Teen Winter Mission TEAM

Transformed Hearts: A journey of Missionary Calling and Courage

"Break my heart for what breaks Yours." A popular lyric that describes the heart's cry for every missionary of Christ. At the center of a missionary's heart is a burden for hearts of stone. The teen's annual Winter Missions Retreat explores the heart of a missionary and challenges teens to seek God's calling on their lives.

This year, 50 teenagers, young adults, and adult leaders went to Surry, Virginia, for a weekend of training, preaching, testimonies, fellowship, and fun. Ed Lyons, the Director of Ministry Advancement for the Persecution Project, shared his stories from the mission field of Sudan. Teens were inspired by the testimonies of faithfulness and fearlessness from Pastor Lyons' travels.

In the evenings, Enya Lucas led the teens in worship, and Camp Pastor Jesse Owens offered a challenge from the life of David through a 3-part series titled Transformed: More Like Christ, Less Like Culture. While a missionary must recognize Christ as their Savior, they must also recognize

Him as Lord. This means presenting a heart of surrender to Jesus' lordship over their lives. Perhaps the most powerful moment of the weekend came on Saturday night as teens moved to tears for the lost in their lives. Considering David's courage to take the lion by the throat and rescue the lamb from his mouth, the work of a missionary is to rescue the lost from the mouth of the prowling lion who seeks to steal, kill, and destroy (1 Samuel 17:34-35; 1 Peter 5:8).

In addition to the training which came from the pulpit, multi-generation discipleship is a major component of this camp's mission. The teens were broken into five teams, led by their Timothy Group (teen leadership crew) leader, and overseen by a young adult whose primary responsibility was to develop the Timothy Group member's leadership skills. Jesse & Kassia Owens oversaw the young adults and offered training sessions focused on identifying and implementing their spiritual gifting.

While the camp has concluded, the mission is just beginning. In the days since the camp, teens have been boldly approaching loved ones with the Good News of the Gospel. Over the next several months, these missionaries will continue to be trained in evangelism techniques that will be put into practice during summer missions (*Teen Camp, Christian Youth In Action, VBS, Good News Across Sports, Camp Good News: Maine, Navajo Nation*).

From our Senior Pastor

Embrace the Sacred Journey: a vibrant celebration of Holy Week and Easter triumph

"For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life." John 3:16 NIV

As we approach the solemn and reflective period of Holy Week, our hearts turn to the significant events that unfolded in the final days of Jesus Christ's earthly ministry. As a church, we will recognize key observances during Holy Week, offering unique opportunities for spiritual

contemplation and connection.

Spy Wednesday, also known as Holy Wednesday or Good Wednesday, marks a pivotal moment in the Christian liturgical calendar. Falling amid Holy Week, it holds a unique significance as it commemorates the betrayal of Jesus Christ by one of His own disciples, Judas Iscariot.

The term "Spy Wednesday" is derived from the idea that Judas acted as a spy, betraying Jesus to the chief priests in exchange for thirty pieces of silver. The biblical narrative unfolds in the Gospel of Matthew (26:14-16), where Judas approaches the religious authorities with the infamous question, "What will you give me if I deliver him over to you?" This sinister transaction sets in motion the events leading to Jesus' arrest and crucifixion.


On this day, Christian communities worldwide engage in special liturgical services and reflections that delve into the themes of betrayal, loyalty, and the complex nature of human relationships. The day serves as a solemn reminder of the frailty of human nature and the capacity for betrayal even within close circles. Our Senior Associate Pastor, Pastor Medas, will share a homily that evening at 6:00 pm in the Sanctuary around that theme before we celebrate the Eucharist together.

One of the notable aspects of Spy Wednesday is the reading of the Gospel account of the anointing at Bethany. In this story, a woman pours expensive perfume on Jesus' head, anointing Him for burial. The juxtaposition of this act of love and devotion with Judas' betrayal adds layers of depth to the narrative, prompting believers to reflect on the contrast between selfless love and deceit.

As Christians move through Holy Week, Spy Wednesday acts as a powerful prelude to the transformative events of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and, ultimately, the celebration of Easter. It invites believers to contemplate the profound sacrifice of Christ and the complexity of human choices, fostering a deeper understanding of the redemptive narrative that unfolds in the Christian faith.

Maundy Thursday, also known as Holy Thursday, commemorates the Last Supper Jesus shared with his disciples before his crucifixion. The term "Maundy" is derived from the Latin word "mandatum," meaning commandment, referencing Jesus' commandment to love one another as he loved them. This momentous evening is marked by the institution of the Eucharist and the act of Jesus washing his disciples' feet, symbolizing humility, and service. Jesus gave the call to his disciples that evening to "go and do likewise"

commissioning them to go into the world to serve God by serving others.

In churches worldwide, Maundy Thursday services often include the reenactment of the Last Supper, the washing of feet, and the observance of the Lord's Supper. It is a time for believers to reflect on the profound love and sacrifice demonstrated by Jesus, setting the stage for the somber events of Good Friday. That evening at 7 p.m. in the Sanctuary, our clergy, chaplains, elders, and trustees will reconfirm their call to Christian service. All are invited to this sacred service, featuring special readings, prayer, testimonies, reflection, a foot-washing demonstration, Holy Communion, and music.

Good Friday invites us to pray the path of Christ's passion and crucifixion through a journey down the vio delarosa. 9 a.m. in the Sanctuary, we will participate in this devotional practice, which traces the journey of Jesus from his condemnation to his burial, pausing at specific times to reflect on the events leading to his death and to pray together. This prayer time offers a profound way to meditate on the depth of Christ's sacrifice and the path of redemption and to remember those in the church today who face suffering and persecution around the world.

Good Friday evening at 7 p.m. in the Sanctuary, we will hold a Tenebrae service. From Latin, the word Tenebrae means "darkness" and commemorates the final hours of our Lord's life on earth as he suffered death upon the cross. Our Worship Minister, Kevin Paxton, and the choir will lead us in this solemn service.

In a world filled with constant noise, bustling activities, and the ever-present hum of technology, finding moments of quiet reflection can be a rare treasure. Silent Saturday, also known as the Holy Saturday or Black Saturday in some Christian traditions, is one such day dedicated to introspection, prayer, and a deliberate pause in the midst of life's busyness.

From 8 a.m. to noon on Saturday, the Sanctuary will be open for a personal time of profound stillness, as it commemorates the time when Jesus lay in the tomb after his crucifixion. It serves as a bridge between the sorrow of Good Friday and the joyous celebration of Easter, inviting believers to enter into a sacred space of contemplation. Self-led devotional booklets will be available upon entering the Sanctuary.

The essence of Silent Saturday lies in its call to silence - a deliberate and purposeful hush that encourages individuals to turn inward, reflecting on the events of Good Friday and anticipating the resurrection on Easter Sunday. It is a time to confront the weight of sorrow, loss, and the unknown, mirroring the disciples' experience as they grappled with the absence of Jesus.

In essence, Silent Saturday is a sacred interlude, a brief but profound pause in the Easter narrative. It invites individuals to explore the depths of their spirituality, fostering a connection with the divine and a renewed sense of purpose. As the world around us continues to buzz with activity, Silent Saturday stands as a timeless reminder to seek solace in silence, allowing for a more profound and meaningful experience of life's journey.

Easter Sunday begins with our Sunrise Service at 7 a.m. at Clubhouse Beach, followed by our 8:30 a.m. blended service, 9:45 a.m. Traditional service, and 11 a.m. Contemporary service.

As we approach these sacred days, let us take the time to engage in meaningful reflection, prayer, and worship. Each of these special, sacred services provides opportunities to deepen our understanding of the Christian faith and draw closer to the heart of the Easter message.

May your Holy Week be filled with moments of reverence, gratitude, and spiritual growth.

Pastor Colson and the Board of Elders have challenged the congregation to celebrate the Jubilee Year of the Lake of the Woods Church by becoming an active TEAM member. TEAM – Teaching, Evangelizing, Activating Art, and Missioning is all about participation, using your God-given talents to further the mission of the Church, To Know Christ and Make Christ Known.

Embracing the joy of worship: Serving with spirit and truth at The Lake of the Woods Church

Jesus says in John 4:23-24 "Yet a time is coming and has now come when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for they are the kind of worshipers the Father seeks. God is spirit, and his worshipers must worship in spirit and in truth."

God's Word is proclaimed through many faithful hearts and hands. In addition to the exceptional work of our dedicated pastors, ministers, and professional and administrative staff, worship at the Lake of the Woods Church (LOWC) is richly blessed by the service of many volunteers.

The Elder for Worship is responsible for and oversees the following worship related ministries primarily supported by the service of volunteers: (1) the Chancel choir; (2) Blended and Contemporary Praise Teams; (3) the Flower Guild; (4) scheduling lay readers; (5) alter preparation and care; (6) ushers; (7) audio and video technicians; (8) communion preparation, set-up and clean-up; (9) holiday decorations; (10) praise banner maintenance and display; and (11) candle maintenance.

The Elder for Worship works closely with Senior Pastor Colson and Worship Minister Paxton, planning and overseeing Sunday morning worship services, Wednesday evening eucharist services, and special Christmas and Easter services and cantatas. The 9:45 Traditional service and the 11:00 Contemporary services are recorded and streamed so those who cannot attend worship in person can worship online. The effectiveness of our services is continually monitored through congregational feedback and Board of Elders oversight.

Worship Minister Paxton oversees and directs all worship related music. He also recruits, trains, and manages a volunteer technology team responsible for operating the sound board, video projection, and camera operation, all essential for in-person and steamed worship services. Moreover, he oversees the procurement and maintenance of all the equipment needed to support worship at (LOWC).

The Elder for Worship is responsible for establishing and managing a yearly budget for worship related expenses. Importantly, volunteers supervised by Worship Minister Paxton have given their time and talents to make significant infrastructure enhancements in the Worship Center and Sanctuary at minimal cost to our church. Psalm 100:1-2 reminds us how to worship: "Shout for joy to the Lord and worship the Lord with gladness."

If you are not an attendee of the 8:30 a.m. or 11a.m. services, you should stop to see the refreshed Worship Center. Missions update...

Celebrating eight years of impact: The thriving journey of the Living Water Community Clinic

The Living Water Community Clinic (Clinic) is in its eighth year providing free medical, dental, emotional, and spiritual care to eligible patients in Orange, Spotsylvania, and Culpeper counties. This past year, the Clinic saw continued growth. The Clinic's patient population increased by 47%, programs were added, new partnerships were built, numbers of volunteers increased, hours of operation increased, and our donor base grew.

In 2023, the medical and dental clinics provided care to almost 100 patients for 300 visits. The dental clinic added a denture program, providing dentures to patients who have had bad, little, or no teeth for years. In 2023, Burns Dentistry (a local dentist's office) joined the dental clinic in providing care and adding an extra dental clinic per month.

The medical clinic added more providers, nurses, and other volunteers to ensure the Clinic could continue to grow and provide excellent quality care to patients. The medical clinic opened an additional day per week for patient care. In addition, the Clinic opened an additional three days per week providing administrative assistance to patients for eligibility and questions.

We thank all who support the Clinic through prayer, volunteerism, and financial assistance. We could not take care of our patients without the generosity of so many who make it possible to take care of our medical and dental patients.

Notably, a recent medical patient needed a critical surgical procedure, but he did not have insurance. Complicating this, his blood pressure was critically high, making him ineligible for the operation unless it came under control. After working with him for several weeks, his blood pressure came down to an acceptable range, and through our partnered facilities he was able to have his surgery, is doing well and back to work. He said, "I could not have gotten this surgery without the help and care of this Clinic."

One of our new dental patients recently called to tell us, "I have been thinking about this all day. The light of God is shining on me, you, and the volunteers at the dental clinic. Last evening was the most pleasant experience I have ever had in a

dental office. The young lady that worked on me was wonderful. Thank you so much!"

Thank you to all for continuing to support the Clinic.


