirteen to eighteen Daughters have attended our monthly meetings.

Daughters serve through various ministries. Many serve on the **Altar Ministry**. DOK also coordinates with Altar Ministry in decorating the sanctuary for Easter and Christmas. This year the Altar Ministry has worked with the clergy in adapting to the limited service schedule. The **Wedding Ministry** assists in the coordination of weddings, guiding and supporting the wedding party and representing the church in its use and care. However, there were no

weddings that needed our services this year. Our **Funeral Receptions Ministry** coordinates with families to host pleasant and welcoming receptions before or after funeral services, providing an opportunity for friends and family to share and reminisce. There were not opportunities for this service this year. The ministry of **Traveling Tea Parties** (where two or three Daughters visit other Daughters who are not able to get out often) was suspended for most of the year. We were able to do this once prior to restrictions imposed by the pandemic.

This year several members attended the DOK Diocesan Assembly of Chicago in February and again via Zoom in September. Several also attended the DOK Province V retreat held via Zoom in the fall. One of our Daughters from St. Mark's serves as a Diocesan DOK officer, and we also have one Daughter serving on the DOK Province V board.

This closely knit group of women has weathered the pandemic storm maintaining calm, strength, and mutual support. Email threads are numerous. I feel blessed to call the Daughters of the King "my sisters in Christ." If you are interested in being a part of a community within the larger community of St. Mark's with whom to share your spiritual journey, we invite you to join. Outreach Committee

Outreach has historically been a primary focus for St. Mark's. There are many programs that are embedded in the fabric of our church community and there are many components that make up our outreach program. Some of the most obvious are the Appalachian Service Project (ASP), the mission trip to Southeast Mexico, and the Pumpkin Patch that helps support DuPagePads programming in our community. We are engaged in local, regional, national, and international efforts to help to contribute while attempting to make a difference. Whether the programs are shared with us through the diocese or sponsored by the national church, are opportunities to contribute in international efforts in response to natural disasters, or are simply a response to local need; St. Mark's attempts to be present and is always looking for ways to be engaged.

Another aspect of our outreach mechanism here at St. Mark's is the Outreach Committee. Approximately \$20,000 of the 2020 budget was set aside to help us explore and engage in activities intended to help others. We received 13 written proposals from organizations within our church as well from service organizations within our community or area.

Each of the proposals received presented identified needs, what they would do with funds awarded, and provided answers to each of the questions given on our application form. The committee reviewed the applications received and made every attempt to support each organization on some level. Most of our proposals came from groups and organizations in which members of our congregation were serving either as volunteers or board members. In the end, allocations were made to all 13 groups/organizations. Allocations ranged from \$500 - \$4000. A total of approximately \$20,000 was committed and disbursed.

Those groups/programs/individuals initially receiving grant funds include:

- Walk-In Ministry Shared ministry supported by approximately 18 local churches that provides emergency support for residents of Glen Ellyn or members of participating churches with food certificates, gas vouchers, utility assistance, auto repair, transportation, etc.
- **Awakenings Project** Supports artists, poets, playwrights, and musicians afflicted by mental illness in the pursuits of their crafts.
- Family Shelter Service Offers services to victims of domestic violence in DuPage County.
- Faith in Place Works with people of all faiths to be leaders in caring for the earth (Green Teams).
- Shelter for All Not-for-profit organization dedicated to providing housing for the homeless in DuPage County.
- **People Reaching People** (Ministry of Bishop Todd and Rev Patsy McGregor) Madagascar Supporting children attending summer programming.
- Grace and Peace Chaplaincy Bringing God's word to area communities which serve our older adults.

- Glen Ellyn Youth and Family Counseling Service (GEYFCS) Supporting mental health for youth and families in the Glen Ellyn Area.
- Glen Ellyn Food Pantry Helping to fight hunger in the Glen Ellyn Area.
- **CREO** Pre-college counseling and tutoring for St. Mark's Latino/a youth; supporting this new ministry for Latino high school students with a focus on developing education opportunities beyond high school.
- **DuPage United** Supporting efforts in training volunteer leaders in the area.
- Love Inc. Christian Clearinghouse which helps connecting people with a variety of services available for those in need in DuPage County.
- **Teen Parent Connection** Supported the delivery of specialized programs and services for adolescent parents and their children who reside in and around DuPage County.
- Companion Parish in Mexico Provided support needed for compensating the parish priest in Mexico.

The Outreach Committee is in the process of determining how it will allocate its resources during 2021. Requests for funding have been submitted and we look forward to supporting agencies and programs dedicated to providing assistance in our area and beyond during the coming year.

The Outreach Committee would like to thank Bob Meehan for chairing this committee the last few years. He provided a lot of time and energy on this committee. Bob stepped down as chair in early 2020. Wes Clay-Anderson and John Zelman are the current co-chairs of the Outreach Committee.

Mum Sale --- SOLD OUT IN ONE DAY!

This fall St. Mark's completed its annual Mum Sale. This year the Outreach Committee made the decision to split the net proceeds and provide funds to the Glen Ellyn Walk-In Ministry and the Glen Ellyn Food Pantry (specifically for their building fund). The mums were delivered and unloaded the morning of September 19. The mums came from Sunrise Greenhouse, Inc. out of Grant Park, IL. The plants were a very popular item and we sold approximately 500 mum plants the first day! Our net amount was \$2516.88 (half to WIM and half to the Food Pantry's building fund). What a wonderful accomplishment, especially during this pandemic! St. Mark's has been a long-time supporter of WIM and the Food Pantry. Thank you for your support in this effort! St. Mark's has again shown itself to be generous and engaged in this outreach project.

Walk-In-Ministry 2020

The Glen Ellyn Walk-In Ministry (WIM) was initiated in 1984 by the Glen Ellyn Ministerial Association. It represents a coordinated effort by local churches (approximately 17) to provide a source of compassionate assistance to individuals and families in need of emergency aid within our community. Examples of aid being provided include food certificates, gas vouchers, utility assistance, auto repair, prescription assistance, and transportation vouchers. WIM relies on donations from individuals and member churches. Located in the library of the First United Methodist Church, this program provides opportunity for individuals to volunteer in covering the hours of operation and to serve on its governing board. St. Mark's is a founding member of this agency and continues to provide financial and volunteer assistance. Due to the pandemic, WIM was not able to aid all of their clients. The group shut down for two months and once they reopened were only able to provide assistance to current clients, no new clients. The volunteers were also unable to provide any face-to-face assistance to clients, all assistance was through the mail or telephone. Even through this they were able to continue helping Glen Ellyn residents in need to the best of their abilities. WIM was able to assist 171 clients, totaling 435 visits.

Backpacks and School Supplies

Thanks to the many generous donors, we collected 40 backpacks and 10 boxes of supplies for the students of Holy Family School. These students will have paper, crayons, markers, scissors, pens, pencils, notebooks, binders, calculators and USB drives to assist them in learning this school year. ReVive Christmas Baskets

Thank you for your generous giving, especially during an ongoing pandemic. We had to make some changes this year, including signups by email instead of in person, and dropping boxes in the Rectory garage instead of the church library. We were allotted only 54 families this year – the numbers were down because not as many people signed up with ReVive, also because of the constraints of the pandemic. Collectively we sponsored 57 families: 54 from ReVive, two local families who contacted Fr. George Smith for help, and one family of 5 who came to us via Kim Reed and Glen Ellyn Youth and Family Counseling Service. About 176 people comprised those families. 54 households (St. Mark's and friends of St. Mark's) plus Daughters of the King took on the work of love to sponsor the families. A handful of volunteers loaded the boxes of gifts from the Rectory garage (much, much easier than moving them from the church library) to the waiting truck and driver. Pumpkin Patch Fundraiser

Every October since 2007, St Marks has conducted a fundraiser to sell pumpkins to the community to benefit DuPagePads. It has provided us with friendship, fellowship and many compliments from our neighbors and community. Over the last 12 years we have unloaded approximately 30,000 bulk pumpkins, not to mention many boxes of mini- and softball-sized white and orange pumpkins and numerous types of other gourds. The community came out in droves to purchase pumpkins from the St. Marks Pumpkin Patch with total sales over these past 12 years of approximately \$285,000 and total donations to DuPage PADS of approximately \$98,000. During 2020, it was unclear whether there would be a patch due to the Covid-19 pandemic, but thanks to a new system of delivery and our own Jeremy Mote, who drove the forklift to unload the truck this year, we were able to have a patch while being mindful of the safety of the volunteers who came out to help unload crates of pumpkins. This year, despite having to rely mostly on self-service and 100% honor system (with the use of a QR code option for payments) we had the second-best year in our 12-year history with sales of \$25,914 and with some very generous additional donations, provided a check to DuPage PADS for \$9,000. St. Mark's Visual Arts Group

We also installed:

- Stations of the Cross by Richard Rush: These pieces are owned by St. Mark's and are displayed annually before and during Lent. Dick Rush, a commercial artist of note, was a parishioner at St. Mark's who worked from the 1950s through the 1990s.
- Christmas decorations

St. Mark's Green Team 2020 Report

The Green Team has been on a bit of hiatus, but the goal is to continue to learn together how to make St. Mark's a greener, more sustainable community. We welcome all who would like to learn with us. The team for 2020 was Edna Heatherington, Ginnie Judd, Jan Langford, April Sedall, with Building and Grounds' Committee Head Joanie Somerville as advisor.

Indoor Winter Farmers Market We hosted our third Winter Farmers Market in February 2020, an initiative through Faith in Place which works with host sites at faith communities throughout the Chicago area to give local farmers and vendors within a 250-mile radius of St. Mark's a place to connect with consumers. Jan Langford led the effort, and her excellent organization as well as her signage inside and outside the building helped draw people in and get them to the right location – "just follow the veggie trail!" We will not have an indoor market in 2021; Faith in Place is rethinking its mission for food-insecure communities, and the pandemic has removed an indoor market from consideration for now.

Meatless Dinner The fourth annual meatless Lenten dinner and program was scheduled for Wednesday, March 11, and Jan Langford had the foresight to suggest, a week before the event, that we cancel it. We'll see what life brings when we can gather safely again.

Pollinator Garden Because of a combination of the pandemic and Ginnie's knee surgery in early March, we opted to have the landscaping company do the early spring cutback of the dried plant material at the end of March. Some annuals were added in mid-May to provide ongoing nectar sources in addition to all the perennials. The good thing about native perennials that are well established is they can tolerate some neglect, so the garden did reasonably well with not much care in 2020. Some background on our garden: The Green Team took responsibility for the large

garden at the northeast corner of the church property, at Main & Hillside, in Spring 2017, and has continued to tend it since then. The garden had been overgrown with lots of undesirables that were choking out the plants that provide food for butterflies, bees, birds, and other creatures, so the goal in 2017 was to identify what was growing there and remove anything that was hindering the beneficial plants. It was rewarding to see how many lovely perennials emerged once the turf grass and thistles were removed. Our big addition in May 2018 was a Fruit Guild – a permaculture garden (all edible perennials) centered around a Redhaven peach tree. We were fortunate that the polar vortex in January 2018 did not kill the peach tree, but we didn't get peaches that summer. There was a good crop in 2020, and we hope some of the community enjoyed some of the fruit. Let us know if you are interested in participating in garden maintenance. All ages welcome.

SCARCE's Pumpkin Smash program For the sixth year, we arranged for a dumpster to put the leftover pumpkins after the Pumpkin Patch was over plus be a site for the community to bring their pumpkins on the first Saturday of November. The contents were taken to a commercial composting site instead of being put into landfill. Keeping food and yard waste out of landfill means a reduction in methane gas production as well as capturing the nutrients and water contained in the plant materials for use in compost. In addition to our own leftover Pumpkin Patch pumpkins, we had 99 vehicles come through with pumpkins from their own homes to add to the collection.

Companion Relationship with San Marcos in Nigromante, Mexico for 2020

St. Mark's has been in a companion relationship with San Marcos in Nigromante since we first sent a group of parishioners led by the Rev. George Smith in June 2006. This relationship was inspired by and is an extension of our ongoing companion diocesan relationship with the Dioceses of Southeast Mexico and Renk in Sudan, established in 2001.

Since that first trip in 2006, St. Mark's has sent parishioners, both youth and adults, to Mexico every year — that is until 2020. Many parishioners have participated in these trips and parish-wide we have supported this relationship with fundraisers that have provided scholarships to keep children and youth of San Marcos in school, paid for half of Padre Senobio's salary each year, and supported micro-businesses and projects to help the church and community of San Marcos. These funds also helped offset the cost of the mission trip, providing assistance for some of our parishioners who otherwise would not have been able to afford the trip. Additionally, over the years, St. Mark's has welcomed the former bishop, Benito Juarez, and his family on their visits to St. Mark's and the Chicago Diocese. We even had the privilege of hosting San Marcos's Padre Senobio when he made his first visit to the United States.

Just over a year ago, December 2019, was when St. Mark's last traveled to Nigromante. We took a delegation of dentists, hygienists, and a few parishioners to offer our first dental mission trip. We had hoped to return this month, January 2021, but because of the pandemic, we obviously had to cancel these plans--as well as plans for the 2020 Cinco de Mayo Dinner and Fundraiser and a June 2020 mission trip. Our last successful planned event was last year's Cake Auction at the January 2020 Annual Meeting, raising over \$3,000 for our companion parish relationship.

Our hope is to return to Nigromante again once we are able to travel safely. In the meantime, we will continue to fundraise for our next mission trip—please support the January 2021 Virtual Annual Meeting Cake Auction! St. Mark's dental team remains committed to return to Nigromante, and we are discussing ways to further help with the dental needs in the community. We plan to stay in communication with the Diocese of Southeast Mexico and

continue to meet with the Episcopal Diocese of Chicago's Subcommittee on Southeast Mexico. We have been in contact with some of the parishioners from San Marcos, and recently, in December, we sent a box of toothbrushes, toothpaste, and greetings from St. Mark's and from those who went on the Dental Mission Trip.

There is no doubt that our relationship with the Diocese of Southeast Mexico is a part of who we are at St. Mark's. We are so grateful for your continued support, and we ask that you remember the people of San Marcos, the Diocese of Southeast Mexico, and its new bishop, Julio Martin, in your prayers.

Parents' Day Out Ministry

St. Mark's Parents Day Out (PDO) offers care for children ages 2 to 4. PDO's strong community following since it began in the late 1980's follow from both our school year and summer care programs that include fine and large motor skill activities, arts and crafts, songs and stories, as well as plenty of play time. Families register for one or two days per week during the school year, Monday



through Friday, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. In 2020, following federal and state guidelines, as well as best practices for childcare settings, PDO created new protocols and procedures and opened its doors this fall to 67 children and their families, and plans to add five more children this winter to round out this 2020-21 school year. Due to recommended health and safety practices, PDO does not maintain a substitute list this year. We are pleased to report zero COVID-19 events impacting our children and staff to date and appreciate the dedication of our PDO families keeping everyone healthy and safe.

Scholarships: In keeping with our mission, we offer scholarships and financial flexibility to suit a variety of circumstances. Please contact Director Kathy O'Rourke for more information.

School Year Calendar and Summer Session: PDO follows the Glen Ellyn D41 public school system calendar during the school year and offers a summer program on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays in June and July, which fills up quickly. Stay tuned for summer registration information.

Vacation Bible School Session: PDO coordinates with St. Mark's Children's Ministries to offer care during VBS week for children not yet old enough to participate in VBS. This includes care for the young children of VBS volunteers.

PDO's Gifts: PDO historically covered its operating costs as well as donated financially to St. Mark's and undertook facility repair and upgrade projects. In addition to scholarships for children, PDO donated \$500 monthly to the parish's general operating fund. Those many years of paying it forward came back in spades in 2020. Due to the program cancellation in March 2020 for the balance of that school year including the 2020 summer session because of the COVID-19 pandemic, additional resources were contributed to the program allowing our teaching staff to receive important salary support. PDO gratefully acknowledges the work of Steve Sedall, Chris Ponstein, Joanie Somerville, and Bill Kalbfleisch along with many PDO families. Through these combined efforts, a Small Business

Administration Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) grant and substantial individual donations supported the program until it could reopen this fall. Importantly, PDO family donations have provided a program operating reserve in the event additional program disruptions occur in 2021.

Staff: We remain forever thankful for our wonderful and dedicated staff: Director Kathy O'Rourke and Norma Cid, Melody Mordini, Carrie Pihl, and Ofelia Bustamente. We are truly grateful for their endless enthusiasm and devotion to PDO and its children. Their unshakable commitment and flexibility are celebrated by all PDO families. Thank you also to the PDO Board for their planning guidance and regular Zoom meeting collaboration and resources offered to the program staff. PDO Board members are Kim Reed (Chair), Elizabeth Lewis (Secretary), Kelly Gross (Treasurer), Joan Nichols, and Kristin Margaglione, along with the regular attendance and support of George Smith.

2021-22 Registration: Registration for the 2021 summer and fall programs will begin on Monday, April 5 for St. Mark's parishioners and St. Mark's Preschool families. New families can register on Tuesday, April 13. Summer registration will open on Monday, April 19.

St. Mark's Preschool

This year St. Mark's Preschool celebrates ten years as a part of the St. Mark's community. The Preschool is influenced by the Reggio Emilia project approach to teaching, which features child-directed learning. We continue to approach learning with the whole child in mind, first and foremost.



The Preschool has grown over these ten years from offering one class of nine children with two teachers to the current offerings of 3-day and 4-day classes, a Studio Arts Program, a STEAM program, Kindergarten Enrichment, and a Munch and Learn program. We also offer a morning summer camp program in June. Throughout the year, our seven-member staff serves 80 families.

The Preschool is DCFS certified and is a member of The National Association of Episcopal Schools (NAES) and the North American Reggio Emilia Alliance (NAREA).

This school year, the heightened safety protocols of the pandemic presented challenges which we viewed as opportunities to expand our thinking about the possibilities for preschool programming. As such, we created two outdoor spaces and have successfully held preschool and Kindergarten Enrichment in our outdoor classrooms.

We are so very blessed with the families and alumni that contribute to and participate in our preschool community. Partnerships with the parents and the community are a cornerstone of our philosophy. We are grateful the students and staff can explore their own community and be provoked and inspired by their surroundings.

Priority registration for the 2021-22 school year opens January 25 for church and PDO members. Applications are available in the Church office, Preschool office, or online.

Boy Scout Troop 44

Boy Scout Troop 44 has been affiliated with St. Mark's Episcopal Church since March 26, 1919, making us the oldest troop in the Glen Ellyn area that has been affiliated with the same charter organization since inception. Troop 44 would like to thank St. Mark's Episcopal Church for sponsoring us and seeing the value in the Boy Scout program.

2020 proved to be a challenging year, not only for our troop, but for the many families that had to isolate during the COVID-19 pandemic. The unfortunate shut down and social distancing practices forced us to think of new and innovative ways to continue our mission to mentor and guide young males and females into becoming confident leaders with good moral and ethical character.

Normally, this goal is achieved through a variety of activities which include weekly meetings, camp outs, merit badge clinics, community service activities and fundraising activities. In 2020 and for the foreseeable future, Troop 44 continues to meet using on-line meeting spaces. We also encourage our youth to work independently towards their rank advancements at home or within their immediate family circle. The troop also holds monthly on-line merit badge clinics to help our scouts continue to explore and learn what the Boy Scout program has to offer. Since the last mission statement three members of the troop advanced to the highest rank of Eagle Scout. This achievement takes many years and a strong dedication to the values that the Boy Scouts requires. The Names and their final Eagle Scout Projects are as follows:

David Felsenthal: Cleared and reclaimed a patch of land at Arbor View Elementary School in Glen Ellyn. David then replanted the area as a natural prairie garden.

Nathan Blaim: Designed and built two wood benches to replace old and worn benches. The benches can be found on the grounds of St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Glen Ellyn.

Simon Mstowski: Designed and built a flag collection box for retired U.S. flags. The box resides at Stacy's Tavern Museum in Glen Ellyn.

Both Nathan and Simon have opted to remain active in the troop as Jr. Assistant Scout Masters. Their Scout skills and presence will have a profound and positive impact on the younger scouts.

Currently we have 10 scouts who meet on Monday nights. Our scout age group is from 6th grade through high school juniors. We are broken down into two groups, known as patrols. One patrol consists of the older scouts and the other patrol has the younger scouts. Each patrol has a scout that oversees leading their patrol for a 6-month period. We also have a scout who oversees leading the entire troop.

The scouting program is appropriate for both boys and girls between the ages of 10 and 18. Through our activities and guidance from our adult leaders, the scouts learn skills such as cooking, time management, first aid, communication, organization, and prioritization. Other skills are learned through earning Merit Badges. This more focused approach expects scouts to fulfill requirements that can take up to six months to accomplish. There are 138 different Merit Badge skills ranging from Astronomy to Wilderness Survival (two of our most popular Merit Badges.) Some of our scouts have learned exciting skills such as Scuba Diving, Personal Fitness, Environmental Science, and Sustainability. The troop offers one merit badge per month, taught by our adult leaders, that the scouts can earn. The scouts can complete as few or as many as they desire. However, in order to attain the rank of Eagle, they must complete 13 required merit badges and eight merit badges of their choosing.

Though the troop historically went on camping trips each month, the pandemic and the need to maintain social distancing required the troop to approach outings differently. This past year, the troop took to the outdoors and learned about different cooking methods, worked on orienteering, and learned about nature during day trips only.

The scouts also took our bicycles out on the trails, went fishing a few times, and took a five-mile-long hike. I know that every scout looks forward to the time when we can resume our weekend camping trips.

It is important for scouts to realize that they must give back to the community. We therefore provide the opportunity to perform community service activities. This past year the scouts organized and collected food for the local food pantry, participated in St. Mark's pumpkin unloading, and cleaned and trimmed overgrown areas in the East parking lot.

Our goal for this year continues to be to recruit more boys and girls, as well as active adults. Troop 44 is not alone in the struggle to maintain and recruit new scouts as the pandemic has affected active Cub Scout and BSA numbers. But despite the challenges, Troop 44 has formed a new female troop, Troop 444.
