

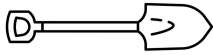
Hope Church Women's Bible Study: Revelation 10:1 – 11:19

February 3-4, 2026



Dwell: Think back to where we left off last week in Rev 9. Write down a couple of words to describe how that passage left you feeling.

As you listen to this week's passage, describe any new emotions/thoughts. Jot down the familiar ideas and images you hear, along with any new questions.



Dig:

1. **Rev 10:9-11** The angel tells John, *"Take and eat it."* The cross-references here point us back to the experience of Ezekiel (on back). What connections do you think John might be wanting the reader to make?

* Note *"sweet"* and *"bitter."* How do those words compare to your words about Rev 9 (above)?

2. **Rev 11:1-2** What does the "Temple" generally represent, in the Old Testament and then in the New? Consider the next 4 references on the back. How might this help us understand 11:1-2? With this in mind, brainstorm the possible meaning of "measuring" the inner but not the outer courts of the temple.

3. **Rev 11:3-12** Let's explore the meaning of the 2 witnesses by considering their description. Who else in the Bible do they remind you of? Brainstorm ideas, then review the verses for question 3 on the back for more insight. What do you see? Who/what do you think the 2 witnesses might represent?



"2 olive trees"



"2 lampstands"



"fire from mouth"... "power to shut the sky... no rain..."



"power over the waters... turn to blood... strike the earth with plague..."



"finished their testimony... kill them... after the three and a half days a breath of life from God entered them, and they stood up on their feet... they went up to heaven in a cloud..."

4. Take a moment to look back at Rev 7. Compare that "interlude" before the last seal to this "interlude" before the last trumpet. Generally speaking, what do these two parts have in common? What differences?
5. The mighty angel with the little scroll said there would be *"no more delay... in the days of the seventh trumpet the mystery of God would be fulfilled"* (10:7). And then at the end of 11, the trumpet sounds (11:15-19). Considering what comes in between, what are you thinking this week's passage might be revealing to us about that mystery – how God's kingdom will come?
6. What are you learning in this passage about God (Father, Son, Holy Spirit)?



Deepen: 1. John is writing to encourage the churches. What might have encouraged them from this passage? How do you find it encouraging? Encourage one another by sharing your ideas.

2. Where have you experienced “sweetness” and “bitterness” in the expression of your faith? How does this passage encourage or challenge you regarding how you “eat” God’s word and live out your faith in this world?

2. We are halfway through Revelation. *How are you doing?* Are you encouraged? Confused? Troubled? How has that experience changed for you as we have moved through the book together?

References:

Question 1:

Ezekiel 2:8-3:4, 3:14-17. ⁸“But you, son of man, hear what I say to you. Be not rebellious like that rebellious house; open your mouth and eat what I give you.” ⁹And when I looked, behold, a hand was stretched out to me, and behold, a scroll of a book was in it. ¹⁰And he spread it before me. And it had writing on the front and on the back, and there were written on it words of lamentation and mourning and woe. **3** And he said to me, “Son of man, eat whatever you find here. Eat this scroll, and go, speak to the house of Israel.” ²So I opened my mouth, and he gave me this scroll to eat. ³And he said to me, “Son of man, feed your belly with this scroll that I give you and fill your stomach with it.” Then I ate it, and it was in my mouth as sweet as honey.⁴ And he said to me, “Son of man, go to the house of Israel and speak with my words to them....

¹⁴The Spirit lifted me up and took me away, and I went in bitterness in the heat [NIV- anger] of my spirit, the hand of the Lord being strong upon me. ¹⁵And I came to the exiles at Tel-abib... ¹⁶And at the end of seven days, the word of the Lord came to me: ¹⁷“Son of man, I have made you a watchman for the house of Israel. Whenever you hear a word from my mouth, you shall give them warning from me...

Question 2:

Exodus 40:18, 19, 34 ¹⁸Moses erected the tabernacle... ¹⁹as the Lord had commanded Moses... ³⁴Then the cloud covered the tent of meeting, and the glory of the Lord filled the tabernacle.

1 Kings 9:3 And the Lord said to him [Solomon], “I have heard your prayer and your plea, which you have made before me. I have consecrated this house that you have built, by putting my name there forever. My eyes and my heart will be there for all time.

1 Corinthians 3:16-17 Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you? ¹⁷If anyone destroys God's temple, God will destroy him. For God's temple is holy, and you are that temple.

Ephesians 2:20-22 ...built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus himself being the cornerstone, ²¹in whom the whole structure, being joined together, grows into a holy temple in the Lord. ²²In him you also are being built together into a dwelling place for God by the Spirit.



Question 3:



Jeremiah 11: ¹⁶ The Lord once called you ‘a green **olive tree**, beautiful with good fruit.’ ...The Lord of hosts, who planted you, has decreed disaster against you, because of the evil that the house of Israel and the house of Judah have done, provoking me to anger by making offerings to Baal.”



Romans 11:11, 17-18

...Through [Israel’s] trespass salvation has come to the Gentiles...But if some of the branches were broken off, and you, although a wild olive shoot, were grafted in among the others and now share in the nourishing root of **the olive tree**, ¹⁸ do not be arrogant toward the branches...



Rev 1:20

As for the mystery of the seven stars that you saw in my right hand, and the seven golden **lampstands**, the seven stars are the angels of the seven churches, and the seven lampstands are the seven churches.



2 Kings 1:9-10

⁹ Then the king sent to him a captain of fifty men with his fifty. He went up to Elijah, who was sitting on the top of a hill, and said to him, “O man of God, the king says, ‘Come down.’” ¹⁰ But Elijah answered the captain of fifty, “If I am a man of God, let fire come down from heaven and consume you and your fifty.” Then **fire** came down from heaven and **consumed** him and his fifty....



1 Kings 17:1

Now Elijah the Tishbite, of Tishbe in Gilead, said to Ahab, “As the Lord, the God of Israel, lives, before whom I stand, there shall be **neither dew nor rain** these years, except by my word.”



Exodus 7:20
