A MESSAGE FROM YOUR DISTRICT **SUPERINTENDENT** Rev. Dr. Kyungsuk Cho

DS Cho is busy moving and unpacking. We look forward to his article next month and beginning our journey together on the Shenandoah River District.

The path that led DS Cho to us has taken him through many different places. Born and raised in Seoul, Korea, he traveled to 8 countries and visited 23 U.S. states thus far. He moved to the United States in 2009 to pursue his M.Div. at Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, DC, and has recently completed his D. Min. at Emory University in Atlanta, GA.

A MESSAGE FROM THE CO-DIRECTOR OF CONNECTIONAL MINISTRIES Written by Rev. Dr. Andy Brock

During the first half of my working life, spent in the business world, life was a constant climb for more of this or that: customers, more sales, a higher salary, a house, cars, education, and so on. I could have easily brought that same kind of life into my new Christian life, which began some thirty years ago. Fortunately,



Regina and I had already made the intentional decision to scale back, allowing us to spend more time on our relationship and our relationship with the Lord.

We moved from the fast-paced life of the Virginia suburbs to a more relaxed life in the Shenandoah Valley. We moved from a large, three-story townhome to a singlelevel modular home that required less maintenance and offered a suitable floor plan for our later years. I took sales positions that required less time on the road and fewer meetings. All these decisions led to us having more time together and more time serving the Lord in ministry and service.

Then came the new calling. For three years, it became a little more hectic like old times. For the first year, I held a full-time sales job, attended seminary classes, and even had an interim lay supply position in the Washington Baltimore Conference. In the second and third years, I continued my seminary studies while serving my first part-time ministry on the West Loudoun Charge. Eventually, I completed seminary, was ordained as an elder, and went on to serve as a full-time pastor, primarily in smaller, rural churches of the Shenandoah Valley.

In many of the congregations I served, we were busy with more money, more programs, and more innovation. All of this when the practice of being church had seemed to stop working. Most of us, both clergy and laity, are aware that attendance is declining, as is participation in programming. We also know that innovations usually fail to achieve much better results.

What has worked? In my experience over the last thirty years, what has worked is remembering who we are — the body of Christ - and who is the head of the body: Jesus Christ. In *When the Church Stops Working*, Andrew Root and Blair Bertrand call us to put a stop to all the running after more money, more programs, and more innovation. Chapter 3 of the book is entitled "Stop All the Having and Just Be." They argue, rightly, that from my experience, it is enough to be the presence of Christ in our communities. They offer several steps to do this. First, die to the old way of being church, and be born a new way; second, to confess that we need the action of Christ through the Spirit; third, to wait for the Spirit to move the Church forward.

Waiting does not mean to wait while sitting on your hands. Waiting consists of continuing to gather for worship, reading of Scripture, serving in the community, and putting aside anything that would keep you from seeing the work of the Spirit around you. Waiting, they say, brings not death, but life. My experience in small churches has found this to be true.

What this book offers is a way of being, rather than a way of doing. If you are interested in finding a way forward for the church, I highly recommend reading *When Church Stops Working*. If you need additional help, I am here to help coach you forward if you would like.





Questions Jesus Asked: A Six-Week Study in the




Gospels by Magrey deVega, 2023.

In *Questions Jesus Asked*, Magrey deVega explores six of the most provocative questions Jesus posed to others and guides us in answering them for ourselves.

Asking these questions takes courage. Not only do they reveal what Jesus really cares about, they open a window into our hearts. We all have questions for God, but growth happens when we turn things around and ask what Jesus wants to know about us. When we dare to raise them, these questions bring us a fuller appreciation for the wisdom, power, and presence of God in our lives.

KINGSWAY PRISON AND FAMILY OUTREACH

I had the opportunity to attend the Re-entry Fair held at Cold Springs Correctional Center in May. It was eye opening. As Vicki Barb, Louise Jennings and I sat in a room with about 20 other organizations, men entered the room in waves, similar to the waves breaking on the seashore. We made some good contacts with men looking for assistance as they prepared to take part in the outside world once again. We had warm conversations as we listened to their plans for life outside the walls that had been their home for months and years. I loved being part of the Reentry Fair and look forward to going next time!

Then there were those other guys. As they looked around the room, their eyes skimmed over the Kingsway logo with the purple cross and refused to make eye contact, even as they stood right in front of our table. I thought about this during a lull between groups.

Kingsway **IS** a Christian organization. We don't apologize for that. Does being a Christian organization mean that we only assist people who claim to be Christians too? **NO!** Just as the great hospitals here in the United States were formed by Christians because they believed that everyone should have access to medical help, Kingsway, being a Christian organization, **informs** how we interact with people. The biblical principles of love, forgiveness and second chances define how Kingsway helps everyone we encounter. Is confessing Christ a requirement for help? **No!** Can someone who is searching for a different way come to know God better through their contact with Kingsway? **OH, I PRAY THAT THEY DO!**

1 Corinthians 1:18 recently reminded me that *THE MESSAGE OF THE CROSS IS FOOLISHNESS TO THOSE THAT ARE PERISHING, BUT TO US WHO ARE BEING SAVED, IT IS THE POWER OF GOD.*

Not everyone stopped by our Kingsway table, and not everyone who encounters the cross is going to be transformed and have their lives changed. **BUT** we keep offering the cross of Christ, knowing that for those tired of being tossed around by the angry waves of life, it is the lifeline that their souls have been crying out for!
