21 Bay Challenge Agape Love

The word Paul used for love was—agape—which means spiritual, divine love. It's love that comes from God alone, and at the heart is expressed sacrificially. It's a powerful force. A love that moves us to respond to someone's needs with no expectation of being rewarded. When the true love of God is stamped on our hearts, we respond with acts of kindness, never anxious to impress, not touchy, nor possessive.

Challenge: For the next 21 days, read I Corinthians 13 each morning and evening. At the close of each day, meditate on the passage. Identify in self-examination where your love was manifested through word or action.

Allow this 21 day spiritual practice to transform both attitudes and behaviors. "And now these three remain: faith, hope, and love. But the greatest of these is love" (I Corinthians 13:13). Love is the final measure of our faith. It's our greatest trademark. Let's be known by our love. The challenge is on!

Resilient

For several years now, Holy Spirit has dropped a word into our hearts to guide and frame our lives going into a new year. In December of 2017, Scott shared with our family as we gathered around the Christmas tree that our word for 2018 was *trust* (trust God). I recount speaking up to voice that I didn't like that word; it would seem to indicate challenges. Little did we know that 2018 would introduce to us the loss of Scott's sister, mother, and father within the span of seven months, as well as a transition from Texas to Florida.

With 2024 on the horizon, the word to frame this year with purpose and intention was *resilient*. It goes without saying, adversity cultivates resilience.

Resilient—Resilience

To recoil. An act of rebounding or springing back. The power of resuming an original shape or position after compression, bending, etc.

To bounce back seems to imply that resilience is something that is quick and simple. Wouldn't that be nice? Yet, our own experiences of loss, disappointment, tragedy, trauma, hardship and difficulty teach us that the aftershock of such life experiences requires space to restore and solitude for soul rest and emotional health. In so doing, we eventually resume some version of who we were before, yet there is something different about us. Perhaps a new quality, a new strength, a better version of ourselves, for our pain becomes purposeful, if we let it. Yes, it will be the multiple storms over the course of our lives that will teach us about resilience.



Jesus never promised health, wealth, and prosperity; He promised there would be trouble, that we would be hard pressed, perplexed, struck down. Yet with the promise of trouble, came the promise to overcome and find meaning through the pain.

Upon our arrival home from North Carolina, following six weeks of seeking to care for Mom and Dad as he transitioned from this life to the next, our healing has begun. Healing starts when the unraveling unfolds. Reflection upon serving as dad's caregivers his final days on earth and the trauma of mom's fall and brain bleed have opened up a well of emotions, tears, and memories. So, we continue to partner with God and intentionally seek to find a rhythm of rest that restores and heals.

Building a resilient life can't be done alone. We were made to live in relationship with God and one another. The Bible bears out this reality. With that being said, to be a resilient people we must come alongside one another and live in community. You continue to empower us by your expressions of care. You have linked arms and joined hearts with us during this season. Thank you.

You know my life verse, "Two are better than one; because they have a good reward for their labour. For if they fall, the one will lift up his fellow: but woe to him that is alone when he falleth; for he hath not another to help him up: (Ecc. 4:9-10). Thank you for being a true Christian community that has shown up in my life. You have sent cards, memorabilia, chocolate covered strawberries, floral arrangements, financial support, groceries, tied yellow ribbons around our mailbox and the State Office, and you have sent text messages, called, and prayed for us. And what I am discovering is that resilience isn't found in the power of me, resilience is formed in the power of we.

Knowing that adversity awakens us from our comfort and to what we are capable of, may we (Scott & I) emerge as more effective leaders. As we continue to allow the truths of God Word to penetrate our hearts and minds, we covet your prayers.

Dessons from an iron skillet... Shellie Creasy

Just two days ago from this writing, I decided to restore a collected 100 year old cast iron Dutch oven. After looking up the best way, I filled the sink with a gallon of vinegar, lowered the pot into it and added water to cover the pot. Since they recommended time in this solution to loosen the rust, I let it soak overnight. Approximately 24 hours later I discovered the soaking was to be the easiest part. The scrubbing started. Oh, if you ladies could have seen me. The pot was heavy. Not only was it heavy, it was wet and had wet rust streaming down the sides. The years of neglect and amount of rust added to the difficulty of the task.

As I am scrubbing away at the rust, it is running down the front of me, the front of my cabinets, and pooling in my kitchen floor. I slip in the puddle, drop the pot smashing my little finger in between the very heavy pot and the granite kitchen counter. My knee bangs into the cabinet and hair springs loose from my sloppy bun. The hair sticks to my sweaty face and starts to tickle as my finger and knee are throbbing quite loudly. I was weary, I was hurting, and I was frustrated. That's when the tears started to well up in my eyes. I bet you're thinking "and that's when she gave up". If I were to be honest, I almost did. But, determination kicked in. I dried my tears, wiped my face, replaced my hair, threw a towel down on the floor and went back at it.

I scrubbed until my fingers were red and sore. When the rust was gone it was time to season it for proper use. I coated it with oil and put it in a hot oven where the heat and oil could do its job. When finished, I stood back and looked at the fruit of my labor and immediately the blood, sweat, and tears were forgotten. My investment had given me a beloved treasure that will now be used instead of just "collected".

Today, the Lord has me reflecting on the effort I have put into this restoration project in comparison to the effort that I have put into people. I have to admit that many times I've given up on people that may cost me time, effort, energy, and pain. Each Sunday, we collect people in our churches. They soak in the Word (solution) that is preached. They may even hang out in the fellowship (solution) for awhile. But do we get involved past that point? Years of neglect and exposure to the elements sometimes covers their healthy usefulness. In my experience with the pot, I had to assist the "solution" with a little elbow grease. We know that the Lord is the "solution" that loosens the rust but what if we need to help in the rescue? With a little elbow grease, a little determination, a little oil, a little heat, and a lot of patience we can work with the Lord and assist in restoring a beautiful and treasured vessel for the Master's use.

May we strive, as pastor's wives, to not just collect people but to put ourselves and effort into each and every one of them.

On the day of Pentecost, they spilled out into the streets where men heard them speak in their own language. How do the lost and hurting hear us now? Are we speaking to them in a language they can hear? We have been given the power to put ourselves aside and stoop down and love people where they are. Are we using that power?

CHARITY MARTINEZ

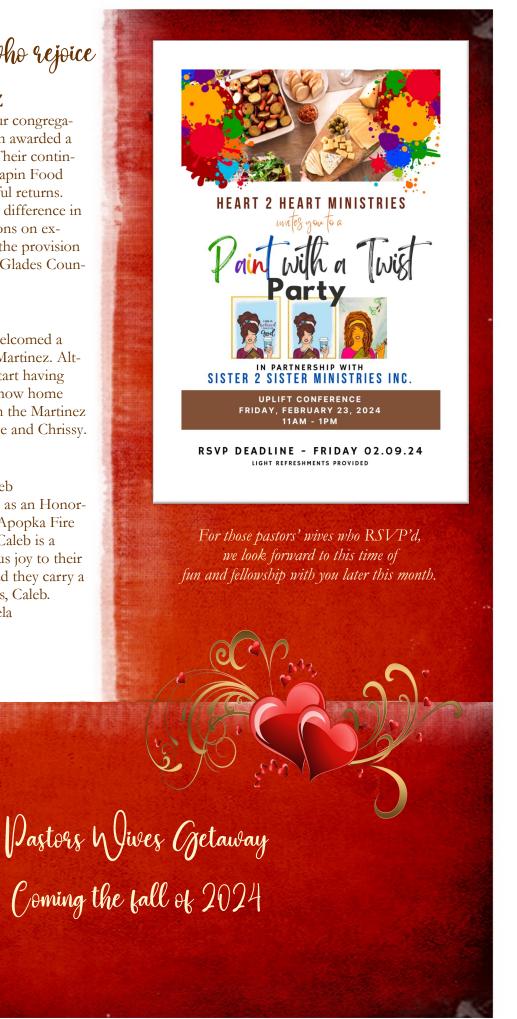

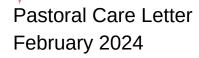
TONI MARTINEZ

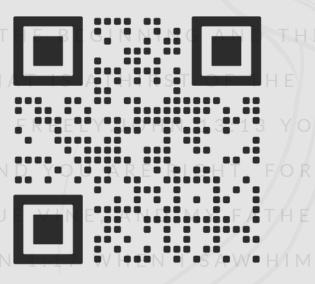

7 Lessons Learned While Leading Change - Ron Edmonson



You can have change without leadership. **But I am not sure you can have leadership without change.** In leading change for over 35 years, I have learned some things that may help you better lead change.

Change is all around us. **As leaders, we are called to be agents of change.** We are charged with taking people to places they may not be able to go on their own – or at least no one has taken the steps to get started. But you can't take people somewhere new without change.

I talk about change in my book *The Mythical Leader*. Here I want to share a few random tips I've learned about leading change which may help you better lead change.

7 tips to better lead change:

Be a proponent of the new more than an opponent of the old.

Everything that happened in the past was not bad. In fact, something happened which has allowed you to be where you are today. When you bash prior days and leadership you push people into a defensive mode and alienate people who might otherwise support you.

Keep the "why" as simple and easy to understand as possible.

You will have to repeat it often – like continually – so, you want it to be sticky enough for people to quickly grasp. People aren't as reluctant to the what the more clearly they understand the why.

Know the key stakeholders.

The number one component of change is always people. People matter. (People who don't understand this aren't leaders as much as they are tyrants.) Most people are looking for someone to help them – lead them.

And because of that, there are always leaders in the room. They are not always the loudest voices, but they are the ones to whom people will listen. They may be adversaries or allies, but you simply have to know who they are if you want to lead change successfully.

Understand the real resistance.

It's not always obvious. Sometimes it's a very minor issue, which can be resolved easily, and sometimes it's simply change. Every change comes attached to emotions – a sense of loss. Knowing why people are resisting helps the leader walk people through change in a caring, less controlling way.

Timing is huge.

It's difficult to know the perfect time to make a change, but doing the right thing at the wrong time can end up being the wrong thing – no matter how much change is needed.

The key is leaders must strategically plan out a timeline for change. When are key decisions going to be made? Who is told what and when? What are the steps that need to be taken before the change is made?

Identify critical wins and non-critical elements.

You may not get everything you want. It's a controlling leader who thinks they must. There needs to be some collaboration and cooperation. It's a healthy part of leading people – and it's a necessary part of leading change. Identify what must take place to be successful. Use a team to help you with this if possible. Then hold everything else with open hands.

Develop a healthy rhythm of change.

Ultimately, you want each new season of change to go easier than the last. This isn't always possible, of course, simply because some changes are more complex than others and seasons change for people, cultures, and organizations. But great leaders become students of change. They learn as they go.

The way you handle change – things like the speed at which you change, the people you include in change, and the rest and celebration in between change – helps develop the DNA of change in the organization. Change is never easy, but over time you become better at leading change and the organization becomes better at accepting change.
